Planning Permission has now been granted by Basingstoke and Deane Council for additional allotments to be provided as an extension to the existing site at the top of Beggarwood Park. It is hoped that these will be ready later this year. There is already a waiting list for this site but if you would like to investigate the possibility of having a plot in Basingstoke to grow your own fruit and vegetables talk to the Allotment Officer at Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council.

SPRING EMPLOYMENT LAW UPDATE

- Gender Pay Gap Reporting all employers with 250 employees or more (as at April 2017) should have already published their first gender pay gap data. This is now an annual requirement and may lead to an increase in equal pay claims being brought if employees believe that they are not receiving equal pay.
- National Living/Minimum Wage Increases – With effect from 1st April 2018 the National Living Wage for workers aged 25 and over increased to £7.83 per hour and National Minimum Wage rates increased to £7.38 per hour for workers aged 21 to 24, to £5.90 per hour for workers aged 18 to 20

and to \pounds 4.20 for workers under 18 who are no longer of compulsory school age.

- Family Friendly Statutory Payment Rate Increases - With effect from 1st April 2018 the weekly rate of statutory maternity, paternity, adoption and shared parental pay increased to £145.18.
- Statutory Sick Pay Rate Increase As of Friday 6 April the weekly rate of SSP increases to £92.05.
- Statutory Redundancy Pay Increase

 As of Friday 6 April the new weekly
 cap used to calculate the statutory
 redundancy payment increases to £508.
- Tax Treatment of Notice Payments As of Friday 6 April 2018 there has been an important change to the rules relating to taxation of termination payments.

This change means that it is no longer possible to pay a departing



employee's payment in lieu of notice (PILON) as a tax free sum under the £30,000 tax exemption rules if there is no PILON clause in their contract, no custom and practice of paying PILON or implied right. Whether or not the employer has a contractual right, all PILON payments are now taxable and the £30,000 exemption will no longer apply.

COUNCILLOR UPDATE

Hampshire County Council is a £2 billion business. Many of the services it provides are not high-profile but nonetheless essential, especially so for the members of our community and their families who receive them.

Adult Care takes a huge slice of the budget and Children's Care takes another. These are statutory responsibilities, and over the last decade we have been increasing the proportion of the County budget that is spent in these areas.

We try to support our older citizens in their own homes for as long as possible, which means they can be secure without having to move into care homes. Looking after children whose family lives are difficult or who need specialist care is another vital part of our work.

As the highways authority, Hampshire is responsible for the roads and planning for new roads. At the moment, potholes are a major concern, brought on by the extended freezing weather than only ended a few weeks ago. I recently reported some very awkwardly placed ones approaching the Kempshott roundabout and they have been temporarily filled. An issue on which design work is being carried out is improving the capacity of the A30 from the M3 to the Ring Road. This stretch is likely to get busier and the Brighton Hill roundabout is congested at peak times.

Although Hampshire doesn't collect your household waste (the Borough Council does that) it is responsible for disposing of it. Hampshire runs the recycling centres and also the incinerators. The incineration policy means that only a very small proportion of Hampshire's waste goes into landfill, and the incinerators generate electricity for feeding back into the Grid.

As a County Councillor, I control a devolved budget of £8,000 per year. I can use this to support good causes. Last year I was pleased to help the new Beggarwood Community Centre purchase a coffee machine and the Kempshott Village Hall to finance part of its refurbishment. If you are involved in a cause that helps the people of this area, I might be able to help. The scheme starts again in June.



We recently launched Same Day Delivery options for customers, placing an order before Midday.We'll then deliver the order in slots after 5pm, on the same day.

PROBUS HAS A TASTE OF THE VYNE

The history of this local Tudor Palace, situated south of Bramley, and its much publicised roof project were the subject of a talk given by Chris Burrows to the Probus Club of Basingstoke, the social organisation for retired professional and business managers.

Oakley resident Chris, is a member of the Basingstoke Archaeology Society and he has been a volunteer with the National Trust since 1991. He has been involved in previous surveys at The Vyne and once found a flint knife. Earlier surveys had been conducted by the eminent archaeologist Sir Mortimer Wheeler.



Built originally in 1268 the building was added to over the years. Sir William Sandys, despite being a staunch Catholic, managed to hold on to his position as Lord Chamberlain to King Henry VIII after the creation of the Protestant Church of England following the refusal of the Pope to the King's divorce of Katherine of Aragon. He had developed the property into a Tudor palace, and had the honour and great cost of being a recipient of the





Illustration of the Tudor palace at the time of the visit of King Henry VIII



King Henry VIII and Queen Anne Boleyn's "progress" in 1535. Many portraits of the Tudor period can be seen today in the Oak Gallery.

Also to be seen today in the Stone Gallery is a terracotta plaque of the Roman Emperor Probus who introduced wine making into England. It is thought that it is possible that this plaque was obtained in the 16th century and may have contributed to naming this residence, The Vyne. There is no connection between this emperor and the Probus Club which is simply a joining of the first three letters of Professional and Business managers.

Baron Sandys endowed the Holy Ghost chapel in Basingstoke and is buried there. The painted glass windows from the chapel were installed at The Vyne, some of which underwent restoration in 2016.

Chaloner Chute, a lawyer and politician, bought the Tudor palace in 1653 and demolished it in 1665, rebuilding in the Palladium style. In 1767 John Chute began further modernisation and installed the grand staircase that can be seen today. The Chute family continued to own The Vyne, with most male descendents named Chaloner, and was lived in until 1939 when it was taken over by Tomore prep school after it was evacuated from Deal in Kent. It was bequeathed, by Sir Charles Chute, to the National Trust in 1956.

With a building this old there was always plenty of remedial work needed to keep the fabric secure but over the years of patching up the extensive roof it was decided that the complete removal and replacement with modern standard of insulation was the best course of action. The work started in 2014 and is just coming to an end. It has involved the erection of a cover over the whole building including a lift for materials and passengers. Some chimneys were taken down so that a walkway could be constructed around the complex for the use of just under 150,000 visitors. The last visitors were on 28 February 2018 when the walkway was removed so that the original chimneys could be rebuilt.

Pre Tudor timber roofing was discovered, including the use of part of a staircase which proved that recycling was in vogue hundreds of years ago. The lead from the gullies has been reformed and reused and new parapets and finials been carved. Lime mortar has been used throughout the restoration as it will match the original construction. Special provision has been made for the bats so that they can continue to occupy parts of the roof.

70,000 handmade tiles have been used of which nearly 13,000 were bought by visitors in the "Tagatile" scheme allowing personal messages to be written and raising £64,000 toward the cost of this project of £5,400,000.

It will take three months to remove the roof covering and 41 miles of scaffolding to reveal the highly skilled workmanship to the rest of the world. Without the use of a helicopter or aerial photographs no one else will be able to wonder at the skill levels used by the renovation team over the last four years.



LANDLORD'S WORST NIGHTMARE

It is every landlord's worst nightmare - you have let out a property and everything was going fine, but suddenly without notice the rent payments have stopped.

Your calls to your tenant are not returned and If the tenant refuses to leave the property once you have had no response from your letters, while at the same time the money to pay the mortgage has dried-up - what do you do?

There are legal steps you can follow to get the tenant out of the property.

However, it is vital that you obtain proper legal advice as if the correct procedure is not followed to the letter, the Court may well adjourn the case, causing delay and even result in your claim being struck out, meaning you have to start the process all over again.

The first step is issue a 'formal notice that must be correctly drafted and properly served. You cannot just take back possession without following the legal process otherwise you could find yourself in trouble with the law.

the notice expires then you will need to apply to the Court to obtain a Possession Order.

Unfortunately court cases are not always quick, due to the workload of all courts, so the sooner you issue a notice and deal with matters the better. If the tenant does not leave the property once a possession order is made, then the Court can instruct a bailiff to carry out the eviction.

After enjoying lots of chocolate eggs over the Easter holidays, the children of Hatch Warren Under Fives started the new term with the exciting project of hatching some real eggs with our sister preschool, Kempshott Under Fives. It has been a brilliant experience for the children to follow all of the stages from egg to chick over the past two weeks. The eggs were hatched in an incubator and then the chicks moved into a special heated box where the children could feed them and watch them grow! Our little chicks have now gone off to enjoy some more space at the farm.

There has been more excitement for our older children who have recently found out which schools they will be going to in September, it's been lovely to hear all about the "big" schools and who is going where. So this term is when our "school readiness" begins. We will begin to introduce lots of activities to prepare our bigger children, for example, can the children change into their PE kit by themselves? Can they independently wash their hands and open the food in their lunchbox? We'll also start to focus much more on numbers, health and self-care and communication and language.

School readiness is described in the foundation stage as "Children reaching a good level of development in the prime areas and literacy and mathematics".

Some of the expected characteristics that should be displayed by a child to show school readiness;

- Independent in toileting
- Able to dress themselves
- Understands expected levels of behaviour
- Confidence and self-esteem
- Can take turns and share
- Can sit still for a short period
- Can separate from parents/carers
- Communication and language skills needed to communicate needs and listen to others

• Can actively learn and creatively and critically think

Some of these characteristics may of course be difficult for all children to achieve and this shouldn't leave parents or practitioners concerned that a child isn't school ready.

At Hatch Warren Under Fives we work hard to ensure that our staff are trained to the highest possible levels so that we create high standards of education and care for our children. As part of our commitment to providing the best care possible, we have recently applied for Millie's Mark - the gold standard in early years first aid. The aims of Millie's Mark are to keep children safe and minimise risk and accidents by raising standards in paediatric first aid; increasing numbers of first aid-trained staff; increasing competency in applying first aid; enabling staff to respond quickly in emergencies; raising the quality and skills of the early years workforce and helping them with day-to-day first aid issues, such as allergies; and providing reassurance to parents.

The rigorous application process for Millie's Mark takes three to six months and involves intensive support from a mentor, completion of an audit, risk assessment and spot checks.

We are very excited about our application and will keep you updated with our progress!

Other exciting staff news is the appointment of Pam Jones as our Preschool Manager. Congratulations to Pam, a wonderful member of staff, who has been our Deputy for many years!

If, like me, you worry about 'drink and driving' you will welcome the arrival of a restaurant that you can easily walk to and have a special priced lunch menu! I recently met a dear friend for lunch at the newly opened 'Miller and Carter' restaurant on Down Grange – I wanted to try their fixed price lunch menu, \pounds 10.95 for two courses or \pounds 13.95 for three. A gentle walk across Down Grange brought me to the door of the newly refurbished restaurant. I often wonder about the history of this lovely building – was it once home to a family? (Note to self, find out about the history of Down Grange.) It was about 1.45pm when we arrived but the restaurant was still fairly busy – booking is advised (www. millerandcarter.co.uk). We ordered the obligatory glass of wine – the Malbec is very good – and considered the menu. The wine eventually arrived and we ordered our lunch. The starters arrived in good time, Salt and Pepper Calamari and Baked Mushrooms were both hot and good – I usually avoid calamari as it can often resemble fried rubber bands but these were soft and juicy. The mains took a little longer to arrive – I like to think that they were being cooked freshly to order by the chef. The Chicken Schnitzel with skinny fries and salad was tasty and my friend tucked into her Beef Dripping Glazed Steak with relish. We didn't have a pudding as we were both already rather full but did have coffee. The bill arrived and with a tip to our lovely waiter the cost was £25 each perhaps next time I will have a small glass of wine and no coffee!

Miller and Carter have a great reputation. Their steak is good and well cooked. I am told that they can trace the meat back to the farm where it came from which is impressive. However the service was rather slow so not the place to go for a quick lunch – it was after 3.30pm when we left.

It's not any different however large or small the church or parish is. Everyone must have an APCM. It is a chance to look back on the past year and forward to the year and years coming. The meeting is divided into two parts that are enshrined in history and therefore seem, at times, to be a bit unnecessary and 'odd'! The first part, known as a 'Vestry Meeting' is for the election of Churchwardens and Sidespeople. The former are positions appointed by the Bishop and carry legal status. In theory, anyone from the parish can attend a Vestry Meeting – here that could be almost 11,000 people!

This was my fourth (and final) APCM and in looking back and reviewing what has happened, as a church we have always sought to reach out to the community. Our mission is not to 'bible bash' people into submission – or into church, but to do what we are asked by Jesus to do – to be servants in our community; to love others as ourselves; to take care of those who need care.

Jesus said, "This is my commandment: love one another as I have loved you. There is no greater love than this: to lay down one's life for one's friends." God sent Jesus as a reminder of his great and unending love for us and we are asked to love one another.

• As a church community, we're a relatively small group of people

but we do what we can – we run a group for those who are retired
– Golden Years. And we have a monthly community breakfast. I

am proud of the welcoming nature of the church community, the

living out of the Gospel as we welcome new people on a Sunday

• to our worshipping community and the hospitality we provide.

• It is part of the 'Christian presence in every community' that the

Church of England provides. We don't ask people to be members

before they can 'use' our services – legally we have to baptise
those in the parish who ask for it, marry those in the parish

who want to be married in church and conduct the funerals of those who die in the parish. This, for me is a real privilege – to be involved with people at some of the most important times of their lives; to provide a service that isn't dependent on anything, but a desire to connect with the church at an important time. And with all of this comes a free pastoral care service – a service that can be called upon at any time.

Four years ago, when I was licensed in Hatch Warren and Beggarwood, I was given the 'cure of souls' by the Bishop of Winchester. It means that I am here to offer pastoral support and care for anyone who lives in the parish. And that is an immense privilege and one that I don't take lightly. As I look back on the work of the church here in this community, I thank God that we've had that privilege, that we've got involved in people's lives and will continue to do so – will continue to do so long after I have gone!

As many will know, I am leaving Hatch Warren and Beggarwood for pastures new in the summer. My last service will be at 10am on Sunday 12th August and I will be Collated (licensed) as Rector in the parish of Winton, Moordown and Charminster (Bournemouth) on Thursday 6th September at 7.30pm.






