MANYDOWN | RESPONSES TO FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

As you will be aware, following 18 months of consultation and engagement with the local community, Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council and Hampshire County Council submitted an outline planning application for Manydown at the beginning of the year:

Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council, as planning authority, consulted on the application earlier this year. The project team has now reviewed the comments that were made in that consultation and published answers to frequently asked questions to give further information or explanation. The answers to frequently asked questions are not intended to provide a response to all the concerns raised, nor to justify the proposals and address every objection.

Further discussion is now taking place with Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council as the planning authority, as well as relevant statutory consultees. Updated information will be submitted to the planning authority in the next few months and it is expected there will be a further planning consultation during autumn 2017 to seek feedback on this updated information. This will give an opportunity to comment on the updated proposals prior to the application being determined by the council's Development Control Committee.

ACCIDENTS IN THE WORKPLACE

Employers have a legal responsibility to protect their employees' health, safety and welfare whilst at work. They have a duty to provide suitable training, protective equipment, clothing, safety procedures and security to all employees. When an injury occurs there should be a strict procedure and reporting process in place too.

In 2015/16 an estimated 621,000 people in the UK sustained injuries in the workplace according to the Labour Force Survey. Of those injured workers over 150,000 of them were then unable to work for more than 7 days.

Accidents at work can include slips, trips, machinery-caused injuries, chemical induced injuries, falls from height (such as scaffolding or ladders), being hit by falling or moving objects and physical

assault. They can also include injuries caused by animals, electricity, fire, explosions or from repetitive working practices (Repetitive Strain Injury).

Accidents at work happen regardless of your occupation or the industry that you work in - whether you work in an office, factory or building site.

If there has been a breach of duty by an employer which leads to an injury in the workplace then you could have the right to make a claim and seek compensation.

Lamb Brooks recently represented a client, Mr A*, who fell whilst clearing a flat roof and coating it in insulation and EPDM coating. Mr A had already cleared 4 pieces of plywood from the roof and as he picked up a further 2 pieces, he fell through a hole that was being covered by the said plywood. Mr A fell 6 metres landing heavily onto a sheet

of plywood and sustaining fractures to his spine. As a result of his injuries, Mr A was unable to return to his occupation



as a Roofer and was only fit for light industrial work and semi-sedentary work only. We secured a settlement of £125,000.00.

BASINGSTOKE CIVIL SERVICE RETIREMENT FELLOWSHIP

At the group's meeting on 2nd August the speaker was Rosy Hardy of Hardy's Cottage Garden Plants at Freefolk near Whitchurch who have been exhibiting at Chelsea for 25 years and won 25 RHS Gold Medals. Rosy gave an interesting and informative talk starting by giving a history of her nursery from its beginnings in Camberley and describing some of her exhibits at Chelsea with this year's Circle of Colour being 120 square metres in size. She then went on to explained how important it was to put plants together that enjoy the same soil conditions and having brought with her a variety of plants was able to suggest and demonstrate how to combine different plants for certain areas of the garden. Heuchera for instance come from the North American forest so prefer wet rich soil in semi-shade while grasses like clay soil with sun and plenty of space and hardy geraniums will grow almost anywhere. She also explained how and when cutting down and dividing should be done for the different species she had with her. After a number of questions people had the opportunity to buy some of the plants and obtain a signed copy of Rosy's new book "25 Years of Chelsea".

HEAD TEACHER SALLY JENKINS LEAVES ST MARK'S SCHOOL

The last day of the summer term saw all the children of St Mark's school on Danebury Road in Hatch Warren bid a sad farewell to Sally Jenkins who has been head of this school



for the last eight years. Cards, flowers and many kinds of gifts from grateful parents as well as staff decorated her office as a sign of the affection they have for this remarkable and modest, woman.

St Mark's school is by far the largest in the area with 630 pupils from Year R to Year 6 (ages from 4 to 11). This requires substantial staffing levels with 34 teachers, 42 teaching assistants, 5 breakfast club, 19 lunch supervisors, 6 administrators and up to 11 governors.

St Mark's school is a CofE aided school which means that there is an emphasis on the Christian values of growing and living together with the ethos of Faith, Hope, Love and Forgiveness. Sally, as a member of the governors, has followed the policy that the school was set up for the benefit of the community with living in the catchment area coming before the faith criterion. In fact children of all faiths and none are welcome.

The school was rated as "Good" in the Ofsted report of 2014 and SIAMS (the Statutory Inspection of Anglian and Methodist Schools) rated the school as outstanding in 2016.

Why is Sally Jenkins leaving?

Sally explained. "This is the right time for me to move on as I have seen a complete cohort of children arriving in Year R and leaving at the end of Year 6. I have always sought to do what is best for the children and had to work hard for every child in my time here so that they are involved. This is why we have three different performances each year that allow all children to take part. Years R, I and 2 have the Nativity play, Years 3 and 4 the Crucifixion and, as many parents saw in the last full week of term, Years 5 and 6 put on splendid performances of Beauty and the Beast." Sally feels it is important that new blood with new thinking is necessary to ensure that St Mark's continues to make progress.

Graham Robins has been chair of governors for the last four years. He was a member of the interview panel that appointed Sally to the headship and they have worked very closely over the years addressing difficult issues, both with pupils and staff, and lately with the financial pressures that all schools currently face. "In all these discussions" Graham said, "whilst a solution has not always been obvious, Sally would always say — I have a plan — and usually she would have an innovative solution."

"During her time at the school, Sally has made many changes, not for the sake of change but always to improve the school, its results and always to enhance the pupils' experiences and enjoyment of the school. It was therefore with some sadness that I accepted Sally's decision to leave, as in her words, she felt that she could not improve the school anymore, and it was therefore time for her to move on."

Graham was fulsome in his praise, "I, for one, will miss Sally but I wish her well for whatever the future holds for her, and I thank her for everything she has done for St Mark's."

The Rev'd Michael Smith is also a governor, being appointed on his installation as vicar of Immanuel Church which is based in the school building. He remembers vividly meeting Sally Jenkins as she was part of his interview panel and was immediately struck with her warmth and the welcome she gave him when he became involved with St Mark's school.

"I was conscious that a few fences needed to be mended between church and school but Sally made this easy and we began a wonderful three year partnership. I spent most Mondays and Tuesdays in term time stood at the gate with Sally saying hello to parents and carers as they dropped off the children. This time was valuable in catching up with Sally with discussions about family life, the church and school life."

Fr Michael was impressed with the school from the first day he walked into it. "It has a warm feeling and the Christian ethos that ran through it — not rammed down anyone's throat, because that's not Sally's style, but a steady thread that ran all the way through.

The children were always pleased to see Sally. Throughout it was clear that she was driven by what is best for the children. They took priority; it was as simple as that." What's the future for Sally Jenkins and St Mark's school? Sally is to become a schools inspector for SIAMS whose principal objective is to evaluate the distinctiveness and effectiveness of church aided schools.

The new head teacher of St Mark's school is Charles Applegate who comes from King's Furlong Junior School in Basingstoke where he was head teacher. He has a hard act to follow but no doubt he will strive to build on Sally Jenkins' reputation which can only be good.

KEMPSHOTT CONSERVATION GROUP

In **Down Grange Meadow** the drought conditions during May and June with a very warm spell in mid June meant that flowers were very slow to get into growth and this had a knock on effect on the early butterflies. However, for butterflies things started getting into their stride by the end of May. Our first flush of Small Blues was recorded in the meadow on 28th May. While our friends at Old Down record a lot of this uncommon and priority species, we are finding more and more of this charming little butterfly, albeit in small numbers. As the season developed it was clear that we have our own (very) small breeding population.

As the weather turned wet, at long last, the flowers started growing. Bird's-foot-trefoil (Lotus corniculatus) was appearing in places in the meadow that have not been seeded and existing clumps were expanding where we have scraped and seeded. B-F-T, as we'll call it, is an important plant with a number of species of butterflies and moths that use it exclusively. It can often been seen growing as a mass of yellow flowers in roadside verges around the town. It can, fortunately, cope with the ravages of regular cutting.

It was a great year for orchids with them popping up in places where we expected them as well new sites scattered across the meadow. The two triangles that were scraped and seeded in 2014 looked a picture this summer, demonstrating that it takes 3-5 years for a newly seeded flower meadow to come into its own.

EMPLOYMENT TRIBUNAL FEES

If you've paid Employment Tribunal fees since 2013, or if you did not bring a claim because you could not afford the fees, there may be some good news for you.

That's the verdict of Gill Brown, head of the Employment Team at Phillips Solicitors, following a Supreme Court ruling.

The court has ruled that fees charged for making Employment Tribunal claims are unlawful.

The decision was brought about by UNISON, which is one of the UK's largest trade unions, successfully arguing that the fees had prevented workers from accessing justice.

Gill, based at the firm's Town Gate offices in London Road, Basingstoke, said: "The Ministry of Justice has agreed to repay Tribunal fees collected from employees and we look forward to hearing how those claims can be made.

"It is also possible that claims not brought because of prohibitively expensive fees, might be given time to claim."

Fees of up to £1,200 were introduced by the Government in 2013 with the aim of reducing the number of malicious and weak cases.

A Government review found the number of cases taken to Employment Tribunals had fallen by 70 per cent following the introduction.

Now anyone who feels they have been treated illegally or unfairly at work will no longer have to pay to take their employers to court.

In their ruling the Supreme Court judges said: "A significant number of people have found the fees unaffordable."

If you feel you were unfairly dismissed, discriminated against, suffered a breach of contract or had any other claim which you wished to pursue between July 2013 to July 2017, but did not take action because of the cost of the fees, contact us as soon as possible — we'd be happy to look at your case. Any delay in contacting us may affect your ability to pursue a claim.

PROBUS FIRST LUNCH **OF THE 2017 SEASON**

Dr Nick Waring, the new President of the Probus Club of Basingstoke, had an interesting first lunch of the new season at the Test Valley Golf Club. The Club had twin guests of honour, the Worshipful the Mayor of Basingstoke & Deane BC, Cllr Paul Frankum, and also his mother Cllr lane Frankum who is the Lady Mayoress. On behalf of the Probus Club Dr Waring presented a cheque to the Mayor in aid of his charity appeal. The speaker was retired RAFWing Commander, Bryan Jenkins, from Sherfield on Loddon, who gave an audio visual presentation about his experiences as an engineering officer in the Cold War at a RAF Vulcan station.

Bryan, himself a member of the Probus Club of Basingstoke and president of the Basingstoke branch of the RAFA, told about his years at RAF Waddington in Lincolnshire which along with nine other RAF stations in eastern England was home to the V bomber nuclear strike force in the early/mid 1960s. The Avro Vulcan, with its famous delta wing design was joined by the Handley Page Victor and the Vickers Valiant.

Probus members were alarmed to hear about the change of UK government defence policy in the swinging sixties. Pre 1960 they had the land based Blue Streak intercontinental ballistic missile. This was cancelled in February 1960 going instead for an air craft based system using the Blue Steel air to ground missile. The Blue Steel was easily fitted to the Vulcan. However this was cancelled after two months when the UK decided to buy the US built Skybolt missile. But this was cancelled by the US in December 1962 in preference to a submarine task force that would be able to fire the Polaris intercontinental ballistic missile. The UK had to follow suit and the



Royal Navy took on the role of nuclear deterrence in lune 1969 with nuclear powered submarines that could launch this sea to land missile. The V bomber nuclear defence programme was abandoned, the planes re-roling with tactical nuclear weapons and conventional ordnance.

However before this final change of direction there were interesting and occasionally alarming times at RAF Waddington. Of 27 Vulcans based at this station three were on constant standby fully fuelled and loaded with nuclear weapons ready to be in the air within the famous four minute warning. The Vulcan flight crew of five officers were not allowed off base during their period of duty. All three crews lived, ate and slept adjacent to their aircraft.

On one practice scramble the pilot could not unlock the door to enter the Vulcan. This was because the lock had frozen so he had to do what many motorists had to do in the winter back then, he warmed the lock and key with his cigarette lighter. It beggars belief what would have happened if he was a non-smoker and this was a real emergency.

And yet RAF Waddington was selected to be an airfield that could accept civilian aircraft that had developed in flight faults. This meant having to spread foam on the runway to help planes land when their undercarriage would not go down securely. It could then take up to eight hours to have the runway clear and ready for the Vulcans to take off. Fortunately they never experienced a four minute warning during these episodes.

Even though they did not always carry nuclear bombs, the Vulcan could carry twenty one 1000 lbs iron bombs and it was necessary to undertake regular bombing practice. This was usually without ordnance and the Vulcan would be airborne for five hours at a time. To ensure the highest skills and keep up morale there were regular bombing competitions against the USAF. The famous attack on Stanley airfield in the Falklands was made by a Vulcan using conventional 1000 lb iron bombs and the plane was refuelled mid flight by converted V bombers, the Handley Page Victor.

All Vulcans had the capability to refuel in flight and they even went nonstop to Australia which meant in flight refuelling operations, some at night. There was a problem in that although the refuelling probe was illuminated by a spot light for the pilot of the Vulcan to guide it on to the trailing drogue, it really was not bright enough. Bryan had to find a solution, but had to use existing kit and was not permitted to go outside to obtain the ideal solution. No doubt the MoD was conscious that they must not over spend their budget.

The last Vulcan squadron was disbanded in March 1984 leaving only the display team to fly on for many years.

THE SPICE RESTAURANT

"Let's go for a curry" That oft' used expression heard after a night in the pub could not be the excuse for eating at the Spice Restaurant on Pack Lane in Kempshott. There is not a pub in sight of this Indian restaurant and it's set in the middle of domestic property on what is recognised as one of the best roads in the area.

My son and daughter in law came with madam and I the last Saturday night in July. The pleasant dining room could probably accommodate getting on for forty covers but on our night it was only half full. However there were a couple of customers waiting for their take away selection. Perhaps it was because it was the start of the school holidays, or, because we arrived at 8.00 p.m. other diners may have come and gone already. The fact that this Indian restaurant has been here for twenty four years shows that it has a good following. And quite right, too.

Commencing with papadoms and a selection of pickles two of us chose a starter of sheek kebab and the other two onion bhajees. The secret here is that the onion bhajees, which are almost the size of tennis balls, come in pairs and so do the kebabs so we all had one of each. For our mains my son had madhu maugh (fillet of chicken in a special sauce of cream, honey and cashew nuts), daughter in law chose lamb passanda, and I had chicken tikka masala with the three of us having plain rice. Madam had lamb tandoori with salad and naan bread.

Our drinks consisted of two pints of Indian lager, a pint of diet coke and a large glass of Pinot Grigio.

We were amply replete and so we ignored the dessert selection consisting of various ice cream concoctions.

Coffee afterwards completed a very enjoyable meal which I felt was good value for £93.40 plus tip considering the pleasant atmosphere, attentive service and high quality food. And the heated towel for each diner was a nice touch.



SPIRITUALLY SPEAKING

In the aftermath of the feeding of the 5,000 (somewhat 'fake news' as that number was only the number of men there), Jesus took time out up a mountain and sent his disciples off into their boat..... 'When evening came, he was there alone, but by this time the boat, battered by the waves, was far from the land, for the wind was against them. And early in the morning he came walking towards them on the lake. But when the disciples saw him walking on the lake, they were terrified, saying, 'It is a ghost!' And they cried out in fear. But immediately Jesus spoke to them and said, 'Take heart, it is I; do not be afraid.'

Peter answered him, 'Lord, if it is you, command me to come to you on the water.' He said, 'Come.' So Peter

got out of the boat, started walking on the water, and came towards Jesus. But when he noticed the strong wind, he became frightened, and beginning to sink, he cried out, 'Lord, save me!' Jesus immediately reached out his hand and caught him, saying to him, 'You of little faith, why did you doubt?' When they got into the boat, the wind ceased. And those in the boat worshipped him, saying, 'Truly you are the Son of God.'

There's a book by John Ortberg titled 'if you want to walk on water, you've got to get out of the boat.' I have to confess that it's on my Kindle, having joined a queue of others that I'm still to read! However, I like the title and it's something I've reflected on recently.

We live in a rather sanitised society; how often are we encouraged, or do we encourage others, to 'get out of the boat'? In the passage above from St Matthew's Gospel, the disciples, who were fishermen and used to storms, were crouched, scared of the storm. It was Peter, who so often opens his mouth and says what everyone else is thinking, who has the courage to ask Jesus to 'command me to come to you on the water...' Jesus commanded and Peter walked.

It is so easy for us in this day and age to hide behind 'health and safety' and risk assessments and play safe and not take chances, to be a little foolish or even reckless. Of course, it's not recommended all the time, but sometimes we need to take that metaphorical step out of the boat into the unknown and trust that everything will be ok and that we'll come through the experience.

And of course, it is often in difficult experiences that we learn the most. Often when we are faced with challenges we do come out the other side having discovered more about ourselves. Those of us who are Christians or have a faith, might look back on these experiences and reflect that during those times we have felt the closest to God or felt God's presence with us more.

In the Gospel passage, it is only when Peter takes his eyes off Jesus that he begins to sink and it is Jesus' outstretched hand that reassures and saves him. It is important for us in our lives to have a focus — and I would suggest that if we focus on Jesus then we have the reassurance of a constantly outstretched hand for us to guide and help us and in those moments when we start to sink, to pull us up.

This month there are plenty of people who will be stepping onto the water out of the boat. The start of a new school year will mean that lots of children will start new school years with a new teacher and there will be those who are moving to new schools. At Immanuel we will be praying for all those in this position. Candles will be lit and we will remember the young people of



our community as they take this big step. There will also be teachers starting new schools or taking on new responsibilities as well as newly qualified teachers.

At St Mark's School we enter a new era with Charles Applegate taking up the position of Head Teacher following Sally Jenkins' departure at the end of last term. We will be holding him and the school community in our prayers as he builds on Sally's successful time at St Mark's. I would ask you to pray for the school community too. You can read more about Sally's time at St Mark's elsewhere in The Rabbiter. I was privileged to have worked with her since beginning my ministry here three years ago and I look forward very much to working with Charles.

In other Immanuel news, we're delighted that our toddler group has a new leader in Pippa Barrowclough. Little Angels meets in the Community Centre every Thursday morning from 9.45am – 11.15am in term time. It's an amazing group that's been going for over 20 years and over that time great friendships have been formed. We're also really consicous that there are people in our community who are alone during the day. We offer as much support and help as we can to those who have retired, including our monthly 'Golden Years' group that meets at Immanuel on the 2nd Friday of each month from I 0am. For all those starting something new in September and stepping out of the boat, you will be in my thoughts and prayers. Blessings in your new beginnings.



OLD DOWN AND BEGGARWOOD WILDLIFE GROUP

The wildflowers on both on Old Down and Beggarwood during June and July have again been fantastic. Indeed the increase of wildflowers on Beggarwood compared to last

year is really noticeable and that has meant an increase in butterflies, bees and bugs. It is particularly lovely to see more butterflies and this July there is definitely a good number around on both sites. Beggarwood is looking really good this summer due to the wildflowers becoming well established – such as banks of rosebay willow herb, a substantial patch of pyramidal orchids, groups of orange hawkweed and a mix of knapweed and ladies bedstraw. Here in the South, Orange hawkweed has the local name of 'fox and cubs' (in other areas known as 'grim the collier') - surprisingly it is rare to see on Old Down but seems to have taken to Beggarwood.

The LNR (Local Natural Reserve) designation for Beggarwood is imminent and may actually be in place by the time this report is published. The Group and the council work together on site management plans and have recently agreed a two year 'cut and clear' rotation for most of the site with a few areas needing an annual rotation. 'Cut and clear' encourages the wildflowers and strengthens bushes and shrubs and, of course, keeps paths clear. General cutting back and tidying up and also the spreading of flower seeds is carried out by the work parties — so please try to come along to help out as the Group is rather short of hands for Beggarwood.

Work parties: For Old Down, we meet outside Old Down Hall every Thursday 10-12noon; For Beggarwood, we meet monthly at The Maze, usually on the third Saturday of the month 10-12noon. Always check our website just in case there is a change in dates and also for further information about work parties and events.
