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CGHB PATIENT PARTICIPATION GROUP

CGHB News

During a recent meeting with CGHB/Operose, it was agreed that a second Meet the Patients meeting with Maria Miller MP, would take place during the summer 2023. Maria Miller has confirmed she will be facilitating this meeting. Date to be confirmed. Future Operose newsletters are scheduled to include details on issues in respect of DriQ training videos, and an explanation of the Team of Teams initiative for patient awareness.

Call wait times are starting to improve, and work continues in this area. There are general staff recruitment problems, with the national shortage of GPs causing difficulties. In line with NHS policy, CGHB proactively recruit other clinical roles, such as Advanced Nurse Practitioners, pharmacists and paramedics to provide a multi-disciplinary clinical team giving as many appointments as possible for patients. CGHB also use the NHS ARRS scheme, which provides funding for additional clinical roles, and draws on central support teams, i.e. pharmacists, to support their practices.

If a health matter is causing concern, and patients have difficulty contacting the surgery for an appointment, the III service is allocated a limited number of appointment spaces at CGHB and, depending on urgency, are able to contact the surgery to arrange a telephone appointment the same day.

CAN I TAKE MY CHILD ON HOLIDAY IF THE OTHER PARENT OBJECTS?

This is a question we are often asked when holiday plans are being made for the summer. The issue for taking a child abroad for a holiday can often be a cause of conflict between separated parents. If the "Lives With" Order is in your favour then you can take your child abroad for up to 28 days as long as there are no other court orders prohibiting this.

What if the holiday has been booked and paid for?

For parents who have previously been able to agree on matters among themselves without requiring legal intervention, the other parent would still have a right of veto over a holiday abroad. This is even if the holiday has been booked and paid for:

In practice, the Court will consider what is in the best interest of the child if parents cannot agree and can make an order about whether they can or cannot go on a particular holiday. If the holiday is soon you would have to seek an urgent hearing and this is not always simple.



The Court will take into consideration issues such as the wishes and feelings of the child concerned and their educational and emotional needs.

Under normal circumstances, the Court will take a view that a holiday for a child is a good thing to be enjoyed.



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COUNCILLOR'S UPDATE

There has been a lot of activity this last month relating to roads in the area. OVERNIGHT NOISE: On 7th March households reported being kept awake by an unexplained noise. Investigations revealed that it was caused by resurfacing works in the Sainsbury supermarket site, improving the entrance road that leads down past the petrol station. I visited the store and spoke with the Duty Manager. Apparently, the works were not planned by the supermarket itself, but by external managers. The supermarket staff were simply told to expect two nights of resurfacing work and to plan their deliveries accordingly. The Duty Manager asked me to pass on Sainsbury's apologies for the disturbance caused. I think this could have been better handled: explanatory letters to neighbours, or even just a social media posting could have helped.

DEFECTIVE STREETWORKS: I have received confirmation from Hampshire Highways that they have raised defect notices against the utility contractor who carried out work in the footpaths in the Beggarwood Lane area. As soon as the contractors left, I reported the incorrect replacement of security barriers and poor infilling of the trenches that they had dug. They have been requested to return and rectify the defects. The streetworks inspector is in contact with them and is liaising to get the issues resolved.

BRIGHTON HILL ROUNDABOUT: The resurfacing work on the roundabout has made rapid progress but not without some significant disruption to normal traffic flows. For nearly two weeks, it was not possible to travel all the way round the roundabout, with diversions in place to the Kempshott and Winchester Road roundabouts. This was followed by night-time working which caused the closure of some of the exits and entrances, albeit planned for two nights only. I was able to walk round the site in March, and the good news is that the project is on schedule, with significant progress being visually apparent as the new road takes shape. BROADMERE ROAD ADOPTIONS: with the problem of access to a soakaway now resolved, Officers have been inspecting the area with a view to agreeing the improvements that the developers need to complete. I joined them on one of the walk-rounds and am sad to report that there are still legal problems to overcome. I will continue to monitor.

And other subjects ...

LLOYDS PHARMACY in Sainsbury's has been telling customers that it will close on April 22nd. This is one day earlier than I was told by one of the staff working there. If you have your prescriptions sent to Lloyds, you have three weeks left in which to choose and nominate a replacement pharmacy. The nearest alternatives are at Beggarwood, Brighton Hill shopping centre or St Andrews Road, South Ham. or one of the delivery services might be appropriate for you. The loss of this facility is a disappointing event for Hatch Warren and Beggarwood: we used to have a separate pharmacy next to Sainsbury's; then it was incorporated into the expanded supermarket and now it is closing completely. **SAINSBURY'S INTENTIONS:** some people have speculated that a replacement pharmacy will come to Sainsbury's. I understand that is NOT the case. According to the person to whom I spoke, Sainsbury's intend to install shelving and incorporate the space into their normal operations.

NUMBER 8 BUS SERVICE: I attended a briefing meeting at which Stagecoach informed us of timetable changes that will come into effect on 16th April. An important change for Hatch Warren and Beggarwood is that the Number 8 bus service will run every 20 minutes instead of every 30 minutes as at present. I have put full details of the changes on my blog.

VANDALISM: Hatch Warren Community Centre was, sadly, victim to vandalism again last month. The centre managers have posted pictures on social media of the damage taking place (with the culprits' faces blurred out) but have supplied the original, very clear, pictures to the Police. The Community Association is a charity and will have to cover the costs of the repairs itself.

COUNCIL BUDGET MEETINGS: Both Hampshire and Basingstoke and Deane have held their budget meetings. Hampshire's Council Tax will be going up by 5% but the Borough is pegging its share at the same level as last year. I spoke at Hampshire about the need to crack down on utility companies who dig up the roads and refill them badly, leading to what I call 'ribbon potholes'. We have enough problems with our roads already without tolerating shoddy workmanship on top.

HOUNSOME FIELDS SCHOOL: One of the items in Hampshire's capital programme is the funding for the new two-form entry primary school at Hounsome Fields. The planning application has been submitted and will now be validated. It is expected to go before Hampshire's Regulatory Committee in May. This school will primarily serve the Hounsome Fields and Golf Course developments.

COUNCILLOR GRANTS: In my opinion, one of the best innovations at the County Council has been the 'Devolved Budgets' scheme, which allows each Member to approve grants for deserving causes. This year the limit was £8,000 per Councillor and I was pleased to use all of mine. I am grateful to all the paid staff and volunteers who help to run the organisations. They enrich our whole society, and directly improve the quality of life of tens of thousands of people. The grant scheme will restart in June.

PATIENT PARTICIPATION GROUP: I continue to observe the meetings of the Patient Participation Group. which is working hard to engage with Operose to help address the problems that the local surgeries are experiencing. One imitative being discussed is holding another public meeting at which patients can speak, to enable some direct communications with the operators.

Last time – promise! It is the Group's AGM on Thursday 27 April, 8 pm at Old Down Hall. Please do come along to join us (we will be there from 7:45). There will be up-dates on what is happening or has happened on the two sites, a chance to natter, a presentation of local wildlife photos and refreshments (with homemade cakes!). We really are in need of more members so please consider becoming a member and perhaps joining the committee or work parties.

The Group has kindly been awarded a small grant organised by Cllr Putty. The intention is to use this money for purchasing a trolley to make it easier for work parties to move

tools around the sites and for purchasing native wildflower seeds We particularly want to plant more *Horseshoe Vetch*. As you may be aware we have good numbers of *Small Blue* butterflies on the sites (Old Down in particular) but we hope we can increase numbers of *Chalkhill Blue* butterflies by planting their food source, the *Horseshoe Vetch*. There isn't much *Horseshoe Vetch* on either site. The Small Blue butterfly feeds on *Kidney Vetch*. Thus the two butterfly species would not be vying for the same food source.

Don't forget that our hedgehogs will be awaking from their hibernation now so please would you consider placing food

out for them and also fresh water. Bread and milk is a no – no for hedgehogs but cat food and dry cat biscuits (not fish-based) go down well.



ANCIENT ANCESTORS

Hatch Warren and Beggarwood and the wider area around us are littered with ancient sites. Plenty of evidence for Iron age settlements has been found locally as well as later Romano-British artefacts, and part of the Hatch Warren estate was built on the site of a medieval farm and church. But there are a couple of particularly interesting local finds.

In 2000, as Beggarwood was being built, an excavation uncovered two "Beaker Burial" sites, one in what is now Wentworth Crescent, and one in Camford Close. Pottery fragments were found in both. In one grave the remains of a male skeleton were uncovered, and in the other the remains of a

female. It was estimated that the bones were from around 2300 to 2100 BCE.

A major Roman Road ran from Silchester to Winchester, the line of the A30 and the A33 follows some of its course. When the M3 was being constructed, Hampshire Museum Service and the local Archaeological Group conducted some digs close to The Wheatsheaf near North Waltham, which was already known to be a Roman site. The finds unearthed included coins, jewellery and writing styluses. As the site is practically equidistant between the important towns of Silchester (Calleva Atrebatum) and Winchester (Venta Belgarum) it would have made a good staging post, so it was suggested that the


Romans had constructed a Mansio there, a stopping place for travellers or the Roman equivalent of a hotel or travel lodge. There may also have been a temple close by for visiting travellers or officials.

Hatch Warren Under Fives and the EYFS

Here at Hatch Warren Under Fives we love to make marks. This can be using pens, paper, paintbrushes, chalks, pens or even using our fingers to make marks in soil, jam or flour.

Why is Mark Making Important? Mark making gives children the opportunity to explore imaginatively, physically and creatively, to test their ideas and extend their play. Writing begins long before a child can physically hold and control a pencil or crayon effectively, the journey to becoming a confident writer begins at birth and mark making is the foundation that underpins a child's ability to write. Remember children learn that marks have meaning by watching adults writing. Encourage your child to 'write' with you e.g.shopping lists, phone messages, memos and greeting cards.

The EYFS states that we can expect to see a child sometimes giving meaning to marks as they draw and paint and ascribe meanings to marks that they see in different places. Let your little one enjoy lots of mark making opportunities to build on their writing skills!

PROBUS CLUB HEARS ABOUT WHAT HAPPENED AFTER THE TITANIC WENT DOWN

April 15th this year is the 111th anniversary of the sinking of the Titanic. Even after so long there remains worldwide interest into this worst civilian marine disaster in history with the loss of 1500 lives.

lan Porter, the speaker at the latest meeting of the Probus Club of Basingstoke, is a journalist, author and historian, has particular interest in what happened after the unsinkable ship went down only 2 hours 40 minutes after that fateful collision with an iceberg.

The captain of the Titanic, Edward Smith, was on record of saying a few years earlier that ships were unlikely to sink because of modern



shipbuilding methods. At that time ships above 10,000 tons were required to have 10 lifeboats as it was considered that lifeboats would be used to ferry passengers to awaiting rescue ships and would make such journeys several times. The Titanic was the largest passenger liner in the world at 45,000 tons and had twenty lifeboats and other safety systems well above the minimum requirements.

What happened in the lifeboats, containing mainly women and children from first and second-class, most of which had spare capacity to take many men? They were larger versions of rowing boats and had none or insufficient provisions to sustain life and protection for periods at sea.

Would the vessels on the North Atlantic at the time of this disaster have rescued more if they had responded differently?



One stopped in an ice field to await day light, one ship's radio operator ignored the distress call from the Titanic because he had a backlog of messages from passengers to transmit, another ship's radio operator had gone off duty and another ship ignored white distress rockets thinking that they were celebratory flares of the White Star Line.

There were confusing distress signals with the Titanic using CQD (seek youdistress) and then tried SOS which had yet to become the standard Morse code distress signal of three dots, three dashes and three dots.

The Cunard ship, Carpathia, picked up the survivors, keeping them within their three classes, provided many with spare clothes. A fund was set up on board raising \$1,500 to provide funds for survivors' onward travel from when they arrived in New York. It is reported that survivor, Lady Astor, perhaps the richest lady in the world, refused to contribute.

The White Star Line stopped the pay of any crew that had perished from the time the ship went down and charged surviving crew full fare to be brought back to England. A fund was set up in England that raised £15,000,000 with an elite committee of the great and good of the day set up to distribute compensation to the families of lost passengers. In strict observance of social standing the wealthiest received up to £175,000 down to only £25 to the poorest. Pensions were set up, again subject to the recipient's social standing with seven levels ranging from 12/6p - 7/6p per week. This fund was only wound up in 1959 with much of the money unallocated.

Two inquiries followed the disaster with one in New York and a longer one in London held by the Board of Trade. Both concluded that the specification of the Titanic was well above established standards and that best naval practice had been followed that fateful night.

But changes were made to marine regulations implementing new safety measures. Wireless operations had to be manned 24 hours, and red rockets for distress flares. There was much discussion about the quality of rivets to be used in ship building, bulkheads had to be extended to make sections watertight and ships were modified to have double skinned hulls.

Perhaps the one thing that gives comfort to today's cruise passengers is the design and number of life boats and that crews are constantly trained in their use and that passengers have life vests and attend muster station drills. What a difference there might have been to survival rates if the crew had received training, but there had been none, as many of the crew had boarded the Titanic in Southampton only hours before departure.

Andrew was a big of part of St Mark's Church before he started ordination training and is now Vicar of the Parish




of the Resurrection in Alton. Andrew also is Chair of the House of Clergy in

SPIRITUALLY SPEAKING

Who are our spiritual ancestors?

Just a few weeks ago I received a small gift in the post, with no accompanying letter, just a postcode on the back of the package offering a clue of its sender from Northern Ireland. Imagine my reaction on opening the first page to instantly recognise my long-deceased father's distinctive handwriting; **To Mum from John 1944 Jerusalem**. It was a miniature Bible titled: 'New Testament of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ'. This family heirloom that I was totally unaware of arrived, assuming from an older cousin, or his family who I had a brief Ancestry link to Belfast many years ago. As there was no further information, we returned a card of thanks and alternative contact details to a postcode we hoped might connect back to these thoughtful relatives.

I have no idea if they are Christians, have little or no faith, but what I hope they come to know is the significance in their act of kindness. It was as a 16-year-old that I had to ask my father to finally leave the family home, then in Somerset. He had endeavoured, but without success to overcome a serious drinking problem, and within six months he passed away aged just 52. There is much I regret, but so much more I would want to thank him for now had he still been alive. This newly acquired precious New Testament symbolises a priceless gift he gave me as a small boy, when he came to my bedroom and taught me the Lord's Prayer. I would also want to thank him for his courage. Another clue in the reference to 1944 illuminates' wartime service in North Africa, the Middle East and Europe receiving a Distinguished Flying Medal, having survived over a hundred sorties as an RAF Air Gunner / Wireless Operator.

As I pondered further on this unusual heirloom, I began to also be thankful for my spiritual ancestors. The *Mum* referred to earlier, my grandmother, apparently had a very strong faith and I was aware that she often prayed for me even though we met only in my youth. For someone I hardly knew she always remained a spiritual anchor whose prayers sustained me through my largely unchurched faith into early adult life. Little did she know that her same son signed and gifted me a Bible, which I kissed before every foot patrol while serving as a Royal Marine in South Armagh in the early seventies.

Finally, reflecting on the last entry *Jerusalem* then in Palestine, I was reminded of another, but unique spiritual ancestor. Two thousand years ago at Golgotha, a skull-shaped hill in ancient Jerusalem, Jesus Christ was nailed to a wooden cross. Slowly and painfully, he died for you and me, for every evil thought and sin we have, and will ever commit. To hear more of that remarkable life, death and His saving grace, why not join us this Easter and celebrate God's greatest gift to humankind, that of His only son Jesus Christ.

SHELTERBOX

Saturday 18th February saw Rotarians in Basingstoke and friends of Rotary in Festival Place collecting to help Turkey and Syria after the devastating earthquake. Thanks to Festival Place Management team who gave us a wonderful site and the generosity of the people of Basingstoke we were able to collect over \pounds 3400 to go to Shelterbox and Rotary Disaster Recovery,

SHELTERBOX, Rotary's global partner for Disaster Relief is a UK-based international charity. SHELTERBOX was founded by the Rotary Club of Helston, Cornwall. Working alongside UNICEF & other international charities, it provides emergency shelter & survival kits to 1000s of families who have lost everything through natural disasters such as the earthquake in Turkey & Syria.

A full Shelterbox provides a robust tent and the basic essentials for sleeping, cooking and water purification for a family of 10 to survive for 6 months. There will also be small toys and books and pencils for children. SHELTER KITS, and SHELTER TOOL KITS used to build and repair are also needed. The contents of these kits are tailored to the need in the area and may include tarpaulin, ropes, tie wire, handsaw, nails, hammer, axes & other items such as water filters

Shelterbox highly trained response teams have been working tirelessly in both Turkey and Syria to deliver aid to the regions affected by the earthquake. The team in Turkey met with Rotarians colleagues in Istanbul to discuss the logistical challenges of accessing the affected areas.

PEA AND MINT SOUP

(vegan and vegetarian option – do not add the cream) Time – 30 minutes Cost £2.50 – 50p per portion Makes 5 good portions

Ingredients

I bunch spring onions, trimmed and roughly chopped I medium potato, peeled and diced I garlic clove, crushed 850ml vegetable or chicken stock 900gm young peas in the pod (to give about 250gm/9oz shelled peas) 4 tbsp chopped fresh mint large pinch caster sugar I tbsp fresh lemon or lime juice I 5ml buttermilk or soured cream

Method

Put the spring onions into a large pan with the potato, garlic and stock. Bring to the

boil, turn down the heat and simmer for 15 minutes or until the potato is very soft. For the garnish, blanch 3 tbsp of the shelled peas in boiling water for 2-3 minutes, drain, put in a bowl of cold water and set aside. Add the remaining peas to the soup base and simmer for 5 minutes - no longer or you will lose the lovely fresh flavour of the peas.

Stir in the mint, sugar and lemon or lime juice, cool slightly then pour into a food processor or liquidiser and whizz until as smooth as you like. Stir in half the buttermilk or soured cream, taste and season with salt and pepper:

To serve the soup cold, cool quickly, then chill - you may need to add more stock to the soup before serving as it will thicken as it cools. To serve hot, return the soup to the rinsed-out pan and reheat without boiling (to prevent the buttermilk or soured cream from curdling).

Serve the soup in bowls, garnished with the remaining buttermilk and the drained peas

This place is far from being ordinary - in fact it is quite extraordinary. It creates a sense of being on holiday, yet it is at the Top of the Town at the east end of London Street in a building that was the original Thomas Burberry showroom. And, as we all know, Thomas Burberry, a famous son of Basingstoke, invented the waterproof fabric called gabardine.

The décor creates the ambiance with stripped wooden flooring, tables for six having banquettes and there is a large living wall which claims to help in cleaning the air. The menu, described as Cheese & Charcuterie is rustic in style with simple affordable offerings. There are breakfast alternatives to suit everyone, Breaky-Bites, baked potatoes, paninis, sandwiches, wraps & bagels, tapas plates and six sharing dishes. There is a traditional style children's menu.

Madam and I decided we would have a sharing dish and chose the Mexican Tapas Platter (\pounds 16.00). It was delicious. It had a dish of chilli beef, taco slides, mixed cheese quesadillas, a stuffed pepper with rice, sour cream, salsa and Pico de Gallo.

A large glass of wine each went down very well. Madam had a Chilean Rosé, and I had an Italian Merlot. This place doesn't do desserts although we could have had cake or chocolate covered caramel flapjack which are more suited accompanying morning coffee or a cup of tea in the afternoon. Instead, we each had a flat white coffee.

Bearing in mind that our wine was a similar cost to our lunch yet the bill was only \pounds 35.00. This was not a large lunch but was perfectly sized for our needs. It was top quality and great value. We shall certainly return to try the other tempting offerings.





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
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
