#### COUNCILLOR UPDATES

**DOWN GRANGE:** With an increase in housing on this side of town being proposed by the Borough Council, I believe it is even more important to protect our existing open spaces. One of these is Down Grange Park, which I believe the majority of residents want to see preserved and not used for a golfing facility. I was therefore disappointed that an attempt to get the Borough Council to reconsider its plans was defeated last month. I believe this was a serious mistake: the site is much loved by walkers and sports players, and many of you reading this will be users.

**GREAT WOLF EXHIBITION:** On the same subject, I attended a 'drop-in' event organised by Great Wolf who want to build a water-themed resort hotel on the current Par 3 golf course at the Leisure Park. As well as offering a few specific comments about their scheme, I asked whether there was a causal link between the new golf facility at Down Grange and their hotel investment going ahead. They said 'no'. In other words, if the Council decided not to use Down Grange Park, Great Wolf would still go ahead with their hotel.

ANAEROBIC DIGESTER: I attended the Digester's liaison panel, held in November: At the previous meeting we had expressed concerns to Biogen, the operators, about odour pollution reported by local residents. This time, Biogen reported that they had found a small leak in one of the digestion tanks and had corrected it. Time will tell whether this has improved or even eliminated the problem. Biogen have also invested in a new compressor for use on the gas flare, which will be more efficient.

**FOOD WASTE COLLECTION:** The Garlic Lane digester did not win the contract for Basingstoke's food waste collection service. I asked Biogen whether this would have any impact on their current operations, and they said 'no'. They are operating at full capacity, so the number of lorries passing through Hatch Warren should not change.

PACK LANE (I): There was a great deal of concern about the resurfacing work in Pack Lane, and the impact it might have on local businesses and the users of Kempshott Village Hall. I therefore had detailed discussions with the Council officers to try to keep inconveniences to a minimum. I monitored the work and was pleased to see that the contractors did, as promised, allow access during the road closure although there were delays to allow the heavy machinery to get out of the way. I was also assured that Homesteads Road would not be closed at the same time as Pack Lane. When the work was finished I drove down the road and noted the vast improvement.

PACK LANE (2): I was therefore bitterly disappointed to be told that a section of the new surface was not up to standard and had to be removed and relaid. The remedial work was done at the contractor's expense, not the Council Taxpayers'. The re-work delayed the white-lining and the re-installation of the speed pads (which this time will be made of rubber).

**PATIENT PARTICIPATION GROUP:** I have attended meetings of the PPG at a time of significant change. Members heard that the new 'Total Triage' system is succeeding in cutting call wait times and it is improving patients' access to appointments. We asked that the very long pre-recorded message on the phone system be reduced. We are into the vaccination season and I do recommend, if you haven't already done so, that you get your 'flu jab. The peak in influenza cases is coming early this winter:

SCHOOL RUN PARKING: Over the years I have noted that 'school run' problems tend to peak at the start of each new school year. This year there seem to be a higher-than-usual number of complaints. St Mark's School has reported that some local residents have been verbally abused by members of the school community. The school is asking that drivers park considerately and not in a way that prevents local residents from accessing their homes. I remind parents that the school has an arrangement with the Community Association to use their car park and then to cross Woodbury Road, where there is a School Crossing Patrol.

WATLING END: I have received notification from the Borough Council that it is refurbishing the play area in Watling End, and have been to the site to inspect it. The current equipment is tired and out of date. By the time you read this, work should have started and is likely to complete by the end of December. During construction, the contractor is using the green next to the play area for its compound. The new equipment will include swings, somersault bars, a multi-unit for toddlers and younger users, and a carousel.

**MEALS ON WHEELS:** My new portfolio in the Cabinet at Hampshire takes in the public health discipline, which is a very large one. As part of my 'reading in', I joined one of the Meals on Wheels delivery rounds in this area. The drivers do more than deliver a good, hot meal. They also give the recipients the chance to speak to someone. At same time, the drivers check on the wellbeing of the recipients. On the day that I went out, one of the elderly residents seemed below par, and the driver said he would call in his concern so that carers and relatives could be made aware.

**TECHNOLOGY SUPPORT:** I also attended a briefing on the technology that can be made available to support people to live longer in their own homes. This can included medicine dispensers, GPS watches to help people take exercise without getting lost, and enhanced Amazon Alexa devices to remind residents to take their medication or even to brush their teeth!

SCHOOL APPLICATIONS: Now is the time of year for parents and carers to apply for school places for their children. If you have a child due to start school in September, or moving from Infants to Junior schools, you have until January 15th 2026 to apply. My recommendation is to do it now - it will be too easy to forget with everything else going on over Christmas and the New Year. You have the opportunity to state three preferences and, again, I recommend that you do that. Some people give only one preference and then end up receiving an offer from a school that they really don't want.

FIREWORKS SPECTACULAR: My family and I were delighted, once again, to attend the Hatch Warren fireworks display, and the Community Association did us proud with a show of the highest order. The rain held off, so the conditions were perfect. At the end, it was announced that the event was a sell-out - easy to believe from the large groups of people who walked there and back.

LITTER PICK: Following the fireworks, the Community Association supported two litter picks on the HatchWarren Field and Beggarwood Park. They reported that the volunteers collected an incredible amount of litter across the two sites. Volunteers included members from the Beggarwood Wildlife Group, Hatch Warren Nature Group, and Natural Basingstoke.

Dear residents of Hatch Warren and Beggarwood – I hope this finds you all well and healthy.

I can't believe we're on our Christmas Rabbiter edition again already, but I've had another chockful month of activities and that does have a way of seeing the time fly by!

**BLACK HISTORY MONTH:** I was thrilled to attend Basingstoke's Black History Month Community Achiever Awards ceremony. It was not only an evening to recognise the excellent contribution made by Basingstoke people of colour, but a great way of learning more about some truly brilliant local work and initiatives. I always come away from such events with another list of people to work and share ideas with and groups to visit!

MARSHAL VOLUNTEERING: I was pleased to help out for a morning of vaccine marshalling for Camrose, Gillies, Hackwood and Beggarwood surgery patients. Although none of us likes to remember that Covid remains at large, it's still vital for vulnerable patients to be protected and I was glad to assist the staff who work through steady streams of patients every Saturday to do so. Similarly, I was happy once again to volunteer with my colleagues at the Hatch Warren Fireworks Spectacular, which could not take place without safety for hundreds of attendees being ensured. As usual, the HWBCA pulled off a blinding event and it was a joy to see so many families and captivated faces — well done to the team!

**ARMISTICE DAY:** Attending the Council's Armistice Day service to remember those who gave their lives for our country was, of course, very solemn and moving. I was honoured to meet someone afterwards who fought in the same conflict as my father, get the chance to talk with him about it and thank him for his service. The minister conducting the service reminded us that those who sacrificed their lives did so for our freedom and our democracy; that we must remember them always, but also honour that sacrifice by treating our democracy and our fellow humans with respect and dignity. It's a vital message for our times and one I will always try to live by both in and outside of this work.

**EVENTS + PATROLS:** Community Lunch at Beggarwood Café was bustling again and was joined by local Police Community Support Officers, who made themselves available all lunchtime to chat to ward residents, hear local issues and answer questions. Liaising with the community is a really important part of their role and they will be along to the next two Community Lunch events, so do come along to meet them while grabbing a tasty lunch. The next one, on Wednesday 3rd December, will be a special one as we also enjoy a fun Christmas singalong with our meal — what with the Officers in attendance, carols to warm the voice and delicious quiche from Dashwood Manor to fill the belly it's likely to be busy, so come early and prepared to share a table for some cheer!

I was delighted to go on this month's random school run parking patrol with our new Community Safety Patrol Officer for HWB and Brighton Hill, Erand James-Bailey. I try to spot-check different areas each time and we toured Danebury Road, Centurion Way and Petworth Close, Inglewood Drive, and The Cornfields to monitor parking and road safety while we caught up on local matters. As the weather get nastier, I'd like to remind all residents to be exceptionally cautious on the roads especially around school areas at drop off and pick up time, and to be as considerate as possible when choosing where and how to park.

FOOD WASTE BINS: We're now about a month into weekly food waste collections and, so far, the feedback has been very positive. I have noted that not everyone is in the habit of using theirs yet, although I'm sure that will pick up as the scheme goes on. My own experience has been that — despite already being quite a finicky menu-writer, list-maker and grocery shopper who assumed there wasn't much left to minimise — I have still managed to reduce our own food waste further by using our new caddy. All very good for the environment and the wallet! But if you do have any questions or issues as the scheme beds in, I'm happy to hear from you and help out where possible.

HELP AVAILABLE: Dashwood Manor Care Home are offering a six-week accessible guided Physiotherapy Class – for free! There are places available for any local to attend alongside Dashwood residents and be led through a range of seated strengthening and standing balance routines designed to help keep attendees mobile, confident, and active. Everyone is welcome, and sessions are tailored to all abilities. They run on Tuesdays from 2pm to 3pm in a rolling programme, so new attendees can join at any time to access their six consecutive weeks subject to place availability. Waiting lists for physio are extremely long and we know that the longer we don't move our bodies, the harder it becomes and the more unwell we get, so this is a great opportunity. If you are part of a local charity or community organisation, remember that Borough Councillors are given  $\pounds 2,000$  each year in grant funding to allocate to new equipment and such for groups that benefit the area: I have about a third of my pot left to give for this year. Please note that all applications, relevant supporting documents and approvals must be received by the grants team by 2nd March 2026 so don't delay! You can find eligibility and application details on the Council website but do reach out to me with any questions.

**REPAIR CAFÉ:** After our break for fireworks, the Hatch Warren Repair Café is back on Saturday 6th December from 10am to 1pm at the Community Centre. As Christmas approaches, I'd encourage all of us to try to avoid overspending on new things and give gifts of time and thoughtfulness instead – if your loved one has an already-beloved item that needs a fix, it could be the perfect present!

#### **Surgery Update**

Phone waiting times average 11.5 minutes over the last 30 days. Many patients mistakenly believe appointments are only released on Mondays, leading to longer waits. However, appointments are now released throughout the week so we are encouraging patients to avoid the Monday rush and ring on other days too.

About 40% of patients have digital access to the practice via the Dr IQ powered by Evergreen app. The practice has clarified that you don't need a mobile device or phone and you can access the system using a computer.

# To access using a computer, log in at www.evergreen-life.co.uk/health-wellbeing-library/three-steps-to-connecting-to-your-gp-online-services-and-gp-records/

You'll reach the Evergreen-Life website, but Operose still uses Dr IQ powered by Evergreen as their system name, which can't be changed at the practice level.

Routine online consultations are available between 8.00am and 6.30pm on weekdays. Online consultations offer patients an alternative way to access appropriate care. They are not a replacement for face-to-face appointments but can benefit everyone. More people using online access where appropriate can free up time and improve access for more vulnerable or digitally excluded patients.

A routine problem is something that does not need urgent attention today such as queries about medication, repeat prescriptions, sick notes, or ongoing health issues that can safely wait for a response. If you have a routine (non-urgent) request, you can submit your request online using the DriQ app, powered by Ever-green. Simply select the option: "I need help, but it's not urgent."

#### Improving strength & balance

Thirty percent of people aged 65 and over will fall at least once a year. For those aged 80 and over it is 50%.

Falls and fractures are a common and serious health issue faced by older people in England. Falling is a cause of distress, pain, injury, loss of confidence, loss of independence and mortality.

Falls are the number one reason older people are taken to the emergency department in a hospital

In around 5% of cases a fall leads to a fracture and hospitalisation

Unaddressed fall hazards in the home are estimated to cost the NHS in England £435 million

In the past month the PPG marshals at Vaccination clinics have handed out over 700 Falls Prevention checklists and Ageing Well information leaflets. These are also available on wall dispensers at all of the surgeries.

If you are getting a vaccination please feel free to pick up a leaflet. We also offer information leaflets about Dementia Support and support for Unpaid Carers.

#### LUKE MURPHY MP

Over the past few months, many residents have been raising concerns with me about anti-social vehicle use across Basingstoke. People have described late-night racing on the ring road, dirt bikes cutting through parks, e-scooters and e-bikes ridden on pavements, and cars speeding past schools at busy times. These issues aren't minor; they affect daily life and make too many people feel unsafe.

After hearing the same stories from so many different parts of the town, I knew we needed to bring everyone with responsibility for roads, enforcement and public spaces into one place. That has never happened before in Basingstoke.

So for the first time, I brought together Hampshire Constabulary (including roads policing), Hampshire County Council, Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council, National Highways, major retailers and car-park operators, housing providers, Neighbourhood Watch, and Speedwatch volunteers. The aim was simple: stop working in silos and start building a shared plan.

That meeting produced real commitments from partners.

Firstly, agencies agreed to create a proper, borough-wide strategy on anti-social vehicle use. This is something Basingstoke has never had. They will now map key hotspots across the town so enforcement, design changes and community action can be targeted in the right places.

Secondly, partners recognised that residents need clearer information. Work is underway to create simple guidance on who to contact about speeding, car meets, dirt bikes, e-scooters and parking issues and how those reports are acted on.

Thirdly, retailers, car-park operators and the police agreed to strengthen cooperation around disruptive car meets. This includes exploring practical steps like gates, bollards and technology, as well as the possibility of properly supervised carmeet locations away from homes.

Hampshire County Council and National Highways will also examine engineering and technology options in hotspots, including average-speed cameras and noise-monitoring tools. And schools will be supported to strengthen road-safety education and community engagement.

Some of this also needs national action, especially around e-scooters, vehicle noise and modified cars and I will continue raising those issues directly with Government.

None of this will change overnight. But by getting every key organisation around the table for the first time, we now have a shared plan, clear commitments and a collective responsibility to deliver.

Residents' voices drove this work and I will keep making sure they stay at the heart of the solutions.





Here we are into December with Christmas nearly upon us and then the end of the year 2025. Happy Christmas and New Year to you all.

Last month's report was rather too hopeful in that the Group expected progress on the Council's proposal to add 'landscaping' items to Old Down Wildlife Park. Unfortunately, nothing has happened and we still wait to hear about the second public consultation on the proposal.

Autumn has been very mild this year and has probably had an effect on nature - bees and wasps around well into November, some wildflowers still blooming, winter migrants arriving much later. During November on Old Down, wildflowers have been spotted, such as field scabious, oxeye daisy, clustered bell flower and even the odd cowslip. The autumn colours have been absolutely beautiful and the mild nights have meant that good numbers of many types of fungi have emerged (but so difficult to spot because of cover from fallen leaves). Not seen on Old Down but this autumn the number of Fly Agaric was quite astounding (try Morgaston Wood).

HAVE A VERY GOOD CHRISTMAS – and see you next year. Perhaps a new year resolution – support nature and join nature groups including local ones such as Old Down Wildlife Group, Kempshott Conservation Group, Beggarwood Wildlife Group.

#### FOUR LOCAL CHARITIES RECEIVE ADDITIONAL MASONIC DONATIONS

Four charities in and around Basingstoke have benefitted from a funding source that was able to provide finance in addition to what they had received during the summer.

The 105-year-old Elvetham Masonic Lodge, that operates out of the Basingstoke Masonic Centre in Victoria Street at the Top of Town, had made donations to these charities from their own resources.

During the autumn they were able to apply to the Tom Langton fund which was established by a previous Grand Master of the Masonic Province of Hampshire and Isle of Wight, the interest from which is donated to suitable applicants proposed by individual lodges.

This successful application has meant that Elvetham Lodge was able to provide an additional £2,000 to be split equally between the four charities they had assisted just a few months previously.

The lodge's Charity Steward, Richard Pfleger, presented a cheque for £500 each to Tim Knight of Mencap's Green Fingers gardening project in South Ham, Basingstoke, Natalie Walker of the Mustard Seed Autism Trust a child support group in Odiham, Steve Dignum of the Hook Shed project where, assisted by the Hook parish council, a shed is currently under construction, and Chris Cornwell of Hartley Wintney Voluntary Care Group that has 120 members supporting the local community in various ways.

The presentation was made in the Lodge room of the Basingstoke Masonic Centre which proved of real interest to the recipients.






#### A Geo.....what?

At our October work party in the Old Orchard by Kendal Gardens, we experimented by hosting a "Cache In Trash Out" (CITO) event — a type of GeoCaching event based around volunteer action. We had no idea what kind of turnout to expect, but a fabulous 19 people turned up! In our CITO these willing participants were put to work with the great Orchard Bramble Bash.

We managed to uncover parts of the Orchard that have been lost to brambles for the past five years, which is an amazing testament to the hard work that was put in. We really can't say "thank you" enough. Having all this work done clearing back the brambles means we can focus our efforts elsewhere for the rest of the work parties and Orchard users can enjoy the wider paths without tripping over the bramble leaders.

We plan to add a GeoCache to our Orchard and elsewhere in the wider Kempshott Conservation Group areas such as Down Grange Meadow, so keep your eyes peeled for updates.

## PROBUS LEARN ABOUT LOCAL HERO

Sherfield-on-Loddon resident Natalie Larner gave an outline to the Probus Club of Basingstoke of Captain John Aidan Liddell VC MC whose 1915

burial in South View cemetery, Basingstoke was attended by many dignitaries and public crowds.

Although he was born near Newcastle in 1888, during the early 1900s and after the First World War, the Liddell family lived at Sherfield Manor which today is Sherfield School. As a lasting connection one of the buildings at Sherfield Village Hall bears the family name and on 11 November each year a special service is held to commemorate his memory.

Following Balliol College, Oxford, where he had obtained a first-class degree in Zoology, at the age of 24 and not wanting to be a 'slacker' John Aidan Liddell joined the Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders following his maternal grandfather into a Scottish regiment.

When the first World War started, with the rank of Lieutenant, he commanded a Maxim machine gun section on the Western Front that remained unsupported for 43 days. For this action and for saving the Company Sergeant Major he received the MC.

This long time at the front, spent either in action or the suboptimal conditions of front-line trenches, where he changed his socks only once in that time, took a toll on his health and he was given leave.

Before the outbreak of the war, he had trained as a pilot, flying a Boxkite at the Vickers school at Brooklands and following recuperation from his battlefield experiences he joined the Royal Flying Corps being promoted to Captain and was stationed at Saint-Omer in northern France.

On 31 July 1915 he, together with an observer/gunner, was flying a two-seater RE 5 biplane at 5,000 feet near Bruges when they were fired on by enemy aircraft. Badly wounded with a shattered right thigh he lost consciousness and the plane nose-dived. Regaining consciousness, he was able to regain control at only 3,000 feet above enemy lines.

The plane was badly damaged and with the crew member, 2nd Lieutenant Roland Peck, also wounded, he managed to fly back to base saving not only the plane but also the life of his observer. Captain Liddell had his right leg amputated but died due to septicaemia a month later. He was 27 years old.

There had been much publicity in the British newspapers of this event so that when his body was brought back to England and following a Catholic mass held in London, the coffin travelled to Basingstoke by train where it was met with pipers from his regiment. The cortege passed through the town where crowds lined the streets and flags were flown at half half mast. His observer was amongst many who attended the funeral.

The posthumous VC was presented to his father by King George V at Buckingham Palace on 17 November 1915. Only four such medals were awarded to members of the Royal Flying Corps.

Several commemorative plaques of Captain John Aidan Liddell VC MC are found around Britain, but Sherfield-on-Loddon has its own memorials. His name can be seen topping the list of other local men who lost their lives during this conflict on the village war memorial. And in 2015, the century after his death, a commemorative engraved paving stone, atop a brick plinth, was positioned near the crossroad in the village. Sherfield-on-Loddon residents are justly proud of their local man who became a war hero.

# DAVE'S NATURE SPOT

Ruddock is an old Anglo-Saxon name for the Robin - it means little red one.

We all associate the Robin with Christmas; this has been since Victorian times when part of a postman's job was to deliver Christmas cards. Postmen were known as 'redbreasts' because they wore long red jackets.

The Robin (Erithacus rubecula) has been voted UK's favourite bird. This brave and cheeky little bird often turns up when we are gardening and will make a welcome meal of any of the worms or invertebrates that are disturbed by the gardener. Robins also eat snails and in winter will readily take seeds and berries.

In the UK the Robin is mainly found in suburban or town areas but on the continent it is a shy bird of woods and open countryside. Both sexes of the Robin are very similar in plumage and are very difficult to tell apart; the male however is slightly larger and a little brighter in colour in comparison to the female.

Robins are very territorial and their cute appearance belies their aggressive nature. They will boldly defend their territory especially in the breeding season when rival males have been known on occasions to fight to the death.

The female will choose to nest in many types of location, from a hole in a tree or crevice in a wall to something as strange as a flowerpot or discarded kettle; in fact anything that may provide a bit of shelter. Their breeding season is from March to earlysummer and they sometimes will have 2 or 3 broods of 4 - 6 eggs. Sadly the mortality rate of the young is very high mainly due to territorial disputes and cold winters. Recently fledged young do not have the distinctive redbreast but have a brown speckled breast which changes to the familiar red after 2 to 3 months.

I would like to take this opportunity to wish a "Merry Christmas" to one and all.

It was reading in the Basingstoke Gazette that this restaurant had recently been crowned the best curry house in England that brought Madam and myself here but seeing two Indian families choosing to dine at Spices & Spirits gives it real credibility.



So, who are we to make any derogatory comments about this Indian restaurant. Unless you have children attending Cranborne School it is unlikely that our readers

have much need to venture behind the King of Wessex pub on Winchester Road, but that's how to find this first-class restaurant. They have become so busy that an upstairs dining room has been built.

It was Sunday, the only day they are open at lunchtime, which meant that it was a buffet rather than making a choice from a menu. Nevertheless, there was a good selection on offer and thanks to the helpful staff we enjoyed a starter and main course.

The main constituents were chicken and fish, cooked in various ways with salads, small poppadoms, naan bread and rice. A good vegetarian selection was available. Being

replete, I only sampled two types of dessert. The usual slim line tonic with ice and a slice and a bottle of Kingfisher zero alcohol lager completed our selection with the bill coming to a very reasonable £39.29.

It would be interesting to return in the evening to sample their full offering, but the Sunday buffet could be of interest to families with children with no charge for those under four and only £8.50 for those up to 12 while for adults it is a very reasonable £16.50.

# IT WAS YEARS AGO TODAY

The Rabbiter in February 1995 reported that that snow and ice had hit in January, and Hatch Warren had turned white. The children had great fun and snowmen popped up all over the estate. Sledges magically appeared.

It was not so much fun, though, for drivers who lived on a hill. I remember a long line of cars being parked in Woodbury Road as their drivers trudged home up Alderney Avenue. Wallop Drive became too icy for the buses to get through. These were the days before grit bins were installed for local use.

The Community Association reported that the Senior Youth Club had closed following complaints from residents and episodes of vandalism in roads close to the Community Centre. Police had to be called when a large group of youths caused a public nuisance.

The irony was that many of the trouble-makers came from outside Hatch Warren. This was a problem on which the Police had to work for some time.

A new community worker had been appointed and the situation gradually improved. Today we have The Warren as an important part of our youth offer. The proportion of teenagers living here, which was once the highest in the town, has declined over the years.

The Confederation of Hatch Warren Residents' Associations had started its campaign for traffic calming in the estate and at that time reported that they were not making progress. Eventually, when the Beggarwood development was being planned, their campaign did come to fruition, resulting in the build-outs that now regulate traffic in Woodbury Road and Long Cross Lane.

In February 1995 I was a Borough Councillor and the Rabbiter reported some good news from me: Hatch Warren was to get three new bus shelters soon. The positioning of bus shelters is an issue to this day. Changes to bus routes have resulted in some not being used, while stops across the road have no shelter at all.

The Rabbiter also carried a report that local Councillors had helped the residents of Beechwood Close and Sherwood Close who had been plagued by ball games being played on the green between the two roads, sometime late into the night. They had asked for a 'No Ball Games' sign. In my experience this would not have worked, and it might well have been used as a goalpost!

Instead, I had suggested an alternative — planting trees. The residents collected most of the money to buy them (through the Council) and they also provided most of the muscle-power to plant them. I have a photograph somewhere of the day when we carried out the work, which I remember with affection. The trees flourished and the area looks greener to this day because of the initiative.



At this time of year there are so many special events to celebrate. We started off the term with Bonfire night where we created our very own sparklers using breadsticks with icing and sprinkles. #### A CHRISTMAS CAROL

For many of us, Christmas wouldn't be Christmas without Charles Dickens' 'A Christmas Carol'. But the story of how, and why, he wrote it is not so widely known.

Charles Dickens was born locally in Portsmouth in 1812. Throughout his childhood he suffered insecurity and poverty, with his father being sent to Marshalsea debtors' prison. At twelve years old Charles

was sent to work six days a week in a blacking factory, and he had to live alone in lodgings, fending for himself, as the rest of the family were sharing the rooms in the Marshalsea. The memory of this poverty and shame stayed with him all his life, and certainly added to his keen sense of social justice and urge to reform the lot of the poor.

In 1843, the year in which we see the appearance of A Christmas Carol, we find Dickens at 31 years old, already a highly celebrated and popular writer. He had already published Pickwick Papers, Oliver Twist, Nicholas Nickelby, The Old Curiosity Shop and Barnaby Rudge. He was busy writing Martin Chuzzlewit, which was being serialised in monthly episodes. In 1836 he had married Catherine Hogarth, and by this time they already had four children, with another on the way. They went on to have ten, with nine surviving. The marriage ended miserably and somewhat scandalously in 1858.

At this time also he was actively involved in campaigning for reform. He visited prisons, ragged schools and mines. And he burned up some of his phenomenal nervous energy walking around London, familiarising himself with the living conditions of the poor.

He made furious speeches castigating the rich for turning a blind eye to the suffering in their midst. But he decided that the best way to catch attention was to write, so he set about 'A Christmas Carol' in October of that year. He finished the book in six weeks, and it was published on 19th December 1843. He was still only 31 years old.

He wanted the book to "strike a hammer blow for the poor man's child". He also wanted it to be cheap and therefore widely available, but also to be of good print quality. His publishers were not keen to plough too much into 'A Christmas Carol' as neither of his two latest books; Barnaby Rudge and Martin Chuzzlewit, were proving as popular as the previous. He therefore put his own money into the publication.




'A Christmas Carol' was a huge success. By Christmas Day it had sold six thousand copies, and by May it was in its seventh edition. But Dickens never made much money from it. With little in the way of copyright laws, pirated copies of the books and unauthorised dramatisations appeared everywhere. Dickens took legal action which he won, but he had to pay costs of what in today's money would have been £75,000.

Dickens' story of how one man is redeemed by the spirit of Christmas, and how we should all look to our neighbours' wellbeing, has never been bettered. It would be hard to think of Christmas now without 'A Christmas Carol'. The book and all its many adaptations; films, plays, animations, even the Muppets is embedded in our psyches and is, for many of us, a vital component of the season.

People who have never read it, indeed some who have never seen an adaptation, will still somehow have imbibed the name and character of Scrooge, the Ghosts of Christmas Past, Present and Future, Tiny Tim and the Cratchits. Many will recognise a quote from the book or indeed be able to quote from it themselves, without ever realising quite how we know it so well. The genius of Dickens is that his stories and creations seem to take on a life of their own, and live amongst us, and none more so than 'A Christmas Carol'.

So Merry Christmas all and, in the words of Tiny Tim "God bless us, everyone".


