SWAG SNIPPETS (South West Action Group)

Hounsome Fields. Take a look at BDBC 18/02513/RES to see the latest amended plans submitted on 10 April for the first phase of housing. SWAG has written to the Head of Planning trying to get the new primary school location reconsidered but has yet again been rebuffed. It seems to boil down to be "too difficult" to change. SWAG would like to see the school moved further away from busy roads. Over 30 local residents have also written to the Head of Planning and our M.P.s on this issue. The Times is currently running a campaign to reduce the exposure of children of Primary School age to pollution. We'll see if they are interested in our problems over the location of this new school.

Basingstoke Golf Club The outline planning application for "up to" 1,100 dwellings has been submitted. See planning reference **19/00971/OUT.** Local residents have already expressed concern over several issues including the indicative location of the Traveller pitch, the amount of car parking provision, the risks of Longwood Copse Lane and Squirrel Drive becoming a car park

for visitors to the proposed sports pitches, the viability of still more convenience stores, the loss of valuable stands of trees within the site and the impact of the proposal to erect 5m high acoustic barriers on three sides of the site.

Take a look at the BDBC Planning website and comment. Here is the illustrative layout of the site.



A decision on the outline planning application for up to 3,520 dwellings on **Manydown** did not come forward to Development Control in May, as expected. Watch for it in June.

GOLF COURSE

The Supplementary Planning Document will go to the Council's EPH committee on 6th June, so any local residents who would like to attend the meeting to comment on the document may register to do so by contacting Democratic Services at the council. If anyone would like help to register please let me know.

COMMUNITY PLAN FOR HATCH WARREN AND BEGGARWOOD

Enough local people have come forward to form a steering committee for a Community Plan for the area, which is great news. There will be further opportunities to register to be part of this in the next couple of months, and officers from BDBC will be at the Hatch Warren Festival in July.

GOLF COURSE TREES

The tree officer at Basingstoke and Deane has served a Tree Preservation Order for all the trees within the curettage, which will give protection to the trees and require the developers to work with BDBC before any are removed prior to development.

DIGESTER

After years of complaints about odour from local residents, the new operators of the Digester, Biogen are undertaking a number of changes to prevent odour leaking from the plant, including changing the bio-filter to a different design which they believe might be more efficient.

BEGGARWOOD SURGERY

I am increasingly worried about the future of the surgery as time runs out towards the contract with Cedar Medical concluding in late summer. There is still no confirmation about future plans from the Clinical Commission Group who are in charge of GP services in the area.

Imagine aging so slowly that you look 41 when you are actually over 400 years old. Would this be a blessing or a curse? This was the topic of the Beggerwood Bookworms March read 'How To Stop Time' by Matt Haig. Tom Hazzard has lived in Shakespearean London, Paris in the roaring '20s, Mid West American during the gold rush and now finds himself back in London as a history teacher at a comprehensive school. To protect the secret of his rare condition he must remain aloof and distance

himself from people but he is drawn to the charming French teacher who is sure she recognises him.

This has been a marmite book for the group, some loving it, thinking it was a beautifully written, tender love story whilst others found it a chore to read, too drawn out and difficult to finish. Making it the least recommended books read by the group so far.

Upon his death he leaves his house and his eclectic collection to Laura, his devoted housekeeper. She is tasked with the job reuniting the lost things to their original

The group found this book a charming and very enjoyable read with interesting and likeable characters. The group voted this book into third place on our leader board.

TELEPHONE FRAUD

If you have a caller display facility on your landline and you see what looks like an incoming UK mobile or landline number, please don't take it for granted that it actually is. Fraudsters can 'spoof' number so that people receiving the call think they are dealing with someone genuine.

When this happens with a call made to your mobile phone — it can even show the name as 'Bank' if that is how you have it stored in your mobile, leading you to think it's a genuine call from your bank, when it isn't. Do not confirm anything and do not start any process. This trick is often used when fraudsters will have successfully hacked a person's email or other account, so they can speak with authority about financial transactions you have made recently, leading you to think you are speaking with someone genuine.

The Telephone Preference Service cannot protect you from these types of calls, as they are there to ensure genuine companies do not make contact if you have registered to opt out of receiving unsolicited calls.

The advice is simple, never enter into any business with someone who you cannot 100% verify. Call your bank using a number you have sourced yourself, or better still, visit your bank in person.

Remember -

- Banks will never call you to get you to transfer money or ask for your PIN
- Police will never call you to assist in an investigation regarding money, jewellery or debit/credit cards
- HMRC will never call you to tell you they have an arrest warrant for you because you have an outstanding tax bill

QUEEN INN, DOWN STREET, DUMMER, RG25 2AD

It was time we went back as it is about a year since the place changed hands. It was always reliable for good food but would the new people keep up the standard at the Queen Inn?

From our experience the answer is Yes. It was Thursday lunchtime and arriving just after 1.00 pm the small cark park was full so we ended up parking in the road albeit in the shade. This fairly ancient hostelry is a warren of small enclaves all with tables and chairs. There is a large fireplace that when lit is a welcoming feature. There is a beer garden used on our visit by several people enjoying an al fresco lunch.

The menu is what has become reliable pub fare. There is plenty to tempt you including sandwiches at lunch time and with the usual children's offerings. Madam decided that the home made burger would have to come sans bun and the chips replaced with a salad. This was not the typical replacement consisting of just a few rocket leaves but with plenty of variety — what she called a proper salad. And the burger was clearly not a catering company offering being a good half pounder. My choice was the beef lasagne which did come with chips

and vegetables. Very tasty it was too.

Blow it, we will have a pudding. Mine was apple crumble with plenty of black currants complete with my choice of a small jug of custard, alternatively I could have had ice cream or cream. Madam went for something a little bit different with the intriguing title of Affogato. This was salted caramel ice cream topped with hot espresso coffee and presented in a small tumbler. It was extremely pleasant.

Our drinks were the usual large diet tonic with a slice and ice and I had a pint of an Italian lager called Birra Moretti. This came in its own special glass somewhat similar in style to that used by Stella.

We didn't bother with coffee and the bill totalled $\pounds 43.40$. We could not complain about anything so will happily go back again, but will make sure it's not too long before our next visit.

WORLD BRONZE FOR BARTON

Basingstoke athlete Neil Barton was jumping for joy after winning a bronze medal in the Men's 35-39 Long Jump at the 2019 World Masters Indoor Athletics Championships.

The event, held in Poland, was Barton's first international competition. "It had always been a dream of mine to represent my country in an athletics competition", said Barton, who retired from competitive athletics in 2006 after competing at club and county level throughout his teens and early 20s.

Fast forward 12 years to 2018. Basingstoke & Mid Hants athlete Pete Watkeys – a friend of Barton's and a fellow World Masters medallist himself – persuaded Neil to get back into athletics, and in July Neil took part in the annual Hampshire Grand Prix event at Down Grange. This was his first long jump competition in over a decade: "With basically no training I jumped 5.95m, and was fairly happy with that. The technique was still there, but I'd lost a lot of sprint speed" said Barton.

Pete then suggested that Neil enter the British Masters Championships – a suggestion which he initially dismissed, but later decided to "give it a go". After 6 weeks of training Neil jumped 6.12m to claim the silver medal, just 2cm short of the gold medal. "The fact that I was so close to claiming the British Masters title incentivised me to join Basingstoke & Mid Hants athletics club and start training properly".

Following a decent winter's training, Neil entered the 2019 British Masters Indoor

Championships at the beginning of March, competing in the 60m and the long jump. "The 60m race was OK, but the long jump was awful. The earlier race affected my legs, and I suffered cramp during the long jump. Most of my jumps were below par, but one was OK and I finished with 6.04m". Fortunately for Neil, this was enough to take the gold medal by just 6cm.

A few weeks after clinching the British over-35 title, Neil flew out to Poland to take part in the World Masters Indoor Championships and fulfil his dream of competing for Great Britain. "Based on my recent performances and looking at the results of previous championships, I was hoping to jump around 6.20m and aiming to finish in the top 10".

However, the competition - which was streamed live online - didn't exactly go quite as Neil had expected. His first round jump was measured at 6.47m, smashing his own expectations: "I thought "I've nailed it in the first round! So no matter happens now I'm going to go home happy!"". The competition ended up being quite close. "I was in third place going into the final round, just 9cm behind the Frenchman in second and only 3cm ahead of the Portuguese athlete in fourth place. With several of us separated by just a few centimetres the final round was incredibly tense!" In the final round, Barton managed to improve his best to 6.52m to secure the bronze medal behind Japan's Hiroto Goto (6.78m) and France's Imad Redouane (6.56m).

"I could not believe it, I had to pinch myself" said an elated Barton. "I'd come here looking for 6.20m and a top-10 finish, I never dreamt of jumping 6.52m and





winning a medal. This time last year I was still in retirement and the last few months have been something of a whirlwind. I can't quite believe I'm now the British Champion and World bronze medallist!"

It may have been over a quarter of a century, but it seems that dreams have finally come true for this local athlete.

Phishing Emails and Texts



DIVORCE REFORM TO END BLAME GAME

Divorcing couples will no longer have to blame each other for the breakdown of their marriage thanks to a new law announced by the government.

The Family Law team at Phillips welcome a recent announcement from the Justice Secretary David Gauke who said the aim of the new law is to help reduce family conflict.

The move follows a 12-week public consultation which showed widespread support for no-fault divorce.

New legislation will be introduced to Parliament to update the current 50-year-old divorce law which has been shown to exacerbate conflict, working against any prospect of reconciliation as well as being damaging to children by undermining the relationship between

The issue was highlighted in the media last year when 68-year-old Tini Owens' appeal for divorce was rejected by The Supreme Court. She wanted the Court to grant her a divorce on the grounds that she is unhappy with her marriage.

Mrs Owens maintained that her relationship with her 80-year-old husband Hugh had broken down irretrievably because of his unreasonable and controlling behaviour.

However, Mr Owens refused to divorce and denies the allegations from his wife.

The couple who were married over 40 years ago have lived separately since 2015.

Although sympathetic to her situation, The Supreme Court's decision meant that Mrs Owens must remained married until 2020.

The reason for this is that under the current law, unless a person can prove their marriage has broken down due to adultery, unreasonable behaviour or desertion, the only way to get a divorce without a spouse's consent is to live apart for five years.

Welcoming the much-needed changes, Hayley Eachus, who is a family law specialist at Phillips Solicitors, said: "The news will help move family law in this country into the 21st Century."

"The change will mean that separating couples will no longer have to apportion blame for marriage breakdown, which can be very painful not only for the separating couple, but also for their children and wider

The speaker this month was Dr Becky Peacock from the Mid-Hants Railway which is known as the Watercress Line. She gave a history of the line which was

formed in 1861 when the Alton, Alresford and Winchester Railway Company was authorised to build a new railway to connect to the existing lines at Alton and Winchester. It was opened on 2 October 1865 as the Mid-Hants Railway with trains being operated by the London & South Western Railway which eventually purchased the line in 1884 after it went bankrupt. It was mainly a freight line and obtained the nickname "The Watercress Line" as this was a large part of its business from the Alresford area. The line was closed by British Rail in 1973 and bought in 1975 to reopen as a heritage line in 1977 running a 10 minute journey from Ropley to Alresford. It now runs the 10 miles from Alresford to Alton and has many special events and themed days throughout the year:
