#### CRIME PREVENTION UPDATE

#### Dispose of your waste responsibly to avoid a fine

Everyone has a legal 'duty of care' to ensure their household or business waste is disposed of correctly. You can be prosecuted even if your waste is fly tipped by someone you have paid to take it away. To dispose of items not collected by your household refuse and recycling collections, you could:

- Book an appointment at one of Hampshire County Council's waste recycling centres and take your waste there.
- Pay an approved licensed waste carrier and sign a waste transfer note handing over responsibility to them.
- If you have something to dispose of, but you're not sure where to take it, check out Hampshire County Council's waste finder.

#### Campaign: "See beyond the silence"

Developed by Hampshire County Council, in partnership with the Hampshire Domestic Abuse Partnership and the Hampshire Authentic Voice Panel, this campaign urges adults to pause, look closer, and act.

Children experiencing domestic abuse might:

- · Seem anxious, withdrawn or unusually aggressive
- · Become suddenly fearful or overly compliant
- Struggle with sleep or concentration
- Show signs of guilt or self-blame

These are often a child's way of asking for help without saying a word. If something doesn't feel right, trust your instincts. Your concern could be the first step toward safety for a child.

#### COUNCILLOR UPDATES

A30 ROAD WORKS: I predict heavier traffic through Hatch Warren and Beggarwood overnight from 27th August to 19th September. The A30 between the Kempshott Roundabout and the Hatch Warren Roundabout will close to allow the road to be resurfaced. This is not a 'tar and chippings' surface dressing but a removal of the top layer of the road and construction of a new asphalt surface. It is is needed, in my opinion, because of the severe deterioration of this stretch of road, contributed to by the poor quality of reinstatements made by utility companies who dug it up previously. We have seen 'ribbon potholes' developing along the lines of their work.

KEMPSHOTT LANE CLOSURE: Kempshott Lane was closed during August to allow for the renewal of pipes by Southern Gas Networks. I am now trying to find out whether this is the work (and all of it) that caused the resurfacing of this busy road to be delayed: if it is, I shall be pressing for the resurfacing of Kempshott Lane to be re-programmed as soon as possible.

**NEW PATH REQUEST:** At a meeting about improving travel around western Basingstoke, especially for cyclists and pedestrians, I put in a plea for a path on the Holly Blue side of the A30 towards the motorcycle shop. The lack of a path here seems an anomaly that should be corrected.

**NEW SCHOOL:** The new school at Hounsome Fields is scheduled to open in a few days time to year R pupils. Together with my colleague, Cllr Juliet Henderson, we are pressing for a date on which the Toucan crossing on the A30 will be provided. This will become increasingly important as the school fills up.

**NEWMAN COURT ADULT CARE:** I took part in a review of the Newman Court and Chesil Lodge day care centres and was impressed by the services they offer. I recommended to Cabinet that they be kept open, under external management. Moving to this new model should make it possible to save money and to retain a much valued service. I am pleased that the Cabinet agreed this way forward.

ANAEROBIC DIGESTER: At a liaison group meeting in July we discussed reports from local residents of continuing odour leaks. The operators took the complaints seriously but did not have a ready explanation. Discussions concentrated on the occasions when gas might be vented or flared. There was a renewed commitment to try to pin the complaints down to specific events. As part of the maintenance of the Basingstoke AD facility, both digestate cooling tanks were emptied on 6th and 7th August as part of a maintenance process known as 'degritting'. This involved temporarily isolating the tanks, removing panels from them and extracting all grits / inert material to clear them.

**FOOD WASTE COLLECTIONS:** At the AD meeting, I asked about the impact of the Borough Council's planned introduction of doorstep food waste collections, given that the operators are hoping to win work associated with this. I was assured that it

will not cause any increase in volumes being processed at the Basingstoke Digester. My concern is that I do not want to see any increase in HGV traffic through Hatch Warren.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT REORGANISATION: Hampshire County Council has put forward a proposal for four unitary authorities in the Hampshire and Isle of Wight area. The solution is designed to balance financial resilience, service quality, and local identity. The suggested configuration includes a North and Mid Hampshire authority (covering Basingstoke and Deane, Hart, Rushmoor, Winchester and East Hampshire), a South-West authority (including Southampton, Eastleigh, Test Valley, and New Forest) and a South-East authority (encompassing Portsmouth, Fareham, Gosport, and Havant), leaving the Isle of Wight as a standalone unitary. The Borough Council is putting forward an alternative solution. The government will decide.

ANPR CAMERAS AT ASDA: I am delighted to see Automatic Number Plate Recognition cameras installed at the ASDA car park. This is to discourage its use by car meets. After I obtained ANPR restrictions at Sainsbury's and persuaded the management company to lock the gates to the LIDL car park, the meets started to use ASDA more often. But ANPR is only a first stage in bearing down on the antisocial behaviour associated with these events. The second stage must be for the Police to stop drivers using our local roads as race tracks. Barely a night goes by without Hatch Warren and Beggarwood suffering the antisocial noise deliberately created by people who should know better.

LOCAL SURGERIES: I attended the most recent meeting of the Patient Participation Group with the managers of the Camrose, Gillies, Hackwood and Beggarwood surgeries. They reported positive news: two new (part time) GPs have been recruited and four new receptionists, which brings the team up to full strength. The managers also reported that they had held two successful 'Total Triage' pilot days, trying out new procedures for assessing patient contacts and routing them to the right professionals. A final one was held in August. The plan is to roll out the new procedures in all surgeries this month, before the usual winter pressures.

**CQC INSPECTION:** The Care Quality Commission has published its findings following a recent inspection of the Camrose, Gillies, Hackwood and Beggarwood surgeries. Overall the practice rating remains good, but improvement is required for 'responsiveness'. The report can be viewed online: AP8468 - Care Quality Commission

COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION ANNUAL MEETING: I attended this important meeting in July. The chairman, Nick Elms, reported a year of vibrant activity for the Association, with a full programme of activities for all ages including the high-profile Fireworks display and the Summer Fair. Youth engagement remains a cornerstone of the Association's mission, with the Warren Youth Club thriving and the LINK2 project providing help to young people with learning disabilities. He was also pleased to report a dramatic turnaround in the financial health of the Association: a projected deficit of over £31,000 last year had been turned into a surplus of over £6,000. The meeting passed a vote of thanks to the committee and the staff.

**DANGEROUS PARKING:** Following a complaint, I have reported the prevalence of dangerous parking in Centurion Way, by its junction with Woodbury Road, usually at school run times. The



poor parking forces people onto the wrong side of the road right by the junction, and this is an accident waiting to happen.

**E-SCOOTERS:** the Police have been active across Basingstoke lately in bearing down on the use of electric scooters, which are, at the present time, not legal in public areas. One of their target locations has been Hatch Warren. Owners are advised that the scooters can be confiscated if they are used on roads or pavements.

DISPERSAL ORDER: officers from the South/West Neighbourhood Policing Team carried out patrols to enforce a Section 34 Dispersal Order which was put in place to tackle Anti-Social Behaviour in the Hatch Warren and Beggarwood areas. They dispersed large groups of youths who were behaving antisocially at the Hatch Warren Community Centre and the Hatch Warren Retail Park. Some of those who were identified to be causing issues have had follow up visits with their parents. Others have been banned by local businesses due to their behaviours.

**WAREHOUSES:** the Borough Council has published its planning decision notice, accepting the plans for warehouses near Junction 7, which I opposed. Local pressure group CAGE has raised concerns that there seems to be no mention of directing HGV traffic along the M3. This is being investigated.

Dear HW&B residents – I hope you all had lovely summers!

Firstly – a really important date for your diary this month. Baton of Hope, the UK's largest-ever suicide prevention initiative, is coming to Basingstoke on Thursday 25th September. The Baton of Hope Tour 2025 will take in dozens of cities and towns throughout the UK, and the Basingstoke stop will comprise an entire day of the Baton being passed between bearers on a meaningfully designed journey with speakers, performances, arts and events, information, education and support along the way – all with the aim of ensuring that suicide is as rare as possible. Inclusion Education have done an incredible job of organising this massive day and it would be wonderful to have as many people as possible come along to show support for a vital cause. Another one for your calendar is the fourth annual Men's Event we are holding on Saturday 13th September from 11am to 1pm at the Holly Blue pub. I started organising these sessions for people to hear and discuss how gender inequality also negatively impacts men, and we have had great feedback over the years about the speakers we've heard from on myriad elements of the topic, and the follow up discussions on how everyone is hurt

by societal inequality and why bringing an equality lens to policy making benefits us all. You can find out more on the channels below or by signing up to my resident newsletter; the event is free and open to everyone – men and women alike. I hope to see some of you there, and with any luck we'll get good weather and can enjoy the pub garden!

Final date to note – you may remember that I wrote about requesting a public drop-in event for the ward with Council officers to explain the Biodiversity Improvement Zone (or BIZ) programme. Although we couldn't make it happen at the beginning of the summer as I would've liked, there's a provisional date of Saturday 27th September to come and learn more about the benefits to local flora and fauna, and to put any questions and ideas to the Officers.

I had a couple of enjoyable and very valuable days out to see grassroots work in the community. I rode along with a member of the Council's Play Space team to see their checking and maintenance work on the Borough parks and more, and spent time with the ward Police Community Support Officer to see and discuss local issues and how they're dealt with. Both were really useful sessions and I'm grateful to our Officer and the PCSO for their time and insight.

I went to Luke Murphy MP's Hatch Warren Coffee and Chat session and met with him again the following week to raise local issues of concern on behalf of residents. We spoke about a number of issues including school parking, car meets and GP surgeries.

I was delighted to go along to the Council's Limitless Sports and Wellbeing event; it was a spectacular day of biking and parkour displays, climbing, axe-throwing and more! It was great to see so many families out in War Memorial Park trying new ways of finding community and keeping fit.

There is currently an open consultation to get your views on local play areas — visit www.basingstoke.gov.uk/playareas to give your opinions and experiences on what play areas you use and what you'd like to see in the area.

The Council is now delivering thousands of food waste caddies across the Borough as we get set for the start of food waste collections from October. Each household will receive a grey indoor caddy, a green outdoor caddy, a roll of liners and an instruction leaflet, and you can find out more on www.basingstoke. gov.uk/food-waste.

And I was privileged to be asked to formally open the new Kids Inc nursery in Beggarwood with a ribbon cutting. It was a lovely afternoon with food, drink, a petting zoo and lots of families who already enjoy the bright and caring setting. The pre-school places they provide are sorely needed and I have no doubt their capacity will rise quickly as they settle into the neighbourhood.

I'm going to switch things up a little for my next 'Ask Me Anything' Councillor Surgery on Tuesday 9th September; this one will be held online with ten-minute sessions available for those who cannot attend an in-person surgery to come with their questions, issues and ideas. #### System Improvements in place and planned

The practice is moving very quickly, but in a very controlled way to improve its systems. It would not be sensible to change all processes at once.

There is now only one Phone number in use for any of the four surgeries 01256 479747. With an improved switchboard system and with 4 staff vacancies filled call waits are now down to 11 minutes on average, which is a huge improvement. The 'Pharmacy team' call takers are most pressed with calls around 10 am so if you can avoid that time, you'll get through quicker with less pressure on the system.

**Appointments** - Urgent matters are being dealt with faster, but for less urgent matters appointments are not always available. We know that requests for appointments are greater than the number of appointments available, but GP staffing levels are fixed and staffing is in line with NHS levels.

To make more appointments available to those who need to see a GP, the practice has run two pilot days of a new **Doctor led Triage system.** This relies on patients providing a summary of their need for an appointment online, at reception desk or by phone. This is then passed to the Triage Doctor who allocates the most appropriate resource for the patients' need. The results of these tests were very promising, with many enquiries dealt with immediately by the triage doctor without the need for an appointment, or routed to more appropriate clinicians, freeing up appointments for those who need them.

Simple matters can often be dealt with through the use of the online system. Even when triage is closed nurses appointments and admin matters can still be dealt with through the Dr IQ Evergreen app. There will be further testing of the new triage system and then it will be explained to patients and launched at the end of the summer.

#### KEMPSHOTT CONSERVATION GROUP

**Orchid update.** "It's been a strange year" is a common enough riposte from gardeners or anyone with an eye to the weather and nature and this year has been no exception. With a wet early spring and a dry and warm late spring, this year has played havoc with nature with some plants flowering two or three weeks earlier than normal. However, the rains of early June have helped to bring things back into "sync". Our Pyramidal Orchids in Down Grange Meadow started a week later than usual but orchids in general are back to normal.

In July for the first time, we used "clickers" to help count the Orchids. We were astounded to record almost 700 underneath the patch of Rosebay Willowherb. What a show!

## **Lookout gardeners!**Welsh Cafers (Hoplia

Philanthus) are a widespread

but uncommon beetle. We have, however, recently captured specimens at bug hunts in Kempshott and Dummer. While we think they are interesting, gardeners may

take a different view as the larvae of these beetles are a pest in lawns. The adults are, however, valuable in processing compost.

It's harvest time. Our seed collecting parties are now taking place. This is a fun activity where families can also participate. It does involve bending, so each volunteer will know their own limits. It's also a gateway into learning more about ecology and the reasons we maintain our conservation sites the way we do.

Have you looked at the oak trees this year? Perhaps you have noticed some very odd looking knobbly sticky lumps developing on some oak trees. Not all oak trees have these lumps but those that do look as though the tree has been attacked by a disease or nasty fungus. Actually

these are acorn galls created by the knopper gall wasp, a miniscule wasp (looks like a very tiny black fly). This wasp is a fairly new arrival to our shores becoming established in the 1960s. The gall starts off as a yellowish-green sticky ridged hard lump that is like a helmet spreading over and enveloping the developing acorn. The gall turns to brown in the autumn. The tiny wasp lays its egg in the developing acorn and the larva secretes chemicals that induce the formation of a gall around the acorn. The galls do not damage or threaten the oak trees but their presence does reduce the number of mature acorns (not so great for squirrels!). Some years the knopper gall wasp is fairly scarce but not so this year. The galls of the knopper gall wasp are found mainly on our native English oak. Nature never fails to surprise and amaze.

You might also spot the oak apple gall which is a buffish brown ball with a rough surface created by another tiny wasp — the oak apple gall wasp. This gall develops around an oak bud (not the acorn) and rests on oak twigs.

Here are some photos – the first showing healthy unaffected acorns, the last oak apple galls.





Green Fingers, supports 40 adults each week with learning disabilities through horticultural and woodworking activities, has long relied on community goodwill.





As I sit and type this, I am revelling in the thought that in just under a weeks' time I will be sitting in my holiday cottage garden with a good book and an even better ale. Without sounding miserable, though, the downsides of holidays is that they end and then it's back to the grind.

And that can hit particularly large, if your life is currently not particularly easy, like many of us. I have to say that I felt particularly in need of a break this summer, with a very close friend of mine passing away in March, coupled with the usual rubbish that life can throw up just when you don't need it.

It's at this point that say "How the heck can Christianity help me when life gets hard? Isn't it all airy-fairy nonsense?

According to the Bible, Christianity is in fact very much about the life we have on earth. Christians believe that whilst Jesus was the Son of God, he lived on earth as a human being. Right from birth, he was poor. For many years he was a carpenter, not a well-paid occupation.

As a travelling preacher he had no income and no home. He often faced opposition both verbal and physical. He was frequently misunderstood, even and maybe especially by those closest to him. In the end he was betrayed, tortured and died a violent death.

Now Christians believe that Jesus rose from the dead and that he can be a real and comforting presence in our lives today. This Jesus then is someone who understands what we are going through, grief, poverty, despair, being let down.

I was working in Bournemouth the day I found out that my mate had died. I was driving home, feeling as though grief was sitting in the car behind me. I can vaguely remember praying something like "Jesus, I'm lost". Gradually I felt this feeling, like someone was saying "I know, I get it". The grief was clearly still there but it felt like someone else was there too, sharing the journey. Now you can say that I was imagining this but, something like this has happened many times in my life. That sense of a presence and one that understands and gets it.

So, if the holiday's over and the days that stretch ahead feel grey and mundane, if not dark and unpleasant, I genuinely believe that Jesus understands and he is with us.

#### IT WAS THIRTY YEARS AGO TODAY

The November 1993 issue of the Rabbiter led with an appeal for used postage stamps, British or foreign, which would be sold and the money raised used to support scouting and guiding in Eastern Europe. This was in the lead-up to Christmas, and thirty years ago, the sending of Christmas cards was still very much a thing. Today, that tradition is in decline, driven by the costs of the stamps and the availability of on-line alternatives. How things change!

The Community Association was planning its first firework party and disco for 6th November, 1993. This was a brave decision for the Association, as displays of this sort are very expensive and always at the mercy of the weather. Thankfully, it was a great success and the fireworks display has become an annual treat; a tradition that our area has kept alive. This year's show is on 1st November, and is one of the major events in the Community Association's calendar. Many fireworks displays, including the Mayor's in the War Memorial Park, have fallen by the wayside in recent years, but the Hatch Warren field continues to host one of the best shows in the region.

In 1993, our local Councillors had held a public meeting in the Community Centre to discuss traffic safety. Summing up, the then Councillor Peter Markham, said that there were two main concerns: safety and the quality of life. I expect those sentiments still resonate today.

A new traffic island was to be built in Long Cross Lane to make it safer to cross and to stop cars parking on the brow of the hill. This feature had to repaired recently as the surface had dropped, making for a very uncomfortable ride. There is still a lot of parking on Long Cross Lane and sometimes it is very difficult for vehicles to pass.

There were also to be improvements in Woodbury Road, including a new island and clearer speed limit signs. But the best thing residents could do was to keep the speed limits themselves – a truth that still applies today.

And here's some nostalgia ... thirty years ago, one of the adverts was for the Hatch Warren doctors' surgery in Moorhams Avenue next to the Community Centre, and for the pharmacy next to Sainsbury's. I recall that surgery as being much loved, and the service was good. The pharmacy was popular too. It moved into the Sainsbury's store in later years but then closed.

The local surgery now is at Beggarwood and is part of the Camrose, Gillies, Hackwood and Beggarwood group. It has been suffering from access problems, which the management team is trying to address. Bigger is not always better, I'm afraid.



#### **MICHAELMAS**

The feast of St Michael, or Michaelmas, falls each year on 29th September. A Christian feast day and one of the four quarter days celebrated during the year, it traditionally marked harvest and the end of summer, and the beginning of Autumn.

A goose was considered a suitable meal for Michaelmas, and legend has it that Elizabeth I was eating goose when she heard of the defeat of the Armada. It was said that she decreed that goose should be eaten every Michaelmas henceforth.

In academic and legal institutions the term between September and Christmas is known as the Michaelmas term. The autumn flowering Aster, brightening gardens as other flowers fade, is affectionately called the Michaelmas Daisy.

The archangel Michael was venerated as the leader of the army of God, defeating Satan and expelling him from heaven. In folklore, Satan was said to have landed in a bramble bush as he fell from the skies. Cursing the brambles he was said to have spat and peed on them. This led to the belief that blackberries should never be picked after Michaelmas. Michael is also frequently depicted slaying a serpent, or dragon.

In Basingstoke, St Michael's church is the parish church of the town, and St Michael was adopted as Basingstoke's patron saint. In his guise as dragon slayer, he appears on the town crest everywhere, as well as on the frieze above the Willis Museum.

## DAVE'S NATURE SPOT

This is my first 'report' and I hope to be able to do this every month. My idea is just to give you a little bit of information on a particular nature matter – insects or plants or mammals.

This month is when we see the last of the summer butterflies – there will be just a few species about during the autumn. In particular, look out for the Clouded Yellow and Red Admiral.



The Clouded Yellow is a migrant and often found flying on chalk downland. It has been seen on both Beggarwood and Old Down on a few occasions. An excellent place to see them is Stockbridge Down where they can often be seen dashing across the downland. It is an unmistakeable vibrant yellow so you will know it when you see it. They make their long journey from North Africa and

Southern Europe to the UK from May to October. It is doubtful that they are strong enough to overwinter in the UK but with climate change it may become possible. I consider it a bonus day if I encounter one.

The Red Admiral is another large colourful migrant that arrives from North Africa and Southern Europe in spring and signs are that some overwinter here. It is often seen on the wing as early in the year as March and as late as November. They can often be seen feeding on Buddleia flowers and in autumn will feed on ivy flowers and rotten fruit.

These options offer stability and the opportunity to build a brighter future. Our wellbeing services and counselling give any young person the tools to overcome challenges and thrive.



The Sleep Out is your chance to be part of that change. Participants swap their bed for a sleeping bag for one night, raising funds and awareness to ensure these services remain available to every young person who needs them. The event will feature live music, inspiring stories from young people who have been supported by Step by Step, and a warm sense of community.

#### Notes from the kitchen

#### Time to preserve



September is the beginning of the 'squirrelling' season. It is the time when the crops are ready and the serious tasks of preserving for the winter can begin. My freezer is already stuffed with fruit for making pies and crumbles - plums, greengages, blackberries and apples. The sweetcorn is ready to be picked. Tomatoes will be used for making ketchup and sauces for adding to a ragu or topping on a pizza etc. Homemade tomato ketchup is easy and tastes so much better than those that come in bottles from the supermarket - and does not include any preservatives! Apple chutney is a winter staple – add it to cheese sandwiches, serve with cold meat and it is good as a side with a curry or chilli! Our quince tree is loaded with fruit which will be used to make membrillo - a Spanish speciality served with cheese. The pumpkin and squash are ripening for adding to soups, roasted or made into pumpkin pie. If you need some inspiration for making preserves follow @the\_pam\_the\_jam on Instagram. Pam has written two books on the subject which are both very good - Preserves by Pam Corbin (River Cottage Handbook No.2) and Pam the Jam – The Book of Preserves.

I have been making lots of vegetable soup using courgettes, carrots, onions, tomatoes etc. from the allotment. This is stored in the freezer for warming lunches on cold days and will remind me of the bounty grown on my allotment.



#### **Tomato Ketchup**

3kg ripe tomatoes, sliced

225g granulated sugar

300ml spiced vinegar (malt vinegar works well too)

Pinch of cayenne pepper and of paprika pepper

5ml salt

Cook the tomatoes in a preserving pan (or a very large pan) until reduced to a pulp and quite thick. Stir frequently.

Ideally press through a sieve to remove skin and pips. If you don't mind the pips in your sauce, blitz with a hand held blender until smooth.

Return to pan with the other ingredients and simmer until the mixture thickens. Make sure the sugar is dissolved completely and stir frequently. Pour into warm, sterilised jars and seal. Should keep for about three months and once open store in fridge. If you intend to store longer, sterilise the bottles when filled.




