




#### THE NEW BEGGARWOOD SURGERY

It has now been one year since the practice was taken over by North Hants Urgent Care (NHUC) our new NHS partner! Great strides have taken place over this time with 3 new full time doctors being recruited, the last one, Dr Chesters, appointed just over a month ago. A brief Bio of Dr Chesters is attached below. The reception and backroom team seemed to have embraced all of the changes initiated by NHUC and from our PPG perspective and other reports it seems a much happier place to work and indeed to visit. We also know that Karen and the rest of the team are not just content to sit back and rest on their laurels and that we can expect further new initiatives and improvements from the practice.

Obviously, a major challenge this year has been the Covid-19 pandemic for not just the practice but Hampshire and the rest of the country. Keeping patients and staff safe has been a major responsibility as well as continuing to offer patients access to the doctors and services required. The introduction of telephone triage calls has helped with this as well as being able to order repeat prescriptions online and video consultations. I know we would all like things to get back to "normal" (whatever that is!) but patience and understanding is required from us all during these difficult times.

The Winter 'flu season is now upon us and the surgery will be contacting patients eligible for vaccination in the normal way either via text, email or telephone and we are assured that the practice has adequate stocks of this year's vaccine.

#### Introducing our new GP - Dr Chesters

Dr Chesters studied at the Faculty of Medicine in Leiden, the Netherlands and did her GP training in East Anglia. She has worked both worked as a freelance GP in Hampshire and has significant experience as GP working for the Out Of Hours service. She has also worked for Macmillan Cancer Support and Cancer Research UK for a number of years. She currently works for the research unit of Southampton University to promote research in the early detection of cancer.

#### **COUNCIL NEWS**

### Help shape how the borough should be developed in the future

Residents, businesses, organisations and local interest groups are among those being encouraged to have their say on how the borough should be developed over the next 20 years.

Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council is updating its Local Plan which sets out where different types of future development will take place, including new homes, business space and community facilities.

In May 2019 councillors agreed to start the process of updating the local plan, in line with national requirements to review plans every five years. This important planning document considers the borough's changing needs and sets out how these will be met.

While the current plan has performed well against targets this is an opportunity to strengthen the plan in a number of key areas including tackling the climate emergency, creating places which protect and enhance biodiversity where people live and ensuring the right infrastructure is in place to support new homes. The new plan will cover the period up to at least 2038.

People have until Monday 9 November 2020 to have their say on the key issues identified by the council and the possible options for addressing them during a six week consultation.

Cabinet Member for Planning, Infrastructure and the Natural Environment Cllr Mark Ruffell said: "It is important that, even at this very early stage of updating the local plan, people who live and work in the borough give their thoughts on the important issues we need to consider when deciding how it is developed in the future. We need a strong framework in place that protects our borough and its environment from random development and creates the kind of place we want this to be.

"I encourage everyone to take the time to look through the issues and options we have identified and to put forward their views to help shape how the borough should be developed over the next 20 years."

#### Have your say on borough's climate change goals

Residents, local businesses, interest groups and organisations have an opportunity to give their views on local action plans to tackle climate change and air quality issues.

From Monday 5 October up to Sunday 15 November, Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council is asking people to have their say on the council's draft plan to make Basingstoke and Deane carbon neutral by 2030.

The Climate Change and Air Quality Strategy has been produced in response to the council's Climate Emergency Declaration and sets out how the council can lead, enable and inspire others to help achieve its targets.

The draft strategy will set the agenda for the next 10 years, with clear goals focusing on six key areas: action by all; buildings; transport; zero carbon electricity; waste and consumption; and the natural environment.

It sets out where the council can make changes, where it can help others to make changes and where it can encourage and inspire change.

Since the Climate Emergency was declared in 2019 progress has included: holding a climate emergency summit; making climate change at the heart of all decision making; carrying out work to install an EV charging hub; choosing to switch the council's

property portfolio to a renewable energy supply and supporting town and parish councils to work in their areas.

Cabinet Member for Environment and Enforcement Cllr Hayley Eachus said: "Climate change remains a huge threat around the world and air quality issues can damage our health. This has a significant impact on everybody who lives and works in the borough.

"Therefore, we must take action now together to tackle these issues locally to create a healthier place to live and work and to help tackle social issues such as fuel poverty.

"The council has an important role to play in reducing climate emissions and enabling and inspiring people in the borough to work together to achieve the ambitious carbon goals set out a year ago. We are really keen for people to read this strategy and share their views as everyone needs to play their part and work together to achieve the borough's carbon neutral goals."

#### PORTSMOUTH ARMS CROWNED CHARITY CHAMPION IN GREAT BRITISH PUB AWARDS

Richard Curtis, General Manager of the Portsmouth Arms in Basingstoke, has won the Charity Champion accolade at the 2020 Great British Pub Awards.

The win comes after Richard raised nearly £50,000 for local causes during the nationwide lockdown, by hosting daily virtual pub quizzes.

During this time, Richard also broke the Guinness World Record for the world's longest marathon as a quiz master. The quiz ran for a record-breaking 34 hours and 11 minutes online.

Commenting on his award win, Richard said: "To be recognised on a national scale for my charity fundraising, is something which I am really proud of. I am grateful to have the support of my whole community, they have been behind me every step of the way. Without the backing of the community, as well as my friends, family and team, I wouldn't have been able to turn our temporary closure during lockdown, into something so positive."

The Portsmouth Arms is part of the Hall & Woodhouse family, an independent family company that brews award-winning Badger ales and runs a collection of around 180 beautiful pubs and inns across the south of England.

## COUNCILLOR'S UPDATE

The schools have gone back and generally everything has run smoothly, albeit with some careful work from the teaching and support staffs. One knock-on effect has been that the timings of lorries to and from the ANAEROBIC DIGESTER need to be reviewed. With schools now having staggered start and stop times, the previously-agreed 'no-go' restrictions no longer match the movements of the pupils. One of the Liaison panel members is discussing the new situation with the operators to see if anything can be done.

Work is continuing apace on the improvements to the play area at BEGGARWOOD PARK and is expected to complete this month (November). The Borough Council is investing over £250,000 on this along with new benches, bins and improved footpaths. A new eco-friendly wild zone is replacing the old timber maze, designed to encourage children to explore the natural world. The BMX facility will also be usable by skateboarders.

One hiccup on the way is that some of the new INFORMATION BOARDS in Beggarwood Park were installed in the wrong places. The Borough Council is aware and the error is being corrected.

The situation with FLOODING OF

BEGGARWOOD LANE near the Holly Blue had not been resolved at the time of writing. The County Council's Highways department has told me that they suspect an overflow pipe from a soakaway on the development site. There appears to be a channel that has been worn in the bank down to the road. The HCC Officers are seeking a meeting with the developers but so far two attempts have proved unsuccessful.

TRAFFIC RESTRICTIONS are now in place on the A30 leading to the M3. The Hounsome Fields side of the road looks very bare as trees have been removed to make way for the new roundabout. The work is scheduled to last a year.

In a very high profile decision, the Borough Council has turned down development plans for the Camrose ground. This complicates the scheme for improving the BRIGHTON HILL ROUNDABOUT with a link road through the site. There is no indication yet as to how this issue will resolve: the owners of the ground may appeal against the decision.

A full planning application has now been submitted for the DISTRIBUTION DEPOT at Oakdown Farm. One of the plans indicates that the eventual user will be Amazon, as many people had suspected. This full application has come in before the outline permission has been considered, indicating that the applicants intend to progress quickly.

I have responded, arguing that the Council should complete its strategy document for the South West of Basingstoke before making a decision that might compromise it. I am also concerned that if the favoured site for the hospital is across the A30 (and it is an 'if' – the Hospital Trust has not said anything), the two developments could prove to be incompatible in terms of traffic generation.

I attended a meeting that discussed TRAFFIC OPTIONS for Basingstoke, going forward. It was a conceptual discussion rather than something concrete, but I came away concerned that infrastructure improvements being considered for this side of the town appear to be less inadequate for the amount of development being discussed.

On a lighter note, I am delighted to see that the Beggarwood CAFÉ INTHE PARK has re-introduced indoor service on the days it is open (please book in advance and consult the website for details).

The PORTSMOUTH ARMS has been a tower of strength to our community during the lockdown and its new Saturday craft markets have been very well received. It is now introducing breakfasts.





#### **LONGBRIDGE MILL**

It can be a problem these days meeting for a family birthday celebration but as there were four of them from Reading, plus Madam and I, meant we could follow the rule of six. We met around halfway at the Longbridge Mill. You know the one, just off the oval roundabout heading north up the A33 at Sherfield on Loddon.

We dined early and perhaps because it was a Friday night the place became quite busy. The entrance had hand sanitisers and the need to use the QR code for track and trace requirements. We were relieved to remove our face masks at the table but they were needed when visiting the toilet and when entering and leaving the premises. The staff, of course, kept theirs on permanently but were careful not to reach across the table with the drinks, cutlery, condiments or plates of food.

Like many restaurants these days the Longbridge Mill has a reduced menu offering but had selections that covered the mixed requirements of our party. Drinks were simple enough with lagers, ciders, draft cola and gin and tonic being our choice. Madam started with King prawn and mango cocktail while I had chargrilled lamb koftas. Others had

baked mushrooms, salt and pepper squid, while two shared a plate of pâte.

Main courses were two fish and chips, a sirloin steak, a vegetable pizza while I had Hunter's chicken schnitzel and Madam the fishcakes and poached egg. Naturally, all dishes came with either tripled cooked chips or skin on fries.

Desserts chosen were a raspberry cheesecake, two had double chocolate brownies while three of us had a mini pudding of apricot crème brûlée accompanied with a cappuccino coffee.

The cost, including drinks, worked out as an average of £30. Not a cheap meal but the quality of fare was good for all concerned and it proved to be a pleasant family get together. I just wish that the pathway to the carpark could be better illuminated now that dark nights have returned as the light from phones was necessary to ensure our safe footing.

Probus Club of Basingstoke member David Rawden is a retired chemistry teacher who also had an interest in geography. He set a mini quiz before embarking on his story. Firstly, to test your knowledge of British geography based upon his exploration of Great Britain that has taken him to the four "corners" of the country.

Can you name the most northerly, easterly, westerly and southerly points of mainland Britain?

Answers are at the end of this report.

Some people collect items as a hobby: stamps, books, antiques and so forth. David collected hills. They don't take up room in the house and they don't need dusting. After ascending all the Wainwright listed Lake District Fells he turned his attention to the Pennines and county tops. He visited the highest point of all the English counties which gave him the Heineken experience - he reached those parts of the country that people would not normally reach.

The highest top is Scarfell Pike at 3209 feet situated in the Cumbrian mountains; the lowest is in Norfolk, Beacon Hill at 345 feet found just west of Cromer. Most tops are surmounted by a trig point or cairn so that you know you have succeeded. However, this does not happen in most eastern counties or those near to London. On one occasion he wandered through Pavis Wood near Tring trying to decide which hump was the highest point of Hertfordshire.

There is limited access to two tops in military training areas: Mickle Fell in County Durham and High Wilhays in Devon and its near neighbour Yes Tor. Both are on Dartmoor and are the only mountains (hills above 2000 feet) in England south of the Peak District.

Proper walking gear is essential to reach the in Somerset. Given to the National majority of tops. However, Trust in 1935. there are a number of tops fairly near Hampshire which can be accessed by a simple walk from a car park. One of these is Leith Hill not far from Dorking in Surrey and another is Whitehorse Hill which can be found west of Wantage in Oxfordshire. Easiest of all is Ditchling Beacon, not far from Lewes in East Sussex. The summit of Snaefel, the highest If you can find it amongst

a myriad of unsignposted roads, there is a large pleasant summit area at Black Down, in West Sussex, south of Haslemere (Surrey). Walbury Hill in Berkshire, near Combe to the south west of Newbury, can easily be reached from the cark park at Inkpen Beacon. Continuing east along the Wayfarer's Walk brings you to Pilot Hill, the highest point of Hampshire, situated just west of Highclere.



Dunkery Hill is the highest point



point (2063 feet) of the Isle of Man.

Further afield and needing more walking effort are the tops of Dorset, Lewesdown Hill near Beaminster, and in Wiltshire. Milk Hill near Alton Barnes and west of Pewsey.

> Perhaps when we come out of lockdown some of the more active readers might like to visit a few of the local tops. They will be rewarded with a splendid view.

Answers to the quiz:

Most northerly: Dunnet Head. NOT John O'Groats, which is about 10 miles to the east.

Most easterly: Lowestoft Ness, Suffolk. A splendid ground marker (geoscope) denotes the spot. Distances marked show that, for a crow. Amsterdam is lot closer than Cardiff or Newcastle.

Most westerly: Point of Ardnamurchan. It can be reached by crossing Loch Linnhe by the Corran Ferry (SW of Fort William in the Western Highlands) then

heading west with a short stop in Strontian - the only place in Britain with an element (strontium) named after it.

Most southerly: Lizard Point, Cornwall. NOT Land's End which is the most westerly point of mainland England.

If you correctly answer this quiz it proves that your GCE "O" level in Geography was not wasted.

#### "Have a heart and help a heart!"

Atrial Fibrillation (AF) is a debilitating heart condition. You may not have heard of it but it is more common than you may think. If you ask around your friends and family you may be surprise by how many people are affected.

AF means living with persistent abnormal heart rhythm, palpitations, chest pains, and breathlessness and of course anxiety. Daily life becomes very difficult and people live in constant fear of another episode. Sufferers never know when they may have an episode, so working is difficult as is going out for the day or on holiday. An episode means a trip to A & E and possibly a stay in hospital and being sent home with drugs to hopefully temporarily control the condition while you wait to see the cardiologist

If the condition becomes more advanced the next level of treatment is cardiac/ catheter ablation. It's a low risk but effective procedure that can be used to treat AF

If you live in Basingstoke or North Hampshire it means a trip to Southampton for treatment. Ironically the Cardiac consultant and heart rhythm specialist, Rob Bowers, is based in Basingstoke & has to make the same trip to treat you. Can you help us get this equipment at Basingstoke hospital so that local people with this condition and the consultant no longer have to make that 60 mile round trip?

Atrial Fibrillation (AF) sufferers in North Hampshire need your help to get treatment here in Basingstoke!

Rotary has already raised a substantial amount of money towards this equipment but we now need your help for the final push to make this happen and achieve Alf's goal to improve the lives of the numerous local people with this type of debilitating heart condition

#### OLD DOWN AND BEGGARWOOD WILDLIFE GROUP

It's that time of year again to look at the butterfly transect records for Old Down. 2020 has been a good year for butterflies on Old Down with numbers increasing by another 200 plus despite the fact that the Covid lockdown and restrictions meant no transects could be undertaken for the first 6 weeks of the season. The number of Small Blues rocketed with 919 seen during weekly recordings; their season lasted a long time due to the lovely warm/hot

summer. Other species that did really well were:- Comma, Marbled White, Peacock, Small Heath, Small Tortoiseshell and both the Small and Large White. However, some species were disappointing; Common Blues were again down together with Brown Argus, Gatekeeper and Ringlet. Compared to last year fewer Orange Tips and Brimstones were seen but this was mainly due to the late transect start. No Speckled Woods were seen on any transect this year but just a few were seen at other times. The highlight of 2020 was a sighting of a Purple Hairstreak. This butterfly has only been recorded once before in 2016. There were a couple of sightings of Clouded Yellow but not on any formal transect.

Beggarwood was good for butterflies too. No formal transect is carried out on the site but on occasional visits there were sightings of – Green Hairstreak (Springtime), Small Blue, Common Blue, Large White, Meadow Brown, Red Admiral and Peacock. A very unusual sighting on Beggarwood

was a Chalkhill Blue – very similar to the Common Blue but paler.

The national Big Butterfly Count, carried out by Butterfly Conservation at the end of July, shows a worrying reduction in the average number of butterflies since their records began 11 years ago. The survey result shows a drop in certain species such as Speckled Wood and Marbled White. However, this is not quite what we have seen and recorded on the two sites — the average number is up. Marbled Whites were around all season and although Speckled Woods were only seen on Beggarwood, elsewhere locally they were in healthy numbers on other sites such as Basing Wood and Odiham Common.

Work Parties – Old Down work parties have now started so please come and join us. For Old Down, we meet outside Old Down Hall every Thursday 10-12 noon. Always check our website just in case there is a cancellation or change. Currently there are no volunteers for work parties on Beggarwood. If anyone is interested in volunteering for Beggarwood please contact the Group to discuss; these work parties can be weekly or monthly and any day of the week.

#### CAGE CAMPAIGN

Latest details of the proposed A30 warehouse development have revealed some alarming examples of planning creep.

First its main tenant is almost certainly going to be Amazon. Similar schemes in Tilbury and Darlington have been used to illustrate the planning documents which now reveal a low profile grey flat shed, which is just over ninety feet high. The developers have in many cases failed to send the council the illustrations of this, despite specific requests from planning officials. It is now clear that the distribution centre will be plainly visible from most of the surroundings.

But more disturbing are the staff numbers. The original proposition was for 146 employees. Here's the creep - the latest documents show a huge increase in those figures, now 1381. The car park has also been extended to 800 spaces. Comparing the quoted staff numbers with similar data from the Tilbury and Darlington sites, that 1381 figure may only apply to one shift. The other two quote a similar figure for each of two shifts. Such is the congestion as one shift leaves and another arrives at Tilbury and Darlington, those centres have been forced to stagger leaving and arriving times. This traffic would be on top of the 24 hour flow of HGVs, and add to the congestion which the other nearby housing developments will already create not only into the A30 corridor into Basingstoke, but onto the M3 at junction 7.

The CAGE group does not have sufficient technical skills to investigate and make official traffic models. This probably needs to be handled by County Council planners. But it is fairly obvious that none of the local roads, including the M3, will be able to cope safely with such traffic volumes. CAGE and the Parish Council will be contacting the relevant officials to reinforce the case against this development.



#### SATURDAY MARKET AT PORTSMOUTH ARMS

"Ever been to the Saturday market at the Portsmouth Arms?" was a text received from the Editor by my restaurant reviewer partner. "Not my scene" he replied – so "Madam" was tasked with the job!

Together with a friend, and thinking it to only be a morning market, we decided it best to get there at a reasonable hour and duly arrived at 10am to find the market's opening hours are 10am to 4pm. As the stalls were still setting up, we decided to have a coffee inside the Portsmouth Arms. There I got talking to Richard Curtis the manager, about how the market came about.

Richard told me that during lockdown he had cemented the Portsmouth Arms' place in the local and digital community by running daily pub quizzes which saw him raise nearly £50,000 for local charities. He decided to build on this and thus the market idea came about. Local people working from home or starting a small business, and needing promotion, can therefore show their actual products to people instead of just relying on selling online. Customers can see and feel their products while enjoying a wander around in the fresh air.

The cost for a stall is very reasonable and there is full support for stallholders from Richard's team, providing a complimentary breakfast of sausage or bacon baps, tea, coffee or squash, with food served to the stalls all day. And the use of a clean warm toilet!

The market is run in a very safe way - much the same as inside the business. A one-way

system is set up and everybody's details are taken. Richard has received countless comments on how well run the market is and how safe people felt. Very necessary in these Covid times especially since in the opening week of 19 September there were 645 visitors. Also, as part of the social media campaign, Richard advertised the 15 businesses that were attending that Saturday market on the pub Facebook page, which resulted in 562 clicks being directed onto the Facebook pages of the stall holders.

My friend and I enjoyed a leisurely stroll round the market. The stalls were well placed around the perimeter of the sectioned off car park and offered a wide array of products including hand-made crafts, leather goods, pictures and even a well-attended converted horse box selling take-away food. Sad to say we missed out on the appetising donuts on the bakery stall as they were all sold whilst we were having our coffee, but I did purchase two almond croissants which were enjoyed on my return home. From one of the craft stalls, which had many delightful items for sale, I managed to get an early Christmas present for my granddaughter:

I am glad I went to this event. Not only does it support local traders, but also means a social interchange with the stall holders, all of whom had the ability to take contactless payments so as not to handle cash. The Portsmouth Arms can be reached via several safe footpaths, so what better way to enjoy a bit of exercise as well as enjoying some retail therapy by visiting the market.

W.I. Ladies are very resourceful and we were able to enjoy our Spring Council meeting at last with Zoom. Ben Fogle was our speaker, Ben described himself as a shy child not particularly good at school: neither academically nor field sports. He volunteered to join the cast of 'Castaways', where he was marooned for a year on an island in the Outer Hebrides with 35 other people. This gave him the confidence to take on new and bigger challenges, 3000 mile race across the Atlantic with James Cracknell. Ben has worked on programmes including 'One man and his dog' and Countryfile to name but a few.

## Catalytic Converter: theft prevention advice

- Park your car in a locked garage where possible, but if this isn't an option, then park in a well-lit and well-populated area.
- If using a public car park, park alongside other cars and face your bonnet towards a wall where possible.
- Avoid parking half on the pavement, which makes the underside of your vehicle more accessible.
- If your catalytic converter is 'bolted on' you can have the bolts welded shut.
- Identify/etch your converter with a unique reference number and register it at www.immobilise.com
- Installing security lighting and CCTV on your drive can act as a deterrent. Look for approved CCTV installers in your area who are members of a recognised inspecting body e.g. United Kingdom Accreditation Service.

If you see someone acting suspiciously under a vehicle, report it to the police. Obtain as much information as possible, including any vehicle registrations.

To further protect your vehicle: Thieves steal catalytic converters for the valuable metals they can contain. Vehicles with a higher chassis are often targeted, as are hybrid vehicles. To keep yours safe, ask your car dealer if they can give you any advice on locks, cages or guards that are approved by the vehicle manufacturer:

## National Trading Standards highlight Covid-19 Scams

Criminals are adapting as the coronavirus pandemic develops. NTS have listed seven likely scams to watch out for:

- Price gouging when traders overinflate products that are likely to be in high demand, such as Covid-19 testing kits.
- 2. Online fraud where websites, apps

- and social media are used to sell counterfeit products as more shoppers are buying online.
- Copycat websites on which criminals pose as people delivering legitimate government initiatives.
- 4. Claims of miracle cures including fake coronavirus treatments.
- Misrepresented home viewings as virtual property viewings are now more common, there are risks of buyers or renters not getting the true picture of a home.
- Fake refund websites offering "assistance" in claiming refunds which, at the least, is advice that charities offer for free.
- 7. **Exploiting the vulnerable** not a new tactic, but will become more prominent.




