ENGLISH & MATHS TUITION AT COMMUNITY CENTRE

Does your child struggle at times in maths and English? Many parents consider this at various times during their child's school years and perhaps are put off by not knowing what, if anything, they can do about it.

An answer to this problem can now be found at the Hatch Warren Community Centre where a new class started in January. Run by experienced and highly qualified, teachers, specialising in maths and English their aim is to tutor children in these important subjects throughout their school years, from Reception up to year 11, including those worrisome SATS and GCSE years.

Under the name of Hampshire Learning they have been successfully running two sessions each week at Rooksdown Community Centre and are now running these academic booster classes at HWCC on Wednesdays all year round. This professional operation is run by Kiron Gill BA and Narinder Dhothar MA, who base their teaching on the latest national curriculum helping students with preparation for the major examinations and improving their progress at school.

"We find that the earlier children begin to prepare for these examinations the better. We focus on strengthening their Foundation knowledge in the earlier years to build confidence and we encourage them to take ownership of their independent learning. This allows them to build the key skills and techniques they will need in exams for many years to come. By engaging them in a way that suits each child's learning style, we see students finding joy in understanding subjects that they couldn't before" Narinder explained.

The class time is 3.30 - 6.00 pm and pupils come at a time to suit themselves, for between thirty minutes to an hour dependent on age and the subject choice. The monthly cost is £55 for a single subject or discounted at £95 if two subjects are undertaken. See www.hampshirelearning. co.uk for more information.

MINI PROFESSORS AT THE COMMUNITY CENTRE

Mini Professors

It's never too early to learn about scientific subjects. That's the view of new classes on Fridays at the Hatch Warren Community Centre, designed specifically for preschool children.

Each forty minutes session makes science fun and enjoyable for young children with a wide range of subject matters covering the two year programme. They will learn something new each week from germs to chromatography or making clouds as well as all time favourites such as dinosaurs and space.



All the children wear mini white lab coats and they love becoming involved with two hands on experiments each session. There is a specific story and short video about the topic of the day. There is lots of fun and there is normally a "I didn't know that" moment for the parents too.

The children learn about the basic principles of scientific experimentation and it is a great opportunity to prepare them for pre-school and school. Parents are encouraged to join in too and carry on the learning experience at home with their children.

Friday 3rd February is the start date with the first class at 10 am - 10.40 am for 2 -3 year olds with a second class 11.00 am - 11.40 am for 3 - 5 year olds. There is a maximum of 14 children to each class which are in term time only. Cost is £6.50 for each session and there is the opportunity of a free taster class always provided that there is space available on the day.

HATCH WARREN RUNNERS

'New Year, new me'. That old adage comes to the fore for many of us after the overindulgences of the festive season. Not all runners find the time to keep up their fitness routine over this period and so not surprisingly, our numbers have continued to swell since the 1st of January, with many new faces joining club runs and some of the 'old faces' getting back to their routines! If proof were needed, on January 7th, Basingstoke parkrun boasted a remarkable 568 finishers; 63 more than ever recorded and 37 of whom were 'Hatchies'.

In December, on a foggy cold morning, HWR's latest group of novice runners completed their first ever 5k parkrun. having taken part in the 9 week 'Couch to 5k' course coached by leaders and helpers from the club. Each received a well-earnt club medal and were supported and accompanied by other Hatchies around the course. Many of them are now ready to embark on their next challenge to complete a 10k event. This now brings the total number of local people HWR has helped get from their couch to a 5k since 2013, to 150, with the vast majority having remained active members of the club. Some have since completed 10k, half marathons, marathons and endurance events, proving that no matter what your age or experience anything is possible with the right support to achieve it!

Spring marathons and half marathons (including Brighton, London, Reading, Fleet, Farnborough) are just a few weeks away and this means that a good number of us are now well into longer training runs, with groups catering for all abilities and paces. In other news, we are thrilled to advise that the HWR 24 hour relay event which took place at the end of November, supported by Sainsbury's Kempshott raised over £2.5k for Naomi House Children's Hospice. This now brings the amount raised for charities by HWR to a 'whopping' £85,000 in less than 4 years!

MINISTRY OF JUSTICE PROPOSALS TO RAISE THE SMALL CLAIMS LIMIT TO £5,000.00

A government consultation process proposing a range of measures to reduce or scrap damages awards for some personal injury claims is underway. Under current proposals injuries could be graded and damages fixed according to the duration of the injury, which could involve injuries lasting up to two years.

Key changes would see the Small Claims Limit rise to £5,000.00 and this could be applied to all types of personal injury claims.

Justice Minister Sir Oliver Heald took part in a House of Commons debate on 11th January 2017 and gave no indication that the Government would back track on its plans. Although Claimants would still be able to bring their own cases before the Small Claims Court they would not be able to recover costs and so would have to carefully consider the economics of seeking legal advice.

The widely held perception is that the measures will eradicate fraudulent whiplash claims but the proposed limit would also apply to broken ribs, a fractured leg or wrist for example.

The Association of Personal Injury Lawyers (APIL) has made representations to the Government insisting that raising the Small Claims Limit to £5,000.00 would restrict access to justice but would not stop fraud. Claimants running a claim without legal representation face the risk of being undercompensated. 

PROBUS LEARN ABOUT THE ART/SCIENCE OF THE DOWSER

Michael Haxeltine, a member of the British Society of Dowsers, gave an abridged presentation to the Probus Club of Basingstoke, which was a snap shot of the extensive breadth of this subject. His normal presentation can be an all day affair but he had to make do with one hour.

Most of us have heard about water divining. The speaker gave other instances of its practical use and told of an instance where he had been able to identify 15 out of 17 known problems found by CCTV in a 200 m drain. However not many attendees knew about the extensive use made by dowsers in all manner of circumstances and the speaker gave practical demonstrations to help his cause.

And members of this social club for retired professional and business managers were encouraged to take part. One member sat with an open design pyramid over his head for half an hour which when removed was shown to have created an aura of about 75 cms around him. The weighted end of a flexible metal rod was seen to rise when placed in the middle of the pyramid. Similar open pyramids have been proven to help seeds germinate by raising local temperature. A torch beam made a dowsing rod move down the light beam which was explained because light is a mix of waves and particles.

All present had a dowsing rod made of a wire coat hanger with a right angle handle which we had to use to search for articles previously hidden in the room. Some had success but others had to count backwards to stabilise their mental position. One volunteer had the left side of his body checked by a dowsing rod to identify any old injuries. Some foods were checked if still suitable to eat by suspending a pendulum over it, similar in style to a plumb line, and if it rotated clockwise the food was edible.

Everyone had a corrugated plastic pipe with a weighted end called a bobber which if rotated clockwise had been used to find oil fields. All down to our mental process, apparently. Medical work had also been successfully penetrated with the pendulum – plumb line – used in vascular dementia



and distance healing. The pendulum is currently under experimentation at the Savill Garden near Windsor where it is being used to establish if when plants are set in a magnetic orientation grow differently to others of the same species. Whilst at these famous gardens he was able to find an ongoing underground water leak to within 6 inches of the fault.

Another occasion Michael had used the pendulum to identify 15 out 16 known faults with a ship's radar system.

The club are working hard on having a junior membership and enabling under 18s to ride with us. We have had a number of enquiries and requests about young riders and our goal remains the same – to get as many people from the local community out on their bikes; and in particular the younger element. However, as a British Cycling affiliated club and responsible club, we have to ensure that all the necessary practices and procedures are in place before we can take youngsters. Rest assured, though, we are working hard to get to that point.

PLANNING UPDATE - Cllr Terri Reid

Work on the new Beggarwood Community Centre at the edge of Beggarwood Park is due to begin in February provided there are no further hiccups. If it starts on time then it is hoped that the Centre will open before late Autumn this year.

Details of the boundary for the proposed Local Nature Reserve (LNR) for Beggarwood Park are being drawn up as I write. The needs of areas in the park used for specific activities such as the allotments, the maze, the play areas and the Community centre will need to be accommodated within the management plan for the LNR.

There is no date yet for the proposal for a motorway service station to come to committee, although it is interesting that there is now another live proposal from a different developer for a service area to serve both north and south bound carriageways at junction six. If there is no real demand for one, there cannot possibly be enough for two!

At time of writing there was also no date set for the application for a small infill development at Oceania Crescent to come to planning committee. There is great concern locally around the problems with access that this application could create and these concerns will need to be raised when the application is formally considered.

There is a planning application for around forty houses for the village of Cliddesden, at Southlea Meadow. A local action group and petition have been set up to fight the proposal.

Roadworks on the Kempshott roundabout should be completed by the end of February. Hampshire County Council are making improvements to the roundabout as a result of the building at Kennel Farm on the A30. This will include widening of the carriageway, soakaways and a new kerb line. HCC have stated that there should not be any major disruption to traffic except when lanes will need to be coned off for re-surfacing.

PULLING A SICKIE – THE CONSEQUENCES

Cold and dark mornings result in many people feeling the winter blues, tempting some into "pulling a sickie." If you are an employee considering calling in sick, or an employer dealing with this issue, it is important to understand the potential consequences.


If an employee makes up or exaggerates an illness or injury in order to pull a sickie, they can be dismissed by their employer for misconduct. This is because it breaches an implied term of their employment contract called mutual trust and confidence. An employer will usually be able to fairly dismiss an employee if there were reasonable grounds for belief in the misconduct, following a reasonable investigation, and the misconduct in question was sufficiently serious to merit dismissal.

Employees may take a sick day for a genuine reason and in some cases there is added employment protection for such employees. For example, where their mental and or physical condition amounts to a legal disability, relates to a pregnancy, an accident at work or is due to the unreasonable conduct of their employer. Employees should note that there are very short time limits that apply to employment claims, in most cases three months, so they should not delay in seeking advice.

On the other hand, some employers are left with malingering employees either constantly pulling sickies or on long term sick leave, which can have a crippling effect on their business. If employers do not follow a fair process they could find themselves pulled into lengthy and sometimes costly employment tribunal litigation.



We created Santa's grotto complete with fire place, wreath, stockings and some carrots for the reindeer. The children visited Father Christmas and were each given a present. Music, dancing and games with singing to their parents at the end of the party meant lots of happy children and relaxed staff too!

This term we are welcoming new children and their families to the pre-school. It's very rewarding when children settle down and begin to relax and enjoy being at preschool with a variety of toys and activities and making new friends.

One of our focuses for learning is Winter and Hibernation. The children are fascinated by learning a new word and finding out what some animals and insects do during the cold months. The children have made hibernation boxes, love finding small places under furniture to hibernate and acting out a song about bears sleeping but growling loudly when they are woken up. It's a fun way to learn.

FEBRUARY IN THE GARDEN

This winter has highlighted the extreme changes to our weather's climate once again. We have had warmer weather followed by colder weather which may cause confusion with in our plants. From flowering early to long hibernation of others causing bud breaking as well as running sap in our trees.

Whilst we still need to ensure we are protecting plants when the colder weather is around there are many positives to the warmer weather coming sooner though. You can start sowing your seed much earlier and get a longer growing season for the vegetables but be prepared to protect any seeds or newly planted containers, as the weather is still changing.

Start any seeds off on a window sill and ensure they are in a frost free environment in case the weather does change to cold! By the time they are ready to go in the ground, the soil should have started to warm up enough. You can help the soil by placing a 'Cloche' over the ground to help warm it and to remain frost free.

As for the garden, be sure to have water butts in place so water from them can be used in the warmer summer months. With the weather changing you should check on any plants you have wrapped up for winter and if any damage needs to be taken care of. Any plants stored in the green houses may need watering sooner than expected and check for any pest and disease. You may find mice and other visitors coming in to the warm and dry along with Scarid Fly around any open soil. Placing mice traps and yellow sticky trap place by the side of each pot should help to reduce their numbers. Keep an eye on any onions or bulbs you have planted as you may need to put netting over the tops to stop any animals digging for the roots below. Any summer flowering bulbs such as Alliums or Lillies you had be waiting to plant out should be planted as soon as possible. Have a good look at them before planting to make sure none of the bulbs have started to go mouldy.

Traditionally vegetables such as Potatoes, Parsnips and Beetroot should be stored in the ground until you are ready to eat them. As long as the weather stays cold and fresh this is fine to do so but watch out for the wet weather or they may rot in the ground or start to sprout. With the wetter weather, you should lift and store in a dry cool place to prevent the loss of your crop from rotting in the ground.

Normally bulbs won't be seen in flower until end of February at the earliest. But, with the weather ever changing, this could impact bulbs by having a much shorter flowering time and they may also become susceptible to rotting in the ground. There are ways we can help our favourites to survive the wetter winters. By adding drainage, such as grit to the soil and lift very sensitive plants you can still achieve your favourite displays.

Drainage should also be added to the lawns through spiking, to help the water pass through during these wetter months. Try not to walk over it unless necessary. The grass is continuing to grow, so if you can, get out there and mow as and when required.

You may also notice that the hedges around your garden will need to be retrimmed as they start to grow. Other spring flowers will start to come in to life now including the Forsythia, Skimmias and Spireas. Only prune these shrubs after they have finished flowering to ensure you get good flowers for next year.

You can sow some seeds direct into the ground as the weather warms up. Such as Sweet Peas, Broad Beans and Leeks. Make a small trough in the ground and place some fleece over it for a few days to help warm up the soil. Sow the seeds and place the fleece back over to help maintain the warmth in the ground. As the weather warms up you may need to lift the fleece during the day time and don't forget to check on the watering.

THE BEACON PUB

Somebody had said that the Beacon pub was worth a visit as it does good food. They were not wrong. It is an amazing place. Refurbished last July to the tune of £250,000, the inside completely dispels the image from the outside of this late 1950s pub set in the middle of the South Ham housing estate.



And in nice weather there is an extensive garden which gets the sun all day.

A Greene King house, they have a contemporary internal setting with a wide range of seating styles from traditional tables for two, through high seated benches for six, up to American style booths. And young children are well catered for with plenty of high chairs and a great kids' menu.


Talking of the menu, it is extensive with several meal deals that encourage you to dine, when food is served from 12 noon 'till 9.00 pm. And the prices are extraordinary and must be the best value in the district. Freshly cooked on the premises the quality could not be faulted the day madam and I visited. Monday lunchtime in early January will hardly find a busy pub anywhere and the Beacon was no different with probably not more than a dozen customers but we were made very welcome by Tracy Downham who has worked there for twenty two years in March. She has seen many changes over the years but even she is impressed by the value for money the menu offers.

We decided on one of the meal deals, the Seniors' Menu. Available with a starter and main course for only £4.99 we decided to go the whole hog and have the dessert for an extra £1. Madam had garlic mushrooms which came with a pot of mayonnaise and a salad garnish and I had roasted tomato soup with bread and a pat of Flora spread. For mains she had macaroni cheese with a salad garnish and I had an all day breakfast with chips. Pudding was a chocolate gateau with vanilla ice cream and I had treacle sponge and custard. Including a diet tonic and a bottle of Peroni lager the bill came to £15.33. If we had selected one of the other meal deals the Peroni would only have been £1.

There are too many meal deal selections to list here but some that stick out are 8 oz rump steaks for £5.69 (Monday – Wednesdays) Match Munchies (chicken goujons with chips on big match days shown on the large TVs) a burger selection, Giant's portions, baguettes, jacket potatoes and Sunday roasts for only £5.99. The drinks side is equally well priced and you can expand a spirit order from single to double for only £1.50 extra.

With some electronic gaming machines and a Wednesday night quiz the pub clearly caters for the locals but if you want to eat then the best value for money can be found at the Beacon.



OLD DOWN AND BEGGARWOOD WILDLIFE GROUP

You may have forgotten about the LNR designation of Beggarwood; the public consultation was so long ago. The process is certainly taking its time but at last is progressing – the exact extent and boundaries of the designated area (affected by the proposed new community centre and increase in allotment area) has to be finally set but this should be decided shortly.

In 2016, the mowing plan on Old Down was altered leaving more areas of scruffy scrub and shrub with a view to protecting hibernating insects and to provide food for birds. So if you thought Old Down appeared rather untidy last year - that is why.

With the exception of the winter months, a fortnightly butterfly survey is carried out on Old Down and it is now apparent that numbers in 2016 were not good however this was the case over the whole country. The butterfly experts can give no reason for this decline in numbers. One positive though; the *Small Blue* numbers on Old Down increased in comparison to previous years. But the *Common Blues* were very thin on the ground. Development of the Kennel Farm estate adjacent to Old Down has caused a decline in bird numbers on Old Down (as proved by the fortnightly bird survey) but with luck once building is complete numbers will eventually increase. That field was used by nesting *skylarks* but of course they are now gone forever. Unfortunately as a consequence of the installation of the new bus stop serving the new estate, a whole line of thicket and small trees was uprooted along the A30 boundary but new whips (of a decent size due to pressure of the group) have now been planted.


