## NEW FUND SET UP TO HELP FEED LOCAL FAMILIES

Food banks across the south are set to benefit from a new fund set up by a regional co-operative. Southern Co-op has made an initial donation of £5,000 to its Feed a Family Fund so local food banks can start applying for help straightaway.

The independent co-operative is also asking its customers and members to donate to its fund which will enable local groups to purchase essential equipment or cover running



costs. The micro grants of £200, which will be distributed via the online platform Neighbourly, will ensure the funding helps a wide number of food banks and reaches those who need it most.

#### **COUNCIL NEWS**

#### Council makes a clean sweep of autumn leaves

Borough council crews are out and about sweeping leaves across the borough.

Leaves are swept by Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council's street cleansing team throughout the year, but in autumn and winter the leaf clearance schedule comes into force.

From November 2020 to January 2021, the teams will be targeting different areas each day and this schedule is now available on the council's website for residents to check. In rural areas of the borough local street cleaning teams will carry out leaf clearance as part of their work.

The dates may change due to adverse weather conditions or service priorities resulting from the pandemic, so please check the website for the latest information.

Last year the teams collected over 860 tonnes of leaves through mechanical and manual sweeping.

Cabinet Member for Environment and Enforcement Cllr Hayley Eachus said: "Autumn is a beautiful time of year but fallen leaves can cause a variety of issues. Our street cleansing team has already started work to tackle the leaf fall across the borough.

"We ask residents to check the schedule and bear with us as we tackle leaves that have already fallen and are ready to fall. If residents have a specific concern about a particular area, they should call the council or report it via the council website."

#### 'Tis the season to recycle

Christmas can generate plenty of extra household waste and Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council is urging residents to recycle more and waste less during the festive season.

There is no limit to how much you can recycle and any extra recycling can be put in cardboard boxes or clear sacks next to your green bin for collection. If you are recycling large cardboard boxes, make sure they are flattened next to your recycling bin and please remove the polystyrene and plastic packaging before leaving cardboard out.

There are lots of items that can be recycled during the festive season and all year round including cardboard packaging, paper, newspapers and magazines, food tins, drinks cans, aerosols and plastic bottles.

Christmas wrapping paper cannot be recycled and needs to go into your grey waste bin. Christmas cards can be recycled but only if they do not contain glitter, ribbons or bows.

If you are unsure about what can and can't be recycled visit www. basingstoke.gov.uk/recycle or call the council on 01256 844844.

For a second year, garden waste customers will be able to put their real Christmas trees out for collection with their fortnightly garden waste. Christmas trees over 6ft need to be cut in half and decorations must be removed.

Real Christmas trees can also be recycled at one of several dropoff points across the borough between Monday 4 January and Sunday 31 January 2021.

For more information visit www.basingstoke.gov.uk/christmas-tree Christmas can also mean more glass recycling. Your glass box or glass bin should be placed next to your green recycling bin by 7am on your recycling collection day. All bottles and jars should be rinsed out and any corks or tops removed.

Make sure you don't overfill your glass box or bin as it will not be emptied.

Please do not put bottles or jars out for collection in any other container, they will not be collected.

You can order a 140 litre red glass bin for £28.15 as an alternative to a box if you have lots of bottles and jars to recycle. Order at 01256 844844 or visit www.basingstoke.gov.uk/glassrecycling for more information.

This year bin collections will be affected over two weeks and, unless adverse weather or lockdown restrictions affect bin rounds, collections should return to normal from Monday 11 January 2021.

#### **COUNCILLOR'S UPDATE**

VISION DOCUMENT: The Borough Council has published its draft vision for the South West of Basingstoke. It sets out, in broad terms, where housing, employment and roads might be located. It is a document that is likely to shape our quality of life and readers may wish to view it and comment.

**OLD DOWN:** I spoke at the meeting that discussed the vision and asked that the idea of designating Old Down as a Local Nature Reserve be resurrected. Some years ago a carelessly drawn picture showed Old Down as a potential location for a new road and this stopped the designation happening. The new vision document does not have that road in it, so I hope that there is no longer an impediment to protecting Old Down. It is an essential part of the green corridor for this area, joining up with Beggarwood Park across the A30.

**DISTRIBUTION DEPOT:** The vision document is also very strong on protecting the green credentials of the area. How this stacks up with the possibility of a distribution depot at Oakdown Farm remains to be seen – the thousands of lorry movements involved would surely have a detrimental impact on the environment.

**NEW HOSPITAL:** referred to in the vision document is the announcement from the Hospital Trust that a location near Junction 7 is one of two it has shortlisted for a new hospital. The other is a redevelopment of the existing site. The location was previously selected for the Critical Treatment Hospital that never went ahead. The CTH solution has

been dropped – the Trust is now thinking in terms of a general hospital.

PLAY AREA: Work has completed on the new play area at Beggarwood Park. There was a slight setback when people gained access to the site before the final safety checks had been completed. Hopefully, this is now resolved. The early feedback is positive and, along with the other improvements made by the Borough Council, we have significantly improved facilities to enjoy

CCTV FUNDRAISING APPEAL: The Beggarwood Community Centre has been a target for vandals. Operating as a not-forprofit charity, the Trustees want the Café in the Park to be a welcoming social space for visitors from all parts of the age spectrum. In response to the vandalism and the outpouring of support from the local community, the Trustees have started a fundraiser to protect the building with a CCTV system that will hopefully help to deter future attacks or identify the culprits. Gary Marsh, who is a member of the local community, has kindly donated his expertise so all that remains is to raise the money! Donations can be made through the local social media groups.

FLOODING AT BEGGARWOOD LANE: The cause of the flooding near the Holly Blue has been found and rectified. Highways officers have told me that a drainage pipe to a soakaway within the new development was blocked, causing water to back up and flood out of a rodding point. The blockage has been removed, so hopefully there will be no repeat of water flowing into the road.

#### BRIGHTON HILL ROUNDABOUT:

County officers are looking at options for a revised improvements scheme now that the Borough has turned down the planning application on the Camrose site, which included the link road diverting Western Way southbound. At the time of writing, the intentions of the applicants are not yet known—they could appeal the refusal. If the roundabout improvements go ahead without the link road, the full capacity increases might not be achieved.

The **TRAFFIC RESTRICTIONS** on the A30 from the M3 have provoked some criticism for not adequately protecting cyclists and I have written to the County officers asking what might be done to address this.

CRASH ON BEGGARWOOD LANE it appears that the accident in the middle of November near the Co-op resulted in at least one arrest for drink-driving. Nevertheless I have written to the officers of the Hlghways Authority to ask for a double check that the road and recent developments in the area did not contribute.

MERRY CHRISTMAS AND HAPPY NEW YEAR. This is the last Rabbiter of 2020, a particularly difficult and sad year for many of us. More than ever, therefore, I wish everyone an enjoyable Christmas and hope that 2021 brings a return to normality.

Town FC. She was also part of the first Basingstoke girls UII district team, again playing up an age group.



#### CAFÉ IN THE PARK RECIPE

#### Triple Chocolate Brownies in the shape of Christmas Trees – perfect for the festive season!

#### **Ingredients**

#### Brownies

- 195 g Unsalted Butter
- 195 g Dark Chocolate
- 3 Large Eggs
- 275 g Caster Sugar
- 90 g Plain Flour
- 35 g Cocoa Powder
- 100 g Milk Chocolate Chips
- 100 g White Chocolate Chips

#### **Decorations**

- Chocolate Fingers
- 150 g White Chocolate
- Sprinkles/Sweets

#### Instructions

- Preheat your oven to 180C/160C Fan and line a 9" Square baking tray with parchment paper.
- Melt together the Butter, and Dark

- Chocolate in a heatproof bowl over a pan of boiling water, on the microwave for I-2 minutes until melted. Leave to the side to cool to room temperature
- Using an electric whisk/stand mixer, whisk together the Eggs & Caster Sugar for a few minutes until the colour has turned pale, is very mousse-like, and is double the original volume of the amount of eggs + sugar! You will know it's done because when you lift the whisk up out of the mix it should leave a trail for a couple of seconds before disappearing
- When whisked, pour the cooled chocolate mixture over eggs and fold together carefully. It might take some time, but be patient – you don't want to knock out the air you made up on the previous step
- Once completely combined, sift the cocoa powder and plain flour on top of the chocolate mix and then fold together again – still be careful to not knock out the air
- Once combined well, fold through the chocolate chips and pour into the prepared tin – bake in the oven for

- 25-30 minutes! Once baked, leave to cool in the tin completely.
- Once cooled, cut the brownies into the tree shapes – Carefully insert the chocolate fingers
- Melt the White Chocolate and drizzle over in a zig-zag, and then decorate with some Sprinkles/Sweets
- These will last in an airtight container for I week




## LOCAL AUTHOR RAISING FUNDS

#### PROBUS HEARS A STORY OF TILTING AT WINDMILLS

The classic book by Cevantes about the Spanish romantic, Don Quixote, who, thinking they were giants, futilely attacked the sails of windmills, has some similarities with the experience of Probus Club of Basingstoke member, Dave Kitson.

Some years ago. Dave and wife Jennifer, bought a house in Kent, moving from Teignmouth in Devon. They owned a motor home that they wanted to tour around Europe so moved to be close to the Channel ports.

However, the house had an interesting extension – a windmill. Known as Stanford Mill it had been built in 1857 as a corn mill. It was a tower construction of five storeys with four sails that drove a cast iron windshaft and had four pairs of millstones, two steel mills and two roller mills. Milling ceased in 1969.

The ravages of time meant that by the time of their purchase the sails had been removed and a corrugated asbestos roof built over the cap frame. But it was also Grade 2 listed which brings all the authoritarian problems should any owner wish to make any changes.

However, Dave thought it possible to make the place presentable and usable as an annexe to the house even if it was not permissible to make it a separate dwelling. Hoping for some assistance from Kent CC he was to be disappointed by their lack of support. He made enquiries about the background to the mill and had drawings made of its original features.


There was a lot of original machinery in the mill, which also had protected status, but some of the floorboards and ladders were rotten or missing. These should have lasted more than the 150 years the mill had been standing but there was an inherent problem of severe damp in the mill. Old photographs show that the mill had been coated with bitumen trying to prevent the ingress of water.

One day when working at the top of the mill Dave heard someone coming up one of the aluminium ladders he had propped up to replace one of the rotting fixed wooden ones, but there was nobody there. Spooky. Aluminium ladders make a distinctive squeaking noise, so he was beginning to think, ghost? A haunted mill? Surely not. After some time, still mystified he descended via the same squeaky ladder to the outside and then heard the same noise. It came from a man on an aluminium ladder painting the outside of a house but some 70 metres away and yet in the mill it sounded almost behind him.

Standing so long and so visible there were many occasions when the mill came under some form of attack. The solid construction of the mill stood it in good stead in the first World war when a passing Zeppelin dropped a bomb, presumably aiming at the nearby railway, instead landing nearby and caused a split in the brickwork on the ground floor:

Windmills were always getting struck by lightning and Stanford Mill was no different. When Dave and Jennifer were abroad in their motorhome a lightning strike did no discernable damage to the mill but the electric cables between the house and the mill blew out many of the power sockets in the house. This caused a small fire on the carpet in the lounge, which fortunately, extinguished itself.





Another time there was a local earthquake which left the sturdy mill undamaged but separated some of the partition walls from the outer brick skin of the house.

Enough was enough for Dave and Jennifer and when their daughter announced that she was pregnant they decided to move to Basingstoke to be near to her. But selling the house, complete with a potentially problem windmill, did not present any difficulties with the buyer wanting to take possession as quickly as possible. Perhaps he had deep pockets if the mill was to be brought back to some usable condition. Windmills may stand proudly on the landscape but, as Dave Kitson will attest, could need bottomless pits of money for their upkeep.

#### CONSULTATION ON DRAFT VISION FOR LAND NORTH OF M3

Residents, local community groups, businesses and other organisations are being urged to have their say on a draft vision for the area north of junction seven of the M3 to help strengthen the final version.

Starting Friday 20 November, the consultation on the draft will run until January 2021.

A number of proposals have been put forward for the area, including it being highlighted as a potential location for a new hospital, a planning application for a distribution hub and land owners putting forward possible development sites for consideration for the Updated Basingstoke and Deane Local Plan.

Work is already underway on building new homes on sites allocated in the area in the current Basingstoke and Deane Local Plan to 2029, with planning applications approved for others.

Aiming to set out a joined up approach to the area, the vision identifies the types of infrastructure needed, for example transport improvements, facilities and utilities. Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council is already working with highway authorities to move forward the transport strategy for the borough, discussed by councillors last night (Thursday 19 November) at the Economic, Planning and Housing Committee. This includes a 21st century public mass rapid transport system connecting the area to the town centre and bus and railway stations, along with road network improvements, cycle and walking links.

The draft vision highlights areas where investment or more detailed work would be needed, helping other local services to plan ahead in a coordinated way. It aims to put addressing climate change at the heart of future proposals.

Recognising that this area is an important gateway to the town with nearby historic villages with their own distinctive identities, the vision sets out the need to reflect the characteristics of the local environment and the potential concerns of nearby communities. New strategic gaps around villages such as North Waltham and Dummer are proposed.

The aim of the vision is to guide early discussions, helping to set the direction for future planning policy which will emerge as the new Local Plan is developed.

Cabinet Member for Planning Infrastructure and the Natural Environment Cllr Mark Ruffell said: "We want to hear lots of opinions, ideas and comments to make this a shared and joined-up proactive vision for this area. There are so many parts of this, with land owners, residents, groups, other organisations and levels of government involved. We need views on the issues and opportunities for this location in our borough so we can set out our shared ambitions to get the right infrastructure and protection for existing villages and the natural environment."

Based upon comments received and any additional technical evidence available, the vision is set to be updated for adoption by the council's Cabinet in March 2021.



#### OLD DOWN AND BEGGARWOOD WILDLIFE GROUP

We are at the end of a very strange year. The many restrictions have impacted on work parties which mean that both sites are now rather overrun with bramble and dogwood. So there is much to do when we do get back to normal meetings. We have quite a few saplings to plant which have been provided for free by the Woodland Trust. It is always nice to add to the sites rather than always taking out and cutting back.

It has been a good year for berries which is good for the birds (and for us!). Sloes and blackberries have been particularly plentiful and luscious. Both sites are showing good crops of berries - rowan, holly, rosehip, spindle (beautiful girlie pink), sloe (the blackthorn) and dogwood (glossy black) (some photos below) - some are eaten by several different bird species. Bird numbers are again down from previous years. It is quite surprising how few numbers and species there are on the sites this year but perhaps this is down to all the development going on nearby.

It is good to report that work parties on Beggarwood have restarted with the first meeting on 3rd November with 5 volunteers led by Keith. The meetings will now be monthly on the first Tuesday of each month 10-12 noon however because of lockdown the December work party will be held on Tuesday 8th December. The intended tasks for the next few meetings will mainly be pulling and pruning dogwood



which is spreading too far into the grass and flower areas.

Christmas is just a very few weeks away. Sadly celebrations and gatherings of family and friends are likely to be restricted. But whatever you are able to do – the Group hopes you all have a really good Christmas and hopefully 2021 will be a happy and prosperous time with no restrictions – and regular work parties!



Bonfire night saw members of Hatch Warren W.I. enjoy a talk from Robin Galvin about Medical Detection Dogs. This charity was formed about 12 years ago when a Doctor thought dogs could detect cancers in humans. A lady had mole on her leg which her dog kept worrying her about, having gone to her GP it was found to be a malignant cancer. Tangle, a chocolate spaniel, who had been trained to sniff out bowel cancer, kept going to the spot which they thought was clear but the dog knew that something was wrong and it turned out to be kidney cancer. Bio dogs only detect cancers in spots. Dogs sense of smell is extremely keen, they can detect a teaspoon of sugar in swimming pool the size of two Olympic pools. They use mainly gun dogs or working dogs and are used to detect drugs, explosives etc. They are working to be able to train dogs to sniff out Covid 19. Medical Alert assistance dogs partnered to an individual take 4-6 months to train and can transform someone's life. They are given to people who have life threatening conditions with no warning symptoms.

Hampshire Federation will be the first Federation to try out a Virtual W.I. which will enable people to join with out having to leave their homes. If this is found to be successful it will then be

#### HAVE YOUR SAY ON BUDGET PROPOSALS TO KEEP COUNCIL TAX LOW AND PROTECT SERVICES RESIDENTS VALUE

Proposals for a Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council budget, that protects services that residents value most while keeping council tax low, have been agreed for consultation.

Approved by Cabinet 10 November 2020, a £5, or 10p per week, average increase proposed for the borough council part of the council tax for 2021/22 is likely to make it one of the lowest of the districts in Hampshire, and most of the rest of the country, again.

Despite this, the council still has one of the highest spend per heads of districts in England and the highest of districts in Hampshire. This is despite rising costs and demand for services and a huge reduction in government funding.

Like many others across the country, the council's budget has also been put under further pressure as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic with falling income and extra costs to provide support during this unprecedented time.

Maintaining services that residents value, including weekly bin collections, community safety patrols and keeping areas looking their best, are funded as part of proposals to balance the budget next year.

This includes previous commitments for additional funding to increase community safety patrols and a new scheme for councillors to support small-scale projects in their communities, which were delayed as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic.

To help fund services, as well as a small increase in council tax, a 3% average increase in fees and charges to help pay for the costs of these services without putting the burden on council tax payers is proposed.

Feedback from the consultation, that runs until 3 January 2021 at www.basingstoke.gov.uk/budget2020, will be considered before final decisions about the budget are taken at a meeting of Council on 25 February 2021.

## STOP THE WAREHOUSES ON JUNCTION 7, M3!!

CAGE's (cleanairgreenenvironment.org) is steaming ahead with plans for more online public meetings. See the website for dates.

Latest information from the Newlands, the warehouse developers, indicates an increased number of vehicles (4,500 every 24 hours) using the site. This will present HUGE problems not only for Junction 7 but for all the roads in the area. Newlands has also suggested that warehouse traffic heading south from Junction 7 will use the A30 as an alternative to the M3!!!

Basingstoke Council has declared a Climate Emergency and the Government plans to ban petrol and diesel vehicles from 2030. There is no doubt that the warehouse plans are going to pollute the environment in this area and contradict the messages from Basingstoke Council and the Government.

## School life during a pandemic #YellowArmy style!

Welcome to the first of our regular contributions to your community publication.

Despite facing a year like no other, the #YellowArmy continues to power on. Through March the students of BHCS were told to stay at home; only those children of keyworkers and vulnerable children were allowed on site. This meant the teachers had to learn a whole new way of teaching and students all had to adjust to a whole new way of learning relying on work packs and online lessons to continue their learning. Y10 (now Y11 students) came back in June to restart face to face learning in their core subjects — English, Maths and Science so had a taste of learning under lockdown.

Since September, pupils have been back at school to support their education and mental health but to keep us and our teachers' safe, schools have had to make many adjustments to prevent the spread of the virus. 'Many of us felt closed off; unable to see the world' explained a student.

Brighton Hill Community School has worked extremely hard to match the government guidance to keep students safe. This includes the one-way system around the school, frequent hand sanitization, wearing a mask indoors and keeping year group bubbles apart by staggering the start and end of the day and break and lunch times. This is in addition to welcoming more than 250 Y7 students to the #YellowArmy! 'I felt nervous about going back but I was also excited to see my friends because I had missed not seeing them in person' reported a year 8 student. Even though at first it took some getting used to things like the one-way system and hand sanitizing on entry and exit of classrooms, it has become the new normal.



Thankfully, teachers are allowing students to be a couple minutes late for this reason!

Many have said that the staff should be congratulated on making this adjustment as easy as it can be, including spending holidays and weekends putting up marquees for students to spend their breaks and lunches in and our cleaners working extra hours to clean the school throughout the day. The BHCS #YellowArmy continues to support each other in these unprecedented times.

Despite all the difficulties of life at the moment, we still think it is important to support others we don't know – there are always those who are in a worse place than us

To brighten things up a bit, students paid a voluntary donation to wear something the same colour as their house colour to school for Children in Need. As usual we were led



from the front by our Head Teacher Mr Edwards who wore all the schools house colours!

All of us at Brighton Hill Community School wish you a peaceful and safe Christmas.

Our War on Ragwort. We have an excellent relationship with Worting Scouts. When they approached us to suggest suitable work that individual "socially distanced" groups of scouts could undertake, we jumped at the chance. There were a number of jobs, but after a site walk with one of the leaders, we plumped for them pulling Ragwort on Down Grange Meadow, as this did not involve bladed tools, such as secateurs or loppers.

The first session was at the end of August and while the turnout was restricted due to fine weather and families being on holiday,



a substantial amount of Ragwort was lifted. The picture shows the "socially distanced" group with the results of their efforts, not a spike of ragwort in sight! Despite the hard work, this did not put them off and they are planning to return for a number of shorter sessions.

Ragwort is a potentially invasive species and while we like a little to encourage the Cinnabar Moth, a spectacular pink moth which we recorded for the first time earlier this year, you can have too much of a good thing.

**Fungi Warning.** After some spectacular rain, we noticed a rash of mushrooms in the "Jubilee Copse" which is located on the Coniston Road side of the Meadow.

These turned out to be Brown Roll-Rim (Paxillus involutus). They are common mushrooms which are deadly poisonous, so should not be touched and definitely not eaten.

**Our next Work Parties** on Down Grange Meadow will be on Sundays, 13 December, 17 January, 7 and 28 February (10 00–12 00) and Thursday, 11 March (14 00–16 00). Do come and join us, even if just for an hour. You'll be very welcome. All equipment is provided, but please bring your own gloves. We meet at the Homesteads Road entrance near St. Mark's Church.


