BIN CHANGES

The council with their suppliers Serco are planning round changes to the bin collections. Depending on where you live, this may involve a change of day. The new rounds are proposed to being w/c 22nd July, but everyone should have received a notification by the second week of July explaining any changes. BEGGARWOOD SURGERY

Once again, at time of writing there is still no update as to the future of Beggarwood surgery from the Clinical Commissioning Group. The partner practice at Rooksdown has been confirmed as having a local practice to take over once the contract with Cedar Medical ends in September, but no practice is confirmed yet for Beggarwood. This raises real concerns for local people who still don't know whether they will have to move surgeries in a coupleof months. With all the potential development planned for this side of town, it is imperative that infrastructure such as local medical services is guaranteed. This was a promise of the administration when the new local plan was confirmed - that there would be no development without the necessary infrastructure, and the council will be failing in its duty if this promise is not kept.

LONGACRE DEVELOPMENT

New residents are reporting a number of issues with the development. If you are affected by this you can contact one of your local councillors: Cllr Diane Taylor, Cllr Hannah Golding, Cllr Stuart Frost or the Dummer Parish Council chairman.

GOLF COURSE:

Last month the council's EPH committee considered the draft Supplementary Planning Document for the proposed development of the Golf Course. I raised a number of concerns including the siting of the travel pitch, the current precarious position of the Beggarwood surgery and green infrastructure including the loss of many veteran and precious trees. The council's planning officers will continue to develop the document and it will then go out to public consultation before going back to full council in October.

CHANGES TO COUNCIL'S BIN COLLECTIONS

Rubbish, recycling and garden waste collections in Basingstoke and Deane are set to change as part of a move to improve bin collection routes to make them more efficient and environmentally friendly.

Working with Serco, Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council is changing waste, recycling and garden waste collections to reduce the distances bin trucks are travelling, revise the routes to incorporate new homes in the area and simplify collections for some residents so their glass and recycling is collected on the same day.

The changes will be introduced from Monday 22 July and will mean that over half of Basingstoke and Deane's homes will see a change to the day or week their waste and recycling is collected. Nearly all of the garden waste customers across the borough will be affected. Those residents remaining on the same collection day may have a change to their collection time, therefore bins need to be put out by 7am. The waste bins will continue to be

collected weekly and recycling and glass collections will remain a fortnightly service. Those people signed up to the garden waste service will continue to have their bins and bags collected every two weeks.

The council will send a leaflet to all Basingstoke and Deane residents in early July to advise of any changes to their existing waste and recycling service. Garden waste customers will receive a separate leaflet.

Information on the new collections will also be available on the council's website www. basingstoke.gov.uk/bin-changes from Monday I July. Updates will also be provided on its social media channels.

The borough council's Cabinet Member for Environment and Enforcement Cllr Hayley Eachus said: "Working with our contractor Serco we have been looking at how we can improve the efficiency of the bin collection routes, simplify collections for some of our residents and ensure we are prepared for new homes in the borough.

"By revising the routes our bin trucks currently take and changing the days or weeks some residents receive their collections, we can achieve all of these benefits while also retaining a weekly waste and fortnightly recycling collection."

Cllr Eachus added: "I appreciate these changes may be confusing at first as we are all in the habit of putting our bins out on a certain day, but we will do everything we can to minimise the impact of these changes and keep residents informed."

Serco's Transformation Director Duncan Hadland said: "These changes will also ensure that the workload is more equally spread across all of the crews, who have been fully involved in the process. Their local knowledge has been invaluable with the fine-tuning of the rounds and I would like to thank them for all of their help and support."

RESTAURANT REVIEW

Something different this month. And a bit further afield. But well worth the trip.

For years a piece of land lay dormant just the other side of Aldermaston village centre until the Rosebourne garden centre was opened at the beginning of autumn last year. And like most large garden centres it houses a restaurant and this is definitely not a café.

With a seating capacity of 200 this is not the typical place for a snack whilst looking at plants for the garden, or using the extensive food hall or buying a gift from the large selection of house wares available. No, this is on a different level altogether.

With wines, spirits and beers available the hot drinks selection is wide ranging too from all the current coffee trends to speciality teas and juices. Cooked breakfasts or light versions are available until 11.00am followed by light or full lunches until 4.00pm but for those who really only need a snack then what are described as treats are served all day. I can only describe a small percentage of the extensive menu selection but there is more than enough for the most discerning diner including full afternoon tea if required.

We decided to stay with the special lunch options on offer. Madam chose the chicken wrap which was the largest she had seen. Cut diagonally in half it came on a wooden platter with a bowl of chips, homemade coleslaw and a salad. I had scampi, chips, salad and a dish of lime and lemon mayonnaise. A pot of Earl Grey tea for madam and I had a diet coke. For once madam was beaten and had to leave a substantial portion of the second part of the wrap. She was offered the option of taking it home in a box, but declined. And there was no need to eat anything in the evening, either.

Modern technology and attention to detail is evident in that our orders were taken using a smart phone and when it came to pay the same waitress had a mini printer and card reader around her waist. And the price? Only £23.90. We felt that this was great value and will definitely be back.

The original residents of The Crofts moved in during 1994, so this year its 75 households are celebrating 25 years together. Of course there have been comings and goings during that period, but a significant number of current residents have lived there throughout that time.

Although based on her great great great grandmother's hand written recipes she has written and published a charming book which is not just a collection of cookery expertise but it encompasses the life and times of Anglo-Indians during the prime days of the Raj spanning the 19th and 20th centuries.

Army service took the first generation from Mirfield in Yorkshire to India in the late




1700s and she has established a family tree to the present day. During this time each generation of women added to the original cookbook which formed the basis of her talk. She covers the railways which grew from 25,000 miles to over 41,000 miles with one grandfather a train driver. Another was a teacher who with the Maharaja of Mysore founded a school that today is the Mysore University, another antecedent became Postmaster General and yet another was the governess to sixteen years old Benazir Bhutto, who became prime minister of Pakistan on two occasions.

She talked about her parents marrying in the Andaman islands, the Indian expedition to Mesopotamia during World War I, the Victorian style of dressing in the 19th century, Eventide homes in Bangalore, Poonas's military station, of hunting trips and the I,000 miles walk back from Burma during World War 2. The Imperial Civil Service had 1000 people administering a



country of over 300 million inhabitants and many bungalows were built to house



the travelling administrators. Jenny Mallin has every reason to call her book a memoir instead of a cook book, though fans of cooking will find it a treasure trove.

A practical chef she has been a tutor at many prestigious culinary centres including in our area the Newlyn's Farm Cookery School near Odiham and at Lainston House hotel near Winchester.

Their brother, Harris Bigg-Wither, proposes to Jane Austen.

This is the emotionally charged story of those twelve hours.

HATCH WARREN BEGGARWOOD CYCLING CLUB

HWBCC welcome all riders, and this month we thought we'd ask one of our members tell you their experience with our club.

About 18 months ago, I was just looking for a club to do some cycling with and to help me lose some weight.

I didn't find this.

What I found was much more. I found a family whose members support each other up the long or steep climbs with encouragement (and sometimes, unfortunately, songs!) and laugh (sometimes snort!) together on the beautiful descents all whilst sharing a passion for cycling.

I had found Hatch Warren Beggarwood Cycling Club, a community cycling club based in the Hatch Warren and Beggarwood area of Basingstoke.

I was apprehensive joining my first ride but couldn't have been welcomed more kindly into the group. I had very little experience of cycling and no experience at all of cycling in a group. I joined the introduction to group cycling ride and wow, I loved the riding, the country lane route and encouragement received. The club's motto is "Come ride with us" and the rule is that no one is dropped or left behind. This is truly a friendly, relaxed and enjoyable club encompassing all abilities and age groups. I now have close friends in the group who are 40ish years my senior but through a love of cycling the age and diversity of the group truly are irrelevant and it is just a large inclusive group of friends.

I have now been with the club 18 months and my weight, fitness and mental wellbeing have all significantly improved.

In addition to the regular weekly rides, the club and its members often arrange additional rides and holidays. There is a regular Friday ride organised by Captain Cake which as you can imagine involves a café stop and copious amounts of cake! A must for the cycling diet as I have learnt! Annual foreign trips are also arranged and this May I travelled to Normandy with a group of 20 others from the club.

The first full day's cycling was a 60 mile ride to the D-day Beaches. With such a diverse group, the different experiences and memories, especially of the ex-service personnel on the trip was very poignant as we passed through and visited several war cemeteries.

There are many cemeteries in Normandy and our rides passed close by to several. Many thousands of British servicemen are buried or commemorated in the area.

At 30 miles into the ride we reached Longues—sur—Mer. This is the site of the German Battery which shelled the D-Day beaches on 6 June 1944.

The second days cycling was a 60 mile ride to La Suisse Normande. Norman Switzerland is a delightful, steep! wild area around the Orne Valley south of Caen.





The true ethos of the club was evident here as despite the amazing scenery, the climbs were very challenging but masses of encouragement, friendly banter and (unfortunately) singing was on offer, no one was left behind and the whole group felt massively proud of their achievement of a fantastic, challenging days cycling.

Thank you to all the committee, members of the club and the Normandy Raiders for a fantastic experience so far.






