#### **COUNCILLOR UPDATES**

**DEVOLUTION:** The County Council elections here have been postponed for a year so that consultations can take place on the setting up of a 'Combined Authority' with an elected Mayor. The government intends for this body to come into being next year.

LOCAL **GOVERNMENT REORGANISATION:** I attended a special meeting of the County Council on 20th March to discuss options for introducing Unitary Authorities across Hampshire. I am worried about the direction of the debate, with Councils and Members drawing lines on maps based on local preferences. I spoke at the meeting to urge members to consider instead the best way to provide quality services. For example, we have in Hampshire a Children's Services department that has been measured externally as Outstanding in all areas, and I believe we should do everything possible to hold that team together. Final proposals will be submitted to the government in the Autumn.

MOTORWAY SERVICES: there has been an interesting development regarding the possibility of a 'Basingstoke Services' on the M3. Moto have submitted a planning application (25/00754/OUT) seeking outline permission for development of a new Motorway Service Area and associated landscaping, infrastructure and ancillary works at Junction 6, which is the Black Dam junction. This is of interest to us in the Hatch Warren and Beggarwood areas: if permission is granted, that would lay to rest any idea of a service area opposite the Portsmouth Arms. But if it is rejected, that notion might be resurrected. This issue has been dragging on since 2017 when an application for full planning permission was submitted. That has remained undetermined for eight years, but discussions have taken place with the Borough Council and stakeholders, including National Highways and the Environment Agency. These talks have resulted in changes to the 2017 scheme, including the removal of a hotel and drivethrough restaurant. That amended proposal is the subject of the new outline application. LOCAL SURGERIES: sadly, the issues regarding making appointments at the local surgeries have continued and I have received complaints based on patients' experiences. They have been discussed at Hampshire's Health and Adult Social Care committee (HASC), as well as the local Patient Participation Group, both of which I attend. I reported last time that the HASC committee agreed to set up a working group to scrutinise the provision of GP service in Basingstoke and to consider if all residents are able to access GP services equally and effectively. The terms of reference have been agreed, and I am expecting this working group to meet in the near future.

PATIENT PARTICIPATION GROUP (PPG): I have attended meetings of the PPG, including discussions with the management team at the Camrose, Gillies, Hackwood and Beggarwood surgeries. They are aware of the problems with the appointments system and are planning changes to the telephone answering disciplines that they hope will improve the situation. The changes are due to be implemented on 28th April. They will involve using the automated phone system to direct patient calls to the colour-coded groups in which the patients have been placed. The surgeries have promised a major communications exercise to explain how this will work.

CARE QUALITY COMMISSION REPORT: back in December, I took part in an online meeting with the Care Quality Commission that was looking into the Governance and Management of the CGHB surgeries. I had some major concerns, so am looking forward to seeing the report. I understand that it has been drafted and made available to the management team for review and comment. Hopefully it will be published soon.

**DEMOLISHED STREET LAMP:** at the beginning of April a street lamp was demolished in a road traffic accident at the entrance to Woodbury Road, off the Kempshott roundabout. I reported the damage and was informed that 1st May is the target date for replacing it. At the time of writing, the car that collided with the lamp has been removed, and a new lamp standard has been put in place. It now needs to have its 'head' fitted and connected.

#### POSTS IN HATCH WARREN FIELDS:

I was interested to see lines of posts in our local fields - about a metre tall and painted green at the top. They divided the green areas roughly in half. I wrote to the Borough Council and had it confirmed that they were put up to mark the parts that are to be mown and those that are to be left to grow naturally. This is part of the plan to encourage biodiversity in our area. The posts have been removed now.

ANAEROBIC DIGESTER: On 11th March the operators informed interested parties that work was scheduled to repair storm damage on one of the gas holders. This was completed the following week. There were some reports of odour pollution at the time, but it is not certain that the repairs were the cause.

TREES: I have received no more complaints about the trees recently planted in Beggarwood Lane. As I reported last time, I welcome them for softening the look of the area, providing homes for wildlife and for cleaning the atmosphere. On a related topic, I have noted that the pruning of existing trees and bushes alongside roads and paths looks to have been particularly robust this year, and many stumps indicate where trees have been felled. I am inquiring whether a replacement planting programme is being put in place.

#### STUBBINGTON OUTDOOR CENTRE:

last month I reported on the debate regarding the future of the Stubbington Centre, which many children from this area have attended over the years. I am pleased to confirm that the Cabinet voted to retain the Centre, and they are looking for an alternative site for the secure children's home that might have replaced it.

HEAVY TRAFFIC: there were delays past Hatch Warren and Beggarwood in April, caused by the M3 motorway being closed for maintenance work between Junctions 6 and 7. There were queues at the local roundabouts and at the junction of Beggarwood Lane near the Holly Blue. I mention this because it demonstrated, again, that the road system to the west of Basingstoke is vulnerable to anything out of the ordinary. With 18,000 homes slated to be built on this side of town, I fear that this vulnerability can only get worse.

SOUTH AND BUCKSKIN REGENERATION: on a related subject, I am asking how many homes are likely



to be built as these two areas are redeveloped, and whether any analysis has been carried out on the impact on our roads. This could put more pressure on the A30 to Junction 7.

It's hard to believe, but you'll be receiving this pretty much exactly on the first anniversary of my election as your Borough Councillor. It has been a heck of a year!

I want to thank all the hundreds of residents I've heard from in the last twelve months. Together we've tackled with all the things you'd expect - fences, hedgerows and trees; taxi services and bus cuts; parking and broken walls; graffiti and ASB - but also some things I hadn't anticipated. I have dealt with queries on rough camping, Housing Association issues, disabled access in car parks and roundabout underpasses, ice rink and Camrose concerns, domestic violence and neighbour disputes, estate agent signage and more. The term "learning curve" has never been more applicable in my life, and I thank everyone for their patience as I got (and continue to get!) to grips with everything. A big thank you also to the dozens of groups and organisations I've met and everyone who contributed to the events I have organised and been a part of. I hope to carry on working for you for many years to come!

Some things to be aware of as we head through spring. The Council's 'Keep Basingstoke and Deane Clean' campaign is raising awareness of the penalties for not cleaning up dog mess over the coming weeks; I know that this is a perennial concern for some of you. Although it seems an easy and insignificant thing to walk away from your pet's business, the consequences to public health, especially for young children who are the most prone to nasty encounters with it, can be

extremely dire. Please – if you are a dogowner – remember that it's not only your social duty but your legal responsibility to clean up their mess, and community safety patrol officers will be out and about at fouling hotspots throughout spring and summer issuing fixed penalty notices to anyone spotted leaving mess behind or any dog walkers who do not have poo bags with them.

An issue that has cropped up repeatedly over the last two months is rat infestations. I have assisted some residents in reporting and pest control sourcing, and am working on an ongoing basis for others to see if we can find a more proactive rather than reactive approach to dealing with them. In the meantime, whilst I know we are all concerned about wildlife, I urge residents to be careful with their care. There are many animal welfare sites online that have tips on feeding hedgehogs, birds etc without attracting rats so do check these out.

Hampshire Hospital Foundation Trust are looking for volunteers to join their Patient Experience Volunteer Network, which helps ensure diverse voices are involved in these spaces and is really important for improving services. If anyone is interested in helping HHFT from a patient perspective, you can email PatientExperience@HHFT. nhs.uk to find out more.

I'm hugely looking forward to helping at the Hatch Warren Lager Festival again on 17th May, which is always a fantastic event! This year they're introducing stand-up comedy so it should be even more fun; you can find out more and grab tickets on the events page at www.hatchwarren.org.

The Councillor Community Grant Scheme is open early this year due to elections being cancelled. I was so pleased to be able to help out some really worthy organisations with last year's scheme and I'd love to hear from a diverse range of organisations for this next round so, if you think you may qualify, do check www. basingstoke.gov.uk/cllr-community-grants for the relevant criteria and get in touch.

I was delighted to attend the presentation of the King's Award for Voluntary Service to Home-Start Basingstoke and Deane; a well-deserved honour for an immensely dedicated team who have supported over 2000 Basingstoke families over the last twenty years. I was equally happy to support the Council's fabulous 'Listen Up' music event at the end of March, which comprised dozens of acts over five venues in town, all for free!

I was pleased to lend my support to the Hampshire and Isle of Wight Wildlife Trust's campaign to Save Our Chalk Streams and will continue to promote this; I urge residents to look it up on www. hiwwt.org.uk/rivers and find out how to contact our MP on the issue.

The new Hatch Warren Repair Café continues to build on a strong start, and we have the first meeting of the new Management Committee this coming month. If you would like to assist in organising this project, we have some social media and admin roles available, so please get in touch.

Finally, much of my work last month went towards my maiden speech and very first motion at Full Council. You'll know that equality is always at the heart of our work and so I asked Council to take action on advocating for the decriminalisation of abortion, which is an issue causing great and growing problems for women, especially those in vulnerable circumstances. I was very proud that we presented our case with care and compassion, and after some debate, the Chamber voted strongly in favour of the motion. You can find the motion text and the video recording of the debate on the Council website by going to the meeting calendar entry for 20th March. I am very aware that this is a complex and emotive issue for many people and as such I want to urge any resident who has questions or concerns about the material to get in touch with me, and I am happy to discuss it further with you.

My next 'Ask Me Anything' Councillor Surgery for all resident questions, issues, discussions or ideas will be on Monday 19th May from 7-9pm at the Portsmouth Arms – do drop in and say hi!

#### **CRIME PREVENTION**

Have you received a letter or invoice for a service that you don't recognise? This can be the first sign of identity fraud.

The Home Office have created an 'Identity theft victim's checklist' to outline the steps to take to repair your identity and prevent it happening again. These steps include:

- Contact your bank(s) and ask them to withhold pending transactions.
- Change your passwords and pins, including those for email addresses and social media accounts.
- Use a credit referencing agency to find out if any accounts have been opened without your consent.
- Contact any companies/ accounts that have been affected (e.g. credit card companies).
- Report the fraud to Action Fraud: www.actionfraud.police.uk
- Contact Victim Support or Citizens Advice if you need further support, including emotional support.

#### PROBUS LEARN ABOUT HMS BROADSWORD & FALKLANDS WAR 1982

For speaker Charlie Threlfall, as a short-term Royal Navy officer, the prospect of a goodwill tour of ten countries had great appeal.



Aged 19 in early April 1982, he was on *HMS Broadsword* at anchor in Gibraltar. They were readying for a series of social events and cocktail parties across the world as they planned to show off their three years old warship. Launched in 1979 as a Type 22 Guided Missile Frigate with a displacement of 4,500 tons and a crew of 235, *HMS Broadsword* was the epitome of the latest thinking in naval warfare. It had no traditional gun batteries but an assortment of guided missiles that could lock on a target without fail.



That very week, on 2nd April 1982, Sub Lieutenant Charlie Threlfall's life changed forever. The Falkland

Islands in the South Atlantic were invaded by Argentinian forces. On 5th April HMS Broadsword left Gibraltar heading for Ascension Island, about halfway to the Malvinas, as the Argentinians called this British protectorate.


There, a group of twenty war ships and supply vessels was assembled, painting out any identification marks to confuse any attacking forces. Southbound, they sailed in close convoy using no radar and no lights at night so that they could not be located by the enemy. The crew went on Defence Watches of six hours on, six hours off. They were lucky to get four hours sleep each day for ten weeks.

The British submarine *Conqueror* sank the Argentinian cruiser *General Belgrano* on 2 May. Questions were asked in Britain if it was a legitimate target as it was purported to be sailing away from the conflict zone, a situation denied years later by the ship's captain. All Argentinian naval ships were ordered back to port and then only aerial attacks continued at the extreme limits of their range.

Action stations came on 4h May when HMS Sheffield was hit by an air launched anti-ship Exocet missile. 170 sailors from the Sheffield were rescued by Broadsword.

HMS Broadsword, along with HMS Coventry, was positioned in San Carlos Water and they were unable to spot enemy aircraft approaching over land and were strafed and bombed, being unable to offer much resistance. Crew were instructed not to shoot at helicopters only fast jets.

Broadsword and Coventry were then positioned at sea to the west of the Falklands to draw aircraft fire from the troops. With two



approaching enemy jets HMS Coventry was hit by three 500lb bombs, caught fire and eventually sank. But as it came across the bow of *Broadsword* it prevented them from firing their missiles.

It was then discovered that at sea it was impossible to reload the four Exocet launchers on Broadsword once the initial four missiles had been fired. This was one of the many lessons learnt during this conflict. HMS Broadsword had a narrow escape from following the fate of HMS Coventry as a 1000lb bomb travelling at 450 mph hit the ship towards the stern, 10 feet above sea level, travelled through two decks and emerged upwards through the flight deck, where it took off the nose of a Lynx helicopter and bounced overboard, having failed to explode. Six British war ships were lost and sixteen damaged during this conflict. 649 Argentinian military personnel, 255 British and three civilian islanders lost their lives. Charlie Threlfall knows the name of the Argentinian pilot who sent the 1000lb bomb into the side of HMS Broadsword. He says he would never shake his hand as two of his fellow schoolboys from his street on the Isle of Wight were in this conflict. One was a cook and was killed in this action while another, like himself, survived thereby becoming a member of the 'Bomb Alley Survivors Club'.

#### **OLD DOWN WILDLIFE GROUP**



Remember 'no mow May'? You probably have already been in the garden to cut the grass — a mown lawn does look nice and tidy. However this is not great for insects. There is a huge decline in insects in the UK due mostly to habitat loss, agricultural practices and use of pesticides. This decline is of great concern as we need insects to

pollinate so we have beautiful flowers to enjoy and more importantly crops to provide our food. This is the time of year to leave grass long for insects to thrive - thus 'no mow May'. Please resist mowing all your grass this month and next month - leave at least some long grass and scruffy areas for the sake of insects. "Insects" of course includes butterflies and all species of butterflies in the UK are now in serious decline from year to year. site. Dog poo is so dangerous as it carries various diseases that can be transmitted to humans such as toxocariasis. It really is important to pick up your dog's poo and it can easily be disposed of in the bins provided on site.

Work Parties: We meet outside Old Down Hall every Thursday 10-12noon (but not in the rain!). We really do need new members and support – this is the way to keep Old Down as a beautiful green space for wildlife and people. You do not have to come every week. 

#### Notes from the kitchen

#### **Sunday Roast**

When I was young, the staple of the week's menu was the Sunday roast. Roast beef was the family favourite served with Yorkshire pudding, roast spuds, parsnips and a green vegetable. There would be leftovers to be served cold on Monday with any leftover veg made into bubble and squeak. Sliced and layered with carrots and onions and covered with stock to make a hotpot on Tuesday, minced and made into a cottage pie on Wednesday. There was no food processor in our house — the mincer was screwed onto the end of the ironing board and the chopped up meat fed in while I turned the handle. A chicken was for special occasions. I remember collecting a chicken from the butcher and having to wait while he removed the feathers and guts. There was a separate bag for the 'giblets' — kidney, liver and neck — which was a key ingredient in preparing the gravy.

Now the supermarket displays rows of chicken in sizes from very small to extra large. Sadly they no longer seem to include that small bag of giblets — I wonder where they go. The extra large bird can be stuffed, roasted and served with lots of roasted vegetables or whatever you fancy.

Monday - Strip the meat off and boil up the bones for stock then serve chicken with jacket potatoes and salad. A chicken risotto on Tuesday made with the stock. Any meat and stock left help make a thick and delicious vegetable soup for Wednesday. Maybe a chicken pie for dinner one evening and if there isn't enough meat left, then mushrooms, carrots and frozen peas could be added. And there will probably be enough meat left for a couple of sandwiches for the lunchbox. But what about those of us who do not want to eat meat? A jar of pulses can go a long way to provide a variety of meals. Red kidney beans can be the basis of delicious veggie burgers (Jack Monroe's recipe is amazing, easy and cheap). Add beans and lentils to chopped vegetables, top with mashed potato and you have a cottage pie. There are many books devoted to cooking with beans. Even if you are not a vegetarian or vegan, pulses are cheap and delicious. My current favourite recipe using white beans is 'Hearty Sausage Stew' from Julius Roberts' book 'The Family Table'. I use whole sausages (meat or veggie) and add whatever

Regular travellers along the A33 to Reading will have noticed that the Jekyll & Hyde pub near to the Wellington Arms reopened about a month ago. From the outbreak of Covid this establishment has suffered more than most being closed more than being open. This, no doubt, proved to be a problem to the landlord, the Devises brewery, Hall & Woodhouse, as their other establishments of the Holly Blue at Beggarwood and the Queens College Arms on the Tadley road remained open.

Eager to see if it has changed, Madam and I had Sunday lunch there. It looked familiar inside in all manner and had all female waiting staff that were pleasant and efficient. Rather than the standard weekday menu, instead a restrictive Sunday lunch special was proffered with the typical choices including burgers. A children's menu is available.

Forgoing a starter Madam had roast chicken while I had sliced roast pork belly. Each plate came with a couple of overdone roast potatoes and a Yorkshire pudding and a small jug of gravy. Vegetables came in a separate dish of carrots, broccoli, red cabbage and cabbage and a further dish of cauliflower cheese. Extra jugs of gravy can be ordered for an additional £1.50.

Our pudding choice was apple and pear crumble with a jug of custard followed by a flat white coffee for Madam that came in a vase shaped vessel without handles and I had an Americano with separate hot milk. Mine was in a glass tumbler with a handle.

With our drinks of a zero alcohol Peroni and diet tonic with ice and a slice the bill came to £65.50 including a discretionary service charge.

While the place was not packed it was quite busy with most tables in use for diners but no doubt this will improve as it becomes common knowledge that it has reopened.

#### IT WAS THIRTY YEARS AGO TODAY

Issue 7 of the Rabbiter came out in August 1993. There were two very important local news items.

The main headline was that plans were being finalised for the building of a new primary school in Hatch Warren. The location was off Danebury Road and the 'chicane' in Woodbury Road. It was to be a Church of England Aided school and open to all children. Building was due to start in March 1995, with a view to the school opening in September 1996.

This was, of course, the announcement of what we now know as St Mark's School. Today it is difficult to remember Hatch Warren and Beggarwood without St Mark's. It has retained its strong Christian ethos and become one of the most respected and popular primary schools in the Borough. It's 'Friends of St Mark's' Parent/Teacher Association is one of the most active in the area.

The second item that was high on the agenda in 1993 was the issue of road safety. On 17th June, seventy local residents, representatives of the Police and Councils, plus Borough Councillors attended a public meeting to discuss traffic problems. It was a large turnout for a public meeting, and demonstrated the concern being felt in the area.

A traffic survey, commissioned by local residents, had shown that 32,000 vehicles used the southern end of Woodbury Road in one week, and of those, 22,000 broke the speed limit - with twelve exceeding 70 mph! That was ridiculous behaviour, so it is no wonder that the discussion was described as 'lively!

This traffic survey initiative from local residents was received seriously by the Councils and had brought about immediate improvements to signage on our local roads. Eventually it led to the installation of the 'build outs' that slow down traffic around Hatch Warren. These are either loved or loathed to this day. One was removed from Long Cross Lane due to its position on a bend.

On balance, I believe residents see the build-outs today as a useful addition to road safety in the area. With car meets so prominent these days, I hope that they help to deter some of the worst excesses of irresponsible driving.

News from the Community Centre was positive. One initiative was a leaded glass window that had been designed, for which sponsors were being sought. It was due to be assembled in August.

The first Hatch Warren beer festival had been a success, with over 600 people attending. This event has evolved and continues to this day.

And a first birthday celebration was being planned for 4th September, with a Barn Dance in the evening.

To finish ... here's a memory that sadly seems to have faded away ... people were being encouraged to grow sunflowers and measure their height. There was a competition, with judging scheduled for 4th September.

I used to enjoy seeing these magnificent flowers around the area – is this an idea worthy of being resurrected?

These are the words spoken by Prime Minister Winston Churchill as he addressed a crowd in Whitehall following the surrender of the German government at that time. Just before that he had stood on the balcony at Buckingham Palace with King George VI and Queen Elizabeth, and the princesses Elizabeth and Margaret.

This was the end of the war in Europe but unfortunately not the world – it would be another 3 months before Japan surrendered on 15th August (VJ Day).

An anniversary such as this gives us cause to remember and learn from the sacrifice of those who served, on the frontline, and on the home front, for those who had worked in reserved occupations and for the children evacuated to safety far from home.

It makes us remember those who didn't make it home and those who did but then lived with the scars of war, both physically and emotionally for the rest of their lives.

So much had been given by so many. The end of war means trying to rebuild nations and people learning to live in peace with each other. When we commemorate, we give thanks for those who gave their lives to resist evil and oppose tyranny. We can also give thanks that we are no longer at war.

But that is not the case for every nation. War has again returned to Europe with the invasion of Ukraine by Russia. And further away, there is a war in Gaza between Israel and Hammas. Peace has eluded the nations of the world, and other conflicts rage unnoticed that don't make it to our TV screens.

The Bible has a lot to say about peace. When Jesus was preparing his disciples for his imminent arrest and death, he spoke the following words to comfort them:

"Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid."

We may yearn for peace, but we need to play our part in it. Peace isn't a passive word but an active one. How do we become people of peace?

First of all, I think we need to pursue peace, in our families, in our neighbourhoods, communities and nation. Peace means laying aside our individual needs and working for the greater good of everyone else.

We can then promote peace, acting with both justice and compassion in what we say and do. And finally, we can pray for peace – for ourselves and others. May we choose to be people of peace today.

# THE MONTH OF MAY IN SUPERSTITIONS

As ever, many of the familiar traditions and superstitions we might associate with the Month of May, and especially May Day, seem to have come to us from much earlier Roman or Celtic spring, flower and fire festivals.

A very common belief held that to wash one's face in fresh dew on May morning would bring lasting beauty. It could also wash away pimples and freckles.

Dancing around a Maypole to mark the coming of the month was banned during Puritan times. The celebrations, including appointing a May King and May Queen, were viewed by Cromwell's Commonwealth as pagan. The Maypole and May celebrations were reinstated by Charles II at the restoration of the monarchy.

Bringing in the May was also popular; collecting flowers and blossoms such as Hawthorn sprigs and giving them to friends and family or decorating the house. Hawthorn, the May Tree, has its own collection of superstitions including the fear that bringing the blooms into the home is unlucky. It is also unlucky to damage a Hawthorn as they belong to the Faery Folk and is a gateway to their realm.

- · Can actively learn creatively and critically think


Thanks to the team at Festival Place we were able to react very quickly and collect donations for the disaster on Saturday 5th April.


