#### **Winter Fuel Payment Scams**

We are receiving an increasingly high number of reports from residents who have been contacted, often via a text message, by someone claiming to be gathering information to enable them to receive a Winter Fuel Payment. There is no need for you to provide any information, the payment is automatic, and the DWP know if you are eligible or not based on their records.

Child exploitation is when individuals or groups coerce, manipulate or deceive a child into doing what they want in return for something the child wants or needs.

#### Who called me?

Every day, people across the UK get calls from unknown numbers, and many of these turn out to be scams. National Trading Standards are promoting Phonely, the free reverse phone lookup tool helping you find out who's behind those mystery calls.

In July 2025, the community reported thousands of suspicious numbers, helping everyone stay safer. They also add these reported numbers to a blacklist, so all their clients are protected from known scam calls.

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#### COUNCILLOR UPDATES

CHECK YOUR COUNCIL TAX BANDS! I am delighted to start with a good news story. Some months ago a constituent phoned me to enquire whether her home was in the correct Council Tax band. She didn't use a computer, so during the course of the phone call I found the website and, on her behalf, filled in a form requesting a review. To cut a (very) long story short, I heard from her in September that her house has been re-banded downwards, which will have a significant impact on her monthly budget and deliver a back-dated rebate. So, if you feel that your home may be in the wrong band, it is worth checking!

ROAD WORKS ON KEMPSHOTT HILL: the overnight resurfacing of the A30 has progressed well and should be complete by the time you read this. The old road surface has been lifted and a completely new layer of tarmac has been laid. There was some noise overnight when the old surface was being removed but I received no complaints and, thankfully, the really hot weather had passed. In fact, work had to be delayed because of the torrential rain. I am delighted to see this work completed: the old road had been badly scarred by repeated access by utility companies. I hope that it will be allowed to stay unspoilt for a long time.

**SPEED LIMIT CHANGE:** the County Council, as Highways Authority, is considering a 40mph speed limit on the A30 from the Hatch Warren roundabout, near Sainsbury's, to the new Hounsome Fields roundabout. This reflects the fact that the area has changed from a rural setting to an urban one, with extra junctions, a school and a planned Toucan Crossing. I have been consulted on this and am minded to support the move.

DOWN GRANGE PITCH 'N' PUTT PROPOSAL: I attended the Borough Council's drop-in session regarding the possible re-siting of the nine-hole Par 3 Golf Course from the Leisure Park to the field in front of Down Grange House (the steak house restaurant). They present it as a replacement facility but it isn't - it is an exercise of squeezing a quart into a pint pot. I found the proposal deeply flawed, and feel that the Council has not done its homework properly. I am particularly concerned about the traffic impacts, on which they have not asked for pre-application advice from the Highways Authority. I was surprised to learn that they plan to have access off Pack Lane (but how will they stop drivers coming in from the A30?). I also felt that they were indistinct on how they might protect traffic on the A30 from mis-hit golf balls and what damage any extra screening might do to the existing tree-line.

**SECONDARY SCHOOL PLACES:** the window for applying for secondary school places will close on 31st October. This is for children moving from year 6 up to year 7 in September 2026. To improve your chances of getting a place at a preferred school, remember to name three schools on your application. Some parents have reported to me in the past that they only stated one preference, hoping that that would increase their chances of getting their first choice school, and then ended up with the school they least wanted. If I can help, please get in touch.

**LOCAL GOVERNMENT REORGANISATION:** the County Council was meeting on 24th September to consider its final proposals for LGR. The Cabinet was expected to confirm

Hampshire's submission on 26th September. Hampshire's current proposal is to create three new unitary authorities on the mainland, plus the Isle of Wight. The Borough Council is proposing four, plus the Isle of Wight. The government will decide. If a reorganisation goes through, Hampshire County Council and Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council will both cease to exist, to be replaced by a unitary authority that merges the responsibilities of both 'tiers'.

**PATIENT PARTICIPATION GROUP:** I have attended meetings of the PPG including one with the management team of the Camrose, Gillies, Hackwood and Beggarwood surgeries. They reported that, following steady progress on reducing call waiting times, they had had a setback over the summer caused by a high level of absenteeism among the reception staff. The positive news is that they were implementing a new 'Total Triage System' in September, which three pilot runs indicated will direct patients to the right advisors more quickly and speed up the processing of calls. This involves a GP reviewing all contacts and deciding how best the surgery should respond.

**NEW DRAFT LOCAL PLAN (I):** I have concerns about some significant changes that the Borough Council is including in its emerging draft local plan, and how they could impact on Hatch Warren and Beggarwood. Firstly, it has included a 2,500 home development in the Cliddesden area. That sounds remote, but one of the access points is proposed to be the Wood Lane roundabout under the M3. That means extra traffic along Cliddesden Lane (past the Portsmouth Arms), Brighton Way (past ASDA) and Hatch Warren Way (towards Viables). I am concerned at the thought of more cars using Hatch Warren and Beggarwood as a short-cut to the M3.

**NEW DRAFT LOCAL PLAN (2):** the second proposal that will impact on our area is an increase in the number of homes in the Popham Airfield site, which the Council now calls 'Popham Garden Village'. This was originally designated for some 3,000 properties but is now proposed for 4,250 homes, with 1,800 in the plan period. Given that this is a remote area, its residents will need to travel into Basingstoke for employment, shopping or leisure opportunities, which will inevitably have an impact on traffic past Hatch Warren and Beggarwood. The Council is not proposing any new roads, so the extra load will fall onto the A30 corridor. I believe that Basingstoke needs a new western bypass.

**PAVEMENT PARKING:** one of Basingstoke's PCSOs, Dom Collins, has published a plea for drivers not to park on pavements. During recent patrols in Beggarwood (but this applies all over the town) PCSO Collins observed cars parked in ways that could block emergency vehicles or force pedestrians into the road. This could cause delays in life-threatening situations and create difficulties for people with wheelchairs, pushchairs or mobility aids.

KEYLESS CARS: Local Police are urging owners of cars with keyless access to take precautions against theft. There have been many reports of such crimes in our area, with cars being stolen from driveways. In each case, entry was not forced and Police believe that access was gained through 'relay methods'. where thieves connect to keys that are inside the house, using a device that tricks the car into unlocking and starting up. It only takes a couple of minutes and often the owners have no idea of what is happening outside. Signal blocking pouches, also known as Faraday Bags, are widely available and can help to keep your car secure.

**BACK TO SCHOOL:** time seems to have flown by, and the new school term has started. Parents of new pupils at St Mark's may like to know that the school encourages them to use the Community Centre car park and take the short walk across Woodbury Road, where there is a school crossing patrol. This will help to prevent congestion in Danebury Road in 'school run' times.

**FOOD WASTE RECYCLING:** 'kitchen caddies' and food waste recycling tubs have been delivered in the Hatch Warren and Beggarwood areas for the new kerbside collection service that starts in October. Following its introduction, the Borough Council is planning to change the weekly collection of black bins to fortnightly - black bin one week, green bin the next.

It was brilliant to build on our similar event last year with more attendees and nicer weather, and to see the mix of generations enjoy the singing and stories together in the open air! I hope to make this a yearly summer staple and perhaps add a Christmas edition in this year as well, so watch this space for more news.

The Beggarwood Café community lunches continue on the first

Wednesday of every month from midday to I pm with volunteers and Dashwood Manor staff pitching in with serving and providing delicious homemade quiche. It's gotten very busy in the last year but there's always room for more people so do visit if you haven't already. I was delighted to visit residents of The Crofts in their annual summer festival, which has been going for thirty years! Neighbours enjoyed music, games and drinks in the (mostly!) sunshine and it was so lovely to see what a community can achieve when coming together to pitch in. If this is something that you feel your own street or corner of HW&B would like to do, please feel free to get in touch for a chat and I can assist with contacts for the relevant safety needs and admin. Well done to The Crofts Committee for their continued efforts to keep the neighbourhood spirit going!

The Hatch Warren Repair Café continues to grow so do bring your household items for fixing for free by our volunteer team every first Saturday of the month from 10am to 1pm, with a cuppa and

homemade cake thrown in. And if you fancy finding some community and picking up some new skills, why not considering volunteering with us? PLEASE NOTE – we will not be running the café in November due to the Hatch Warren Fireworks Extravaganza, but I look forward to seeing you and you families there if you plan to attend!

Thank you to Island View residents for welcoming me to their weekly coffee morning and discussing their thoughts and local issues with me, and big thanks also go out to those who attended our Men's Event last weekend to hear about and discuss the ways men and boys are negatively impacted by gender and other types of societal inequality, and why we want to bring an equality lens to policy making for everyone's benefit.

I attended the Council's drop-in evening on the proposed Down Grange 'pitch and putt' to learn more about the plans and talk to residents who have concerns. I'm aware from recent discussions on doorsteps while canvassing that this is an issue many of you have concerns about, and I've also responded to those of you who have emailed me with your thoughts. As one of your local Councillors it's vital for me to take everyone's views on board in cases like this, and I have been feeding back all thoughts I receive to the Cabinet member in charge of the project. As a reserve member of the Development Control Committee, it is possible that I may be part of the group of Councillors that makes a judgement on the project when it goes before them, and it is not therefore appropriate for me to take a definitive, pre-judged stand on an application we have not yet seen. But I will be looking carefully at the planning application when it is eventually submitted to evaluate whether residents' thoughts and concerns have been properly considered and mitigated, and weigh up all pro and con factors to the project.

Most recently, I was delighted to attend the Oakley Stitchers launch of their new pop-up shop which will be at the Wote Street Club in town every Monday between 9:30am and 4:30pm. #### Doctor-led total triage launches on September 22nd!

To reduce disruption, extra funding has been sourced from Hampshire Integrated Care Board for extra staff including locum doctors for six weeks to help smooth the changeover process and increase appointment availability.

Every patient that contacts the practice will be triaged before an appointment is arranged. A doctor will carry out the screening, enabling many issues to be dealt with immediately, Urgent cases will be spotted earlier, and appointments booked or a patient will be directed to the service that is most appropriate for the patient's needs.

Trial days have been held and it was found the system provided more efficient and faster treatment for some patients whilst freeing up appointments for patients with less urgent needs. Unlike some other practices that are using AI systems, a real person will continue to answer the phone and carry out the triage process. The change to total triage across the nation is causing short term disruption before an expected longer term benefit. The NHS is also enabling more direct access routes to specialist services to take the pressure off GP services.

#### Phone issues reported and resolved

At the end of the August there was a sudden lack of staff in the reception team that answer phone calls, due to many staff becoming sick during peak holiday time. Call waits went back up to over an hour in some cases and disrupted services. This was addressed as soon as possible by the reception team, and with the help of other members of staff, call wait times were brought back under control. Staff do their utmost to make the system work and deal with as many patients as possible, but when demand outstrips supply, don't forget there are other NHS services available to provide primary care support to patients.

#### World Polio Day - 24 October

Not so long ago, two diseases—smallpox and polio—were taking the lives of children and adults all over the world. Smallpox was finally wiped out in 1980 thanks to a huge global vaccination effort. By 1990, polio cases in the UK had dropped to just a handful. Today, every child is offered routine polio vaccinations.

For over 35 years, Rotary has been leading the charge to end polio through the End Polio Now campaign. Together, members have raised more than \$2.1 billion and given countless hours of their time to help protect almost 3 billion children in 122 countries. Because of this work, polio is now found only in Afghanistan and Pakistan, and in 2020 Africa was officially declared free of the disease.

You might spot purple crocuses in bloom planted by local rotarians at Stratton Park, Kempshott. Each flower is a reminder that no family has to fear polio again.

September saw the start of our 19th year of work parties - doesn't time fly when you are having fun!? This year, changes are afoot. The Old Orchard group has decided to swap its work-day from Sunday to Saturday, hopefully to attract some volunteers who can't make it on Sundays.

The Down Grange Meadow group has also swapped its last work party of the month to the fourth Saturday, again to try and attract those volunteers with other commitments on Sundays. The second Sunday in the month session is being retained. We have also decided to drop the Thursday afternoon sessions as support was waning and, on several occasions, the average age of the volunteers that did turn up was around 80.

As usual, our start time is 10 00 and finish time is nominally 12 30 but may be earlier or later depending upon the tasks being undertaken, or the enthusiasm of the

volunteers! If doing well, we have been known to finish at 13 30. Rest assured, you can finish whenever is convenient to you.

All tools are supplied, but it may be wise to bring your own work gloves. We will provide heavy duty "rigger" gloves for work on bramble and rose briar where light gardening gloves may not be up to the job.

The group welcomes new volunteers, so why not join us for an hour or so to see what we do? Looking after our local area is rewarding work with friendly company. No experience is necessary. We would be delighted to see you.



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Late autumn and the wildflowers on the meadow are over and some parts of the meadow have now been mowed. The meadow area is mowed on a two yearly rotation - mowing encourages next year's growth and reduces excessive grass. Leaving an area uncut each year ensures seeds have dropped into the ground and also leaves insect eggs and larva to over-winter.

Each year the council and volunteers gather wildflower seeds from certain areas of the meadow. The council's rangers gather seed by way of a tractor driven brush harvester and the volunteers collect specific seed by hand (a very pleasing task actually). Seed collection is carried out at different times of the year as the wildflowers produce their seeds at different times of the year. Volunteers start the seed gathering in late summer and some of the first seeds collected are usually yellow rattle, cowslip, and salad burnett. As summer and autumn progress different species start seeding so there is always some seed to collect. For example August is the month for collecting types of scabious - both the field scabious and the devil's-bit scabious. Mid/late September is the time to collect species such as marjoram and red bartsia. As you can imagine, Old Down is a vital site for seed collecting having such a wide variety of species.

A seed bank is built up each year and the seeds are used to introduce wildflowers to other sites and also to create and enhance particular wildflower areas on Old Down. Seed collection is carried out on quite a few other sites such as Beggarwood, Crabtree and Down Grange.

Work Parties: We meet outside Old Down Hall every Thursday 10-12noon (but not in the rain!). We really do need new members and support - this is the way to keep Old Down as a beautiful green space for wildlife and people. You do not have to come every week. 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



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#### PROBUS AND THE PORTLAND RUSSIAN SPY RING

Readers of a certain vintage will no doubt remember the infamous Portland Russian Spy

Ring caught in 1961. It was recalled by speaker and Probus Club member David Stiles, who considers that he had a personal

involvement before the spies were unmasked.

Following service in the RAF he continued as a contractor on RAF bases. While based at RAF Tangmere near Chichester he was tasked to prepare a civilian Vickers Varsity aircraft to be held under guard to be instantly ready for some secret Probus President Stephen Thair and operation.

There were covert trips over three weeks when six men would arrive for night flights. He later concluded that these passengers were members of MI5, the section of the Secret Intelligence Service who are responsible for domestic security.

This period in history is known as 'The Cold War' with the Russians dividing Germany into East and West there was much spying activity by both sides. Honourably discharged from the Royal Navy after the war, Harry Houghton had worked at HMS Osprey on Portland in Dorset. In 1952, he transferred to the British embassy in Warsaw, Poland.

He liked a drink and became involved with a woman who turned out to be a member of the Polish Intelligence Service. She encouraged him to import coffee from Britain to sell at inflated prices. When his side hustle was discovered and being short of money, he was encouraged to approach the Polish authorities to sell them secret information. Drinking concerns by superiors led him to returning to England. He was posted to the Portland naval base in Dorset and more specifically in the Admiralty Underwater Weapons Establishment.

The AUWE was the centre of research into underwater weaponry and the first British nuclear submarine, HMS Dreadnought, had been launched in October 1960. Perhaps having been passed his details by Polish intelligence he was groomed by Gordon Lonsdale to develop an interest in Ethel Gee a filing clerk in AUWE. A spinster in her mid-forties she lived on Portland with her widowed mother and other family members.

Gordon Lonsdale was the cover name of Konon Molody, who had arrived in England under a Canadian passport and had been part of the Russian Spy Ring that had been operating in England since 1953. He provided the income needed by Harry Houghton that enabled a relationship to develop with Ethel Gee. Using a camera disguised as a cigarette lighter, Ethel would get copies of plans and information that he passed on to Lonsdale.

How would Lonsdale get this information to his masters in Moscow? Enter Helen and Peter Kroger. Their real names were Lona and Morris Cohen, American communists who used New Zealand passports. Lona Cohen had couriered classified documents about the "Manhattan Project", the US atom bomb development, to the Russian consulate In New York. The Americans considered they were ten years ahead of the Russians in nuclear development. Four years after the first atomic test, the Russians conducted their own nuclear bomb test, using specifications similar to those of the US device.

Peter and Helen Kroger rented a dormer bungalow in Ruislip in west London. Peter opened an antique book shop in London with customers across Europe including Russia. Gordon Lonsdale helped the Krogers dig out a cellar under their Kroger's bungalow in Ruislip kitchen to house transmitting



equipment while an aerial went in the roof.

Helen Kroger could transmit information in a couple of seconds. It was these transmissions that speaker David Stiles believes is what the mysterious flights with the MI5 personnel were tracking, eventually locating the bungalow in Ruislip.

Much of the information provided by Ethel Gee was reduced to microdots by Lonsdale and placed within the text in the antique books by Peter Kroger. The radio signals gave the destination address; the books were intercepted recovering the microdots.

In January 1961, MI5, which did not have power of arrest, arranged that the police detain all five people involved. This was followed by a trial at the Old Bailey in March 1961, held in camera. Certain information was released to the press, but much remains secret.

Gordon Londale was gaoled for 25 years but was involved in a spy swap after a four years. Helen and Peter Kroger received 20 years and were swapped for a British businessman. All three were received as Heroes of the Soviet Union. Harry Houghton and Ethel Gee received 15 years and were married in prison.

Over 2,000 documents had been photographed and David Stiles wondered if they really were not that important at all.

#### **Finding Community**

The summer holiday season feels very much over since we turned into September, and all the schools started back. Suddenly the weather has changed and finally lots of rain with a definite chill in the air.

Holidays were really important to my husband Graham and me – in fact I probably bored quite a few of you talking about them. But sadly, Graham died at the end of February. Navigating grief affects many aspects of your life and learning to holiday on your own is a challenge.

My first holiday took me ages to get organised, and I actually left 2 hours later than I planned to.

However, a few months later I was a bit more prepared. I left on time and despite challenges with directions and roadworks I managed to get to where I was going.

I went to a Festival!

Now that may not seem surprising to any of you seasoned festival goers but for me it was a completely unique experience. I've got to admit I didn't camp (I booked into a cosy Airbnb). And it was a Christian Festival, called Greenbelt which is held in the grounds of Boughton House just outside Kettering. Also, I did meet up with some friends from church, who were seasoned Green-belters.

Greenbelt was unlike anything I had expected — people walking around in party outfits mixed with camping gear, some wearing glitter, fairy wings and walking boots. It was a place for people to be who they are without any agenda or expectations regardless of ethnicity, gender, religion, sexuality, disability or background.

There was a whole range of different music from folk singer Kate Rusby, protest songs, hymns (with Cider at I I am in the morning!), rock, pop and rap. Plus, poetry, creativity, sustainability, and so much more. It was an experience!

There was space for reflection, for challenge, for protest and activism. The plight of those struggling to survive in war torn countries such as Palestine was very much at the forefront.

Greenbelt's Manifesto is Somewhere to Believe in and Somewhere to Belong — a place where the sacred meets the secular. And it is where it is ok to ask questions and no-one pretends that they have all the answers.

Jesus was critical of those who were overly religious, who made things difficult for people to get close to God. And he wanted his followers to continue to do his work afterwards, to love God and love everyone else. This is Greenbelt – accepting everyone as they are.

We aim to be like this too at the Parish of Basingstoke Down; being open and welcoming to everyone. We hope to be a place to where you can belong and maybe begin to believe. And it is being part of this community of believers that I have felt supported loved and cared for. ## IT WAS 3 ( ) YEARS AGO TODAY

The December 1993 issue of the Rabbiter reported that Hatch Warren's first Fireworks display had been a great success. The catering had struggled, and there were lessons to be learnt, but that was scarcely surprising, as this was the Community Association's first attempt at something quite huge. Interestingly, that first display had also featured a large bonfire; something considered too risky these days.

Tickets are now on sale for the 33rd Fireworks display at the Hatch Warren Community Centre field, which has established itself as a major event in the local calendar.

At the end of 1993, the Rabbiter reported that it was being delivered to 2,000 plus homes. Today, with the completion of Kempshott Park and Beggarwood, that number has climbed to over 4,000.

The local Councillors reported that there had been considerable discussions about Sainsbury's plans to extend the number of petrol pumps and install a new car wash. Modifications had been agreed to protect neighbouring trees and bushes, remove illuminated signs on the canopy and fit the car wash with doors to cut down on possible noise.

Today the fuel and car wash facilities nestle comfortably behind the tree screen on Wallop Drive and are much valued. I can't help but wonder, though, when we are going to get electric charging points. There is a major installation in the Tesco car park in Chineham: it must surely be only a matter of time before we get one here.

The First Hatch Warren Girl Guides were growing successfully. They had started with 5 girls back in April and had grown to 22 by the end of the year.

The crime figures for Hatch Warren in the previous months were reported: two thefts from motor vehicles and five burglaries from dwellings. However, local security consultants painted a grimmer picture, reporting a show home in Danebury Road being burgled. Sadly, they said, most victims only consider protective security after their second break-in. I wonder if that is still true.

Sadly, security risks still exist. There is a growth in opportunist thefts from cars left unlocked on their drives, and thieves 'spoofing' contactless keys, which didn't exist back then. It is worth investing in 'Faraday' pouches to protect contactless keys. Many homes have burglar alarms, smart switches and door cameras installed. Indeed, the Police sometimes call for residents with doorbell cameras to check for evidence that could help them with their investigations.

And finally ... there was a reminder that the mobile library would visit each Tuesday evening. This is something that, sadly, has not survived. However, the local libraries do offer a home delivery service, which is free...

### Notes from the kitchen


#### **PRESERVING**



The store cupboard is full of jams and pickles and the freezer is well stocked with frozen fruit and vegetables. We've been pressing the windfall apples and the juice stored in the freezer – it is delicious. Unblemished apples can be wrapped in paper, stored in a cool dry place and will still be good for eating at Christmas and beyond. I've been trying to find ways of saving money on my shopping. Rather than throw the ends of vegetables in the compost bin they have been used to make vegetable stock which is then frozen in an ice cube tray to add to soups etc. Chicken bones are also used to make stock. Pulses are always a good buy. Add them to soups or to stretch meat in a shepherd's pie but rather than buying tins try the dried beans. They can be soaked, cooked and stored in the freezer. I use a lot of fresh herbs which are expensive. However for the price of a few packets of seeds there is parsley and basil in pots growing the year round. Sage and rosemary are flourishing in big pots in the garden – and cutting from these are growing on the windowsill to be given to friends. There is a bay tree on the allotment which provides plenty of leaves for cooking. Next year I plan to try growing dill and coriander in pots. Pots are expensive and it is fascinating to see how the locals in Greece grow their herbs etc. in empty oil and feta cans outside their front doors. I buy olive oil in large cans and maybe I will try using these for herbs next year.

**Vegetable stock** Use what vegetables scraps you have available. Collect them over the week and store in a container in the fridge – for example: an onion, leek trimmings, carrot, squash, celery, mushroom stalks, tomato – or a squirt of tomato puree. However, leave out potato, Brussel sprouts and brassicas. Add herbs if available – parsley, thyme, bay and a few peppercorns.

Chop vegetables, place in pan and cover with cold water. Bring to boil, reduce heat and simmer for 30 mins to a couple of hours. Strain through a sieve. Store in fridge for up to 5 days or in the freezer:



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#### **HALLOWEEN**

It's the time of the year again when many of us enjoy scaring ourselves and others with a good ghost story. We have told strange and ghostly tales for as long as anyone can count. The first known recorded ghost story was written down by Pliny the younger, whose uncle died in the eruption at Pompeii in AD79. Pliny the Younger's tale has all the recognised markings of a classic ghost story with an abandoned haunted house that no one can live in, a terrifying spectre rattling chains and a murdered man seeking retribution.

But the real boom in ghost stories began in Victorian times. The Victorians loved a good spooky tale and were also keen to track down real-life experiences. There was a surge of belief in spiritualism and attendance at seances.

The Society for Physical Research began in 1882, and a number of famous ghost hunters emerged – writers such as Charles Dickens. He not only wrote some of our best-known ghost stories, but also went on hunts for spooks himself, although he was a severe critic of mediums and spiritualists, whom he believed to be charlatans.



The writer and investigator Catherine Crowe wrote not only her own ghost stories but also collected experiences of the uncanny for publication in books such as "The Night Side of Nature".

But why were the Victorians so keen to explore the spirit world? Perhaps it had something to do with the mass move away from the countryside to smoky, foggy towns. Perhaps it was the nervousness of young people sent away to service in very large, dark, draughty houses with dark corners and creaking floorboards.

There is also a theory that the introduction of new gas lighting to the home might have been a factor. The gas used could be toxic and cause fainting and sometimes hallucinations. Was this responsible for visons of spectres?

## DAVE'S NATURE SPOT

Due mainly to being persecuted by farmers and gamekeepers in England and Scotland, the Red Kite (Milvus milvus) became extinct by the late 19th century with just a few pairs remaining in Wales.

A very successful reintroduction programme started in the late 1980s with birds from Sweden, Spain and Wales and now the UK has roughly 4,700 pairs and approximately 16% of the world's population of Red Kites.

We are lucky to have a good local population here in Basingstoke and Red Kites are now a common sight. Easily recognised by their rusty red colour plumage and distinctive forked tail and with a wingspan of nearly 2 metres they are a joy to see gliding on thermals high in our skies. Some will even come down and visit our gardens to pick up scraps.

Nests are built in tall trees often on the edges of woods or forests where they will normally lay I to 3 eggs which hatch in about 30 days, and the young fledge at roughly 50 to 60 days old. The Red Kite's diet consists mainly of carrion, worms, insects and the occasional small mammal.

It is great that these beautiful birds are now regularly seen over our town and the surrounding countryside. A true success story.

Probably like us, most readers will have had a supermarket box of Asian food as an occasional treat at the weekend. With a car that had developed a mysterious fault the decision was made that we should take the plunge and have a Chinese meal delivered.

Madam reckons it was back in 2014 that we last had such a delivery. How things have changed in the intervening years. Instead of just making a phone call, it was on to the computer to place an order.

Today it seems that the delivery companies decide if our address is within their delivery area rather than the place where the food is cooked. This is possibly due to the time to travel as it would not be desirable if the food arrives having cooled down. Our first choice was declared to be too far away and so we settled on a delivery company that would reach our address and settled down to make our menu selections.

Placing our order on the screen turned out to be quite a task, having to go back several times before the order was accepted. Mind you, seeing the style in which the summary and pricing of each component was listed gave confidence in giving over my card details.

At this juncture I should add there was considerable discussion about selections and because the menu was not populated with a picture of each dish, we made the classic error of not realising the volume of each one. One large Crispy Spring roll could have been shared and only one rice was needed, and the pot of sweet and sour sauce was surplus to requirements.

Madam's Sweet and Sour Chicken was declared as very tasty but there was too much, and my Pork and Cashew Nuts was also very good. Impressively, on placing our order the computer advised a time for delivery as 19.05 and there came a knock on the door two minutes prior to the allotted time. The food bill came to £35.00 and a perfectly reasonable delivery charge of £2.00, but I never did establish why there was a mysterious £7.00 surcharge.

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
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
