Phone and Continuity of Care Improvements

From Monday 12th May 2025, the practice is improving its phone system to cut waiting times and improve continuity of care. When phoning the practice on the CGH or Beggarwood phone numbers, you will be able to choose options to reach the right team. Every patient will be contacted through Medical Apps, text or a letter and be told who their named GP is and which team they work in. Please make a note this. Use this information to select the option for your personal admin team when you next call the practice. Where possible, appointments will be made with your named GP or one of their team. Patients have the right to ask for an appointment with a specific GP, but it is likely to be quicker accepting an available appointment within the team.

You will hear 8 options when you call:

- I. Prescription queries
- 2. Medical referrals
- 3. Medical reports
- 4. To let us know a patient has passed away
- 5. St Andrews / Yellow Team

- 6. Essex House / Orange Team
- 7. Beggarwood / Pink Team
- 8. Gillies / Blue, Green, or Purple Team For options 5–8 (appointments), you'll then choose
- Press I Urgent appointment
- Press 2 Routine appointment
- Press 3 General enquiries

Don't worry if you make a mistake which is likely to happen as we all get used to the new system. The person you speak to will help get you to the right team

Detecting Bowel Cancer early can save your life!

Dr Christine Glew, who works at Gillies Health Centre and also for the Wessex Cancer Alliance says:

"I'm working on a new project to help people access their bowel screening kits. Did you know if you have bowel cancer and it is picked up at screening, it is much more likely to be at the earlier stages and therefore more easily treated with much better outcomes and survival rates."

If you are aged between 50 and 74 you'll be invited to take part in bowel cancer screening every 2 years. Test Kits are sent to your home, for you to provide a small sample of your poo for testing. If you have not returned a sample or think your test is due and haven't received a kit simply ring 0800 707 6060 to request that a new kit is sent to you.

COUNCILLOR UPDATES

RECYCLING FACILITY: A new state-ofthe-art recycling facility for Hampshire has been given the go-ahead. It will be built in Eastleigh, and is expected to be operational by the end of 2027. The facility will allow us to recycle a wider range of household materials in our green bins, including more plastics, such as pots, tubs, trays, cartons and soft plastic film, as well as glass, metal, paper and cardboard. This addresses one of the requests that I pick up frequently: residents are keen to do more, but are frustrated by the current rules. The £50.5m project is a joint venture with Portsmouth and Southampton City Councils. The new approach aligns with the Government's Simpler Recycling guidance on residential kerbside recycling, which aims to reduce contamination by separating dry materials from other waste. This move will be important for us as the Borough Council plans to move onto fortnightly collections of our black bins.

ANTI-SOCIAL BEHAVIOUR: I have received comments about ASB on the tennis courts at the Community Centre, and I contacted the local police to see if they were aware. As is usually the case, they were. Our new PCSO has been given this issue to manage and is working with the local youth club and the neighbourhood watch co-ordinator. He is also planning on holding an ASB workshop at Brighton Hill school to stress the importance of behaving acceptably. The officers are conducting regular patrols and monitoring the situation. There are further steps that could be taken, but it is in everyone's interests for this to be sorted amicably.

ANTI-SOCIAL BEHAVIOUR, MECHANISED:

Sadly, the season of car and motorcycle meets is on us, and the A30 past Hatch Warren and Beggarwood is again being used as a race track. I have received correspondence from a resident who spotted people sitting at the side of the road taking pictures of the racers, Make no mistake, this is not a group of young people who should know better. This is organised and people travel miles to take part in, and watch, the irresponsible behaviour. I am taking this up again with the Police and

Crime Commissioner and will be asking if we can have speed cameras installed or, even better, speed and noise cameras.

COMPLAINTS ABOUT SURGERY PHONE WAITS: Having received some very adverse comments, I brought up at the Patient Participation Group complaints about phone wait times at the local surgeries. The management team was aware of need for improvement and reported that it was planning to introduce new procedures.

NEW SURGERY RECEPTION PROCEDURES: the start date for new procedures at Camrose, Gillies, Hackwood and Beggarwood surgeries was Monday 12th May, avoiding the Easter weekend and associated staff holidays. A communication exercise was implemented involving text messages to patients explaining the new processes. Patients have been assigned to colour-coded teams and the hope is that this will enable them to be routed to the most appropriate NHS professionals as quickly as possible. Please let me know your opinions on how it is working so that I can pass them on.

BUS SHELTERS: I have written to the Chief Executive of the Borough Council asking whether an anomaly can be corrected regarding bus shelters in this area. In Brighton Hill, Hatch Warren and Beggarwood we have shelters that are not used, because Stagecoach changed the routes of their services. Ironically, buses run on the other sides of the roads, where there are no shelters! I think there is room to move some of the shelters to locations where they could be useful. As always, the first task is to find who owns the problem and then to press for something to be done.

DOWN GRANGE: the Borough Council is planning to displace the pitch and putt facility from the Leisure Park to Down Grange. At first, people assumed that meant putting it on the Pack Lane side of the sports complex, but that is not the case. The field that the Council is minded to use is the one in front of the steak house, alongside the Winchester Road. Many people from Hatch Warren and Beggarwood use that green space for running, sports events, dog walking and simply enjoying nature. A considerable campaign is mounting against the idea, and a petition has been started.

A30 CLOSURES: recent accidents and closures of the A30 have shown how vulnerable our local roads are to anything

happening that is out of the ordinary. With 18,000 homes being planned for the west of Basingstoke. I have serious doubts about the existing roads' ability to cope with the traffic that will be generated. I have written to the County Officers referring to the recent accidents between the Brighton Hill and Kempshott roundabouts. The turning out of Beech Down is very difficult, with drivers wanting to turn right sometimes taking their lives in their hands. I fear that it will be totally unsuitable for increased volumes of traffic unless upgraded, and more traffic seems inevitable if the Borough Council goes ahead with proposals for siting the new golf facility there.

BUCKSKIN AND SOUTH HAM REGENERATION: I took part in a TV interview about the proposed regeneration of Buckskin and South Ham, which I believe has been badly handled to date. In my opinion, Sovereign Network Group has gone far too fast in publishing illustrative maps, without first answering many important questions. The maps make people fear that their homes may be demolished, or blighted for decades. For Hatch Warren and Beggarwood, I want to know how much extra traffic will be generated on the A30 and Brighton Hill roundabout, and how much additional pressure will be placed on the local doctors' surgeries. With other Councillors, I attended a meeting with Sovereign to air these matters, and a follow-up discussion is planned for 3rd June. when I hope to learn how (or if) they will respond to the points we made.

OLD DOWN WILDLIFE GROUP: I attended the annual meeting of this wildlife group, and thanked the volunteers for the work they do to maintain this important open space. Once again the question was raised about why Old Down does not have the protection of being a Local Nature Reserve, which I believe it should have. Beggarwood Park, opposite Old Down, has LNR status but the Borough Council repeatedly refuses to grant it to Old Down. This is a campaign that I will continue to support.

KEMPSHOTT LANE: I have been chasing Thames Water about the new drains they want to lay along Kempshott Lane. Their announcement of this project stopped Hampshire from proceeding with its planned resurfacing work last year - it would be futile to resurface the road only

for it to be dug up again a few months later. As far as I can make out, there is nothing scheduled by Thames Water yet, which is very frustrating. However, a second person told me that the project is with contractors for pricing, and once that is agreed, the work can be programmed. The time between quotation and work starting is anything from six to eight months.

BROADMERE ROAD ADOPTIONS: |

have been chasing for progress on getting these roads adopted. The holdup now is getting a document signed by a local landowner, agreeing to allow the County Council access to a soakaway that lies on its land. A Hampshire officer was assured that the matter was with the landowner's legal team, but at the time of writing she has not heard anything back, nor has she been informed that a signed agreement has been returned. I am frustrated that this important adoption, for which we have waited for so long, is being held up for months waiting for a single document to be signed.

NEW NURSERY: the new children's nursery on the 'Island' site at Beggarwood has opened. This location was originally intended for a new dental surgery, but, sadly, negotiations faltered. That is what I would have preferred to see. Nevertheless, the nursery will be an asset to the community as spaces are at a premium.

I hope you've all had a lovely month and enjoyed your bank holidays and sunshine!

I'd like to thank all the residents who attended our event at the Hatch Warren Community Centre in April; it was a huge success! We'd like to hold more social events in future for residents to come along to so do sign up for mailing list updates below if you'd like to know more about future dates.

This last month has seen a number of writing campaigns that we've helped to promote and gotten residents involved in. It's so important to have your say when changes are proposed to local services, or services are removed entirely, or planning applications are reviewed, and so on. I've always lived by what I was told when I was young - that if you didn't use your vote, you couldn't complain about the outcome - and I think that also applies to public consultations. Recent ones were the Motorway Service Station application at Junction 6, which would be horrendous for the environment, and the Hampshire County Council Future Services Consultation which included the proposed loss of the Newman Court elderly day care service. An unfortunate feature of cuts such as these is that they often have an unequal impact. Women are more likely to suffer with dementia and also to provide unpaid care for loved ones, and cuts to already inadequate social care services often overwhelmingly impact women, minoritised communities and the poorest and most vulnerable residents the hardest.

I was delighted to organise and attend a joint working party with residents and Housing Association staff to spruce up the Candover Court residents' garden. I have been talking to residents for some time now about how the area could be utilised and brightened up, so it was a pleasure to bring everyone together to make a good start on what I hope will be a cooperative initiative everyone can enjoy over the coming months and years.

I was delighted to visit the Council's Green Team drop in at Beggarwood Café and see the brilliant tips and advice available. I grabbed a handy sticker which can detect toilet leaks and a small egg timer for the shower which certain members of my family definitely need! Even small changes to everyday habits can conserve energy and save you money. The team will be at the Hatch Warren Summer Fair on 21st June, so do catch them then if you missed the Beggarwood Café date. I'll be at the Fair too, of course, and am looking forward to seeing lots of you there, so do pop over for a chat! I'm hoping that some of the Repair Café team will be able to make it along – our venture has continued to build and we only have a couple of management committee roles left to fill. We were pleased to pass on last month's Repair Café donations to the Mencap group who were sadly robbed of their tools and equipment last month.

I'm also looking forward to the Greener Basingstoke walk through town on Saturday 7th June, which goes from the train station at 3pm and finishes with a picnic in War Memorial Park – do look up the event on Facebook and come along if you're free. It's always a joyous and fun demonstration of people's interest in the environment, and a good way of showing public commitment to the issue to their elected officials.

Last week I sat on my first Licensing Sub-Committee hearing, which was a very interesting experience. If you ever want to understand more about how the process works when a licence of any kind is applied for, do drop me a line; I know it doesn't sound like the most interesting thing in the world but these things do impact people's lives, as is evidenced by the public submissions and interest they sometimes provoke!

I also have begun canvassing again now that our group is fully registered and toured Watling End and the surrounding houses last month to ensure that all residents were fully aware of the playpark consultation that was underway, and had opportunity to get involved. Having received letters from the Council on it, many residents had already taken part, but some were not aware – no communication method is foolproof! - so it was a good use of time to check in and make sure they got chance to have a say.

Finally, on communication, I celebrated my first year as your Councillor with a video round up of the things I did in year one. It was a good way to take stock of everything but, if you didn't see it, it's also a good overview of the sorts of things I'm here to help you with - you may be surprised at some of them! You can see it on our YouTube channel and Facebook feed, so do get in touch if it inspires you to reach out with an issue or an idea for our local area.

CLLR COLIN PHILLIMORE ELECTED AS MAYOR FOR 2025/26



Cllr Phillimore was first elected as a borough councillor in 2015, representing the Overton, Laverstoke and Freefolk ward which later became Whitchurch, Overton and Laverstoke.

He will represent the borough at events during the year while promoting his charity appeal which will be supporting the Whitchurch Community Swimming Pool and St Michael's Hospice.

Cllr Phillimore said: "I am really pleased to be the Mayor of Basingstoke and Deane for 2025/26. It is a serious role, steeped in history and I am honoured to be chosen to serve.

"Having lived in the area all of my life I have witnessed great changes, but my focus is, and always will be, the people in the communities that we serve. I am looking forward to getting out around the borough and meeting as many of them as possible during the year."

RIDING FOR THE DISABLED RECEIVES DONATION FROM ROYAL ARCH MASONS

A donation of £500 was made by the Oakley Chapter of Royal Arch Masons to the Riding For the Disabled at their premises in Dummer.

The cheque was presented by Grant Chivers, the recent head of this section of local Freemasons founded in Basingstoke in 1861, that operate from the Masonic Centre in Victoria Street, at the Top of Town. Keith Hall, a trustee of this local branch of RDA, with its full name of Wellington & Dummer Riding for the Disabled, commented:

"This contribution will be used to help meet our running costs, mostly feed for the ponies. We also need to replace some wood on the ramp used by wheelchairs. We do not have fixed fees for our riders. Our funding comes from voluntary contributions, fundraising activities, and we are grateful for donations, such as this one from Freemasons."

He added. "It would be good to see some more volunteers as we need as much

NEW WORLD RECORD

As previewed in our April edition, local runner Rebecca Reid succeeded in her attempt to set a new world record for running a marathon whilst fitted with a Subcutaneous Implantable Cardioverter Defibrillator (SICD). This is a medical device implanted under the skin to monitor for and treat dangerously fast or abnormal heart rhythms.

Two years ago, Rebecca collapsed on a training run, and her heart rate reached 283 beats per minute, which is lifethreatening. This was her second heart-related issue, and a doctor told her that her running days were over.

However, after an eight-hour procedure under general anaesthetic at the Royal Brompton hospital, and the fitting of the defibrillator, she took specialists' advice and resolved to get back into training, with this year's London marathon as her goal.

"I have had to change my whole approach to running", Rebecca reports. "I now keep a constant watch on my heart rate. This means I had to do even more training, to get myself as fit as I could. The objective was that the extra fitness would allow me to run whilst keeping my heart rate within what we call 'Zone 2'."

support as we can get to help with our lessons or helping with stable activities."

The stables at Wellington Riding are used on Thursdays for some activities while most are carried out at Dummer where the ponies are stabled on the land and facilities that are provided by owner Trish Willats.

The group champions Hippotherapy sessions at Dummer. This is a form of physical therapy that uses the natural gait and movement of a horse to provide riders with motor and sensory input thereby strengthening and stretching muscles and improving balance.





This year's London Marathon was run on a very hot day, and after 18 miles, Rebecca made the conscious decision to slow down as her heart rate was rising. Even so, she was able to finish in 3 hours and 37 minutes, which was 23 minutes faster than the previous world marathon record. Her achievement was confirmed by the Guinness Book of Records.

OLD DOWN WILDLIFE GROUP



It's that time of year when Old Down meadow looks truly amazing - so many different wildflowers, so many different colours. You may not realize how many different species of wild flowers are on the meadow. The Cowslip and Meadow Saxifrage show first and then come many other species such as the following: Oxeye

Daisy; Kidney Vetch; Common Vetch; Horseshoe Vetch; Wild Carrot; Orchids; Clustered Bellflower; Ragged Robin; Vipers Bugloss; Yellow Rattle; Bird's Foot Trefoil; Marjoram; Mallow; Field Scabious; Harebell; Meadow Cranesbill; Knappweed; Buttercup; Centuary; Salad Burnett; Mignonette. There is a wonderful plethora of species on the meadow making it a most wonderful and special area which we must all ensure is coveted and protected.

The work parties have started working through the meadow removing unwanted and spreading shrubs such as hawthorn and dogwood. These shrubs can spread so easily and overwhelm the wildflowers so do need to be removed. This year they seem to have really thrived and suckers have popped up all over the meadow, so there is quite a task ahead. It is good for insects, especially butterflies, to have some shrub dotted here and there but this year there is just too much.

Work Parties: We meet outside Old Down Hall every Thursday 10-12noon (but not in the rain!). We really do need new members and support - this is the way to keep Old Down as a beautiful green space for wildlife and people. You do not have to come every week. 

RESTAURANT REVIEW

THE FLIGHT DECK CAFÉ

Lasham Clubhouse, Lasham Gliding Society, The Avenue, Alton GU34 5SS

Following redevelopment this place was reopened last November so it was time we revisited as it was over two years since we were last here. The Flight Deck Café at the Lasham Gliding Society, which claims to be the largest gliding club in the world, although a members' club, is open to the public and has outside playground equipment for children.

Arriving at 12.45 pm the place was busy although we had a table for two with great vistas of the open airfield but being a windy and cloudy day there was not much activity with only one glider being winched into the air during our time here.

The menu is adequate for this relaxed dining establishment. It is open for breakfast, lunch and dinner seven days a week. We both chose scampi, skin on fries and salad which came with half a lemon and a small pot of tartare sauce. Madam opted for a Sanpellegrino Limonade, while I had a diet coke. There is a bar area tucked away but it was not in use during our visit.

They do not do desserts, so it was either cake or ice cream, with two Magnums being chosen. The total cost of £42 was acceptable, especially considering that on a more pleasant day there would be plenty of flying activity to see.

No doubt, during the summer, the large patio area with all new picnic tables equipped with large umbrellas will be very popular as gliders will be constantly being launched and landing. For the bravehearted it is possible to buy a flying experience which makes a different sort of birthday present.

Typical, isn't it that we had enjoyed plenty of days of sunshine recently, but, dear reader, this was the only day we had available before the final copy date for the Rabbiter magazine.





IT WAS THIRTY YEARS AGO TODAY

The eighth edition of the Rabbiter, dated September 1993, led on Meridian TV coming to the Community Centre to cover the making of its stained-glass window. Local residents were shown helping to create the new feature, which depicted the Community Association logo. It was designed by Steve Clark of Rainbow Stained Glass, based at the Viables Craft Centre.

A new planning application had been submitted to expand parking at the Doctors' Surgery, which was then based in Moorhams Avenue. Many people liked that location, in the heart of the community and close to the Community Centre.

There was an article introducing WPC Michaela Whatmore and WPC Sarah Ridler as the area beat officers for Hatch Warren and Brighton Hill. Having local officers was an approach that worked. It was sadly dropped but has been reintroduced recently.

An article by the then County Councillor, Brian Gurden, focussed on the opening of Children's World, with the hope that the planning row about a possible Blockbuster's Store was now at an end. He was concerned that Hatch Warren was still short of neighbourhood shops, and in need of a genuine Post Office and a public house.

Brian thought it was amazing (in a bad way) that a development of 1,900 houses with another 700 being planned could be built on a green field site without such important community assets. Brian's comments still resonate today, as more and more developments outstrip the infrastructure.

The then Local Plan had sites designated for a convenience store (that became the Co-op at Beggarwood), a sports barn (which never happened) and a place of worship (which also never happened – St Mark's School was used to host Immanuel Church instead). It seems that it is no trouble to plan and build houses, but not so easy to deliver planned facilities for the people who will live in them. The latest example is the intended dental surgery on the 'Island' site that never happened. A children's nursery has just opened there instead.

On 25th September, Immanuel with St Mark's Church (which was then using the community centre) was celebrating Harvest with a barn dance and supper. It was also saying goodbye to Marian Carter, the Parish Deacon, whom many people will remember with affection.

And finally ... the Community Association was planning its first birthday celebrations and thanked everyone associated with it. The major anniversary event — Fun for All the Family — was a Fete on 4th September: It was to be opened by "Cllr and Mrs Reid, accompanied by Mr. Blobby". Ah, memories!

SPIRITUALLY SPEAKING

Growing up I often heard adults in the older generation talking about 'Whitsuntide' at this time of year, and I had no idea what they meant by it! However, it was within their lifetime that this long-standing public holiday for Pentecost was effectively lost- which is why they talked about it.

One understanding of the word 'Whit' is that it was derived from the wearing of white garments for baptisms which often took place at Pentecost. Another is that it comes from the Anglo-Saxon word 'wit' meaning 'understanding' and reflects the belief that at Pentecost the Holy Spirit brought wisdom to the apostles as they began to share the good news of God's love seen through the life, death and resurrection of lesus.

But what is wisdom? And where do we find it? Because I'm certain that we still need it...

We often equate wisdom with experience, which can be a good measure. But is wisdom the same as knowledge or learning? Who might we describe as wise? What does a wisely lived life look like?

In the OldTestament, wisdom is personified as a woman, most prominently in the book of Proverbs. Wisdom is described as a hidden treasure 'more precious than rubies' to those who choose to live good lives and to help those in need. Wisdom speaks for herself in Chapter 8: 'Blessed are those who listen to me, watching daily at my doors, waiting at my doorway. For those who find me find life.' As we continue through the Bible, wisdom is made human in Jesus and then offered to each of us through the Holy Spirit... which brings us full circle back to Pentecost.

I imagine that we'll each have our own places to turn to find wisdom. For me, the example and advice of others, the guidance of scripture, reasoned thinking and my own past experience all play their part. I also trust God. I trust that God's loving presence is with me- not controlling me like a robot, but enabling me to make wise, loving choices, even when things are not going as I would like.

We so need wisdom in the world... and we especially need wise leaders. We hear a lot of waffle and spin and see a lot of grandstanding from world political leaders reported in the news, though I'm sure it's not the whole picture. I reflect on the fact that when God's presence became available to all people at Pentecost it was a message of love and hope that was to be shared with the world. Though it's true that the Church as an institution has messed things up sometimes and made it hard to see, it is still the same message of love and hope even now- for everyone, everywhere.

SOLSTICE AND MIDSUMMER

This month marks both the Summer Solstice and Midsummer Day. The summer Solstice on 21st June is the moment of the longest day, when the sun briefly appears to stand still – from the Latin sol for sun and sistere to stand still. Midsummer day is June 24th.

Both dates have been traditionally celebrated throughout Hampshire. A belief held that the veil between the worlds is thin at this time, so people were especially keen to protect themselves against the activities of the fairy folk. Bonfires were thought to protect against mischief, and jumping over them brought good fortune; a particularly high jump would predict the height of a good harvest to come. Flowers would be gathered and worn also as protection and celebration. The ashes of the midsummer bonfire were considered lucky and if scattered over the ground would promote good crops.

Professor Ronald Hutton, and acknowledged expert of folklore states:

"Midsummer was seen as a time when the normal laws of nature or divinity could be suspended, when spirits and fairies could contact humans, when humans could exceed the usual limitations of their world"

Midsummer was the time to collect herbs which would work especially well for healing. St John's Wort picked on the day would protect against fairy mischief, while a red rose also picked at midsummer could stay fresh until Christmas if stored in paper, and would act as a love charm.

CRIME PREVENTION UPDATE

Mobile phone theft and links to fraud

There has been an increase of reports of mobile phone theft, where offenders use distraction techniques to either see your passcode or gain access to your phone whilst unlocked. Offenders may work in groups or alone and often target people on a night out. The key element is to access the handset whilst active or observe the passcode being entered.

- Set strong screen-lock passwords or pin codes.
- Secure high-value apps like wallets and banking apps with separate passwords and enable biometric authentication.
- Remove password auto-fill for high value apps.
- Ensure manufacturer security updates are installed promptly and anti-theft features activated.
- Be aware of surroundings when using your phone in public.
- Don't hand over your phone to people you don't know.

Rise in QR Code 'Quishing' scams

Action Fraud received 1,386 reports of people scammed after using a fake QR code compared to just 100 in 2019. Contactless payment hotspots — like parking meters and restaurant menus — are common targets for criminals who replace a genuine QR code with a malicious one, which links to their 'fake website'. Fraudulent codes have also been spotted on parcels, in emails and on television. QR codes can be very useful, both online and in person. If you need to scan a QR code in person check for signs it has been tampered with, if online look out for phishing emails or rogue social media posts with QR codes. Check to preview address and if you are unsure do not visit the site. It may be safer to visit the genuine website using your browser.

British Transport Police text service

The 61016 text service offers the travelling public a means to contact BTP directly and discreetly, in order to report non-emergency crime when using the rail network, you can report:

- An incident that has already happened
- Issues affecting your rail journey or your local station


The children have been bringing in pictures of their families, pets, places they like to visit and their homes. It has been lovely to hear the children share their family stories and talk about where they live.


