

VOTING SAFELY AT THIS YEAR'S ELECTIONS

On Thursday 6 May 2021 residents in Basingstoke and Deane will go to the polls to have their say on who represents them in the Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council, Hampshire County Council, parish council and Police and Crime Commissioner elections.

While these elections may not be until May, Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council is already making plans to help residents stay safe while casting their vote and is keen to remind people of the options available to them.

There are a number of ways people can have their say during the elections:

- · vote in a polling station
- by post
- or by appointing someone you trust to vote on your behalf, which is known as a proxy vote.

The borough council's electoral registration officer Rebecca Emmett said: "The elections this year will see residents in Basingstoke and Deane voting on who will represent them on the borough council, county council, possibly their parish council and as Police and Crime Commissioner:

"This is an opportunity for people to have their say and we have already starting planning now so that however residents choose to cast their vote in May, they can do so safely. We are putting arrangements in place to help people stay safe at the polling station but we also want to remind residents that they have the option to vote by post or proxy and applying to do this is very simple."

SUPPORT AVAILABLE FOR RESIDENTS DURING LOCKDOWN

Support is available for residents across the borough who need help with access to food, medicine and support services during the national lockdown.

On 4 January, Prime Minister Boris Johnson announced that England would enter a new national lockdown to prevent the spread of the new COVID-19 variant and protect NHS services.

Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council is working with Basingstoke Voluntary Action and Hampshire County Council to provide assistance to residents in need of support with the help of local community organisations.

Residents with an increased risk of illness (clinically extremely vulnerable) are being asked to begin shielding and advised to stay at home at all times, unless for exercise or medical appointments.

Those who are advised to shield are encouraged to use priority slots provided by supermarkets for shopping, prescription delivery services and support from family and friends.

However, residents who do not have this support are being encouraged to register for help at www.gov.uk/coronavirus-shielding-support or by calling the Hampshire Coronavirus Support and Helpline on 0333 370 4000. The helpline is open Monday to Thursday from 9am to 5pm, 9am to 4.30pm on Fridays and between 10am and 3pm at weekends.

TOUGHER PENALTIES FOR DOG-FOULING OFFENDERS

Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council is cracking down on dog owners who fail to clear up after their pet has fouled in a public space by introducing tougher penalties.

Anybody caught not cleaning up after their dog has fouled in a public space, or not carrying with them a way of clearing up after their dog, such as dog poo bags, faces an on-the-spot fine of £100 or a court prosecution. This is double the previous Fixed Penalty Notice of £50 which could be issued for dog fouling offences.

A borough-wide Public Spaces Protection Order (PSPO) for dog fouling will enable the tougher penalties to be enforced. It is an offence for dog owners to not clear up after their dog has fouled in a public space and requires they carry an appropriate means to pick up their dog's poo.

The council is reacting to growing concern and numerous complaints from borough residents about an increase in dog fouling in their neighbourhoods.

A public consultation on plans to introduce the order saw 97 per cent of the 848 respondents agree that people who fail to pick up after their dogs have fouled is a problem in the borough and supported the proposed powers to deal with this.

Cabinet Member for the Environment and Enforcement Cllr Hayley Eachus said: "We have introduced the Public Space Protection Order across the borough in a bid to eradicate the unsightly and dirty problem of dog fouling and to respond to public concern."

JULIAN HOUSE CALLS ON PUBLIC TO SLEEP-OUT AT HOME AS COVID FORCES CHANGE TO THE 'BIG BASINGSTOKE SLEEP-OUT'

After the disappointing postponement of Julian House's Big Basingstoke Sleep-Out 2019, due to the first national lockdown for Covid-19 in March last year, the charity will be running this year's Big Sleep-Out as an at home event.

The charity is now calling on families and households across Basingstoke and the local area to join and sleep-out for one night in their own garden on Friday 5th March to help raise vital funds and awareness for men and women forced to sleep out every night.

The event, which should have been held at the War Memorial Park, has had to change and adapt due to the national lockdown announcement and rising COVID cases. However, the At Home Sleep-Out carries the same important message.

The national lockdown evokes further feelings of isolation and desolation for



most men and women in Julian House's services. On top of this, the plunging winter temperatures have now become a threat to their lives.

By choosing to sleep out on Friday 5th March and raising vital funds, families, friends and colleagues you can help provide the life-saving services and support men and women experiencing homelessness so desperately need right now.

It's a grim realisation that without support like Julian House, the life expectancy of a long-term homeless person is just 44 years! Event organiser, Rachel Avent, said: "The fact that the Sleep-Out is at home this year, provides a greater stark contrast to the dangers men and women living on the streets must face — especially during this on-going pandemic.

People taking part in the Big Basingstoke Sleep-Out: At Home may be cold and a little wet. However, the next morning people can go indoors, have a warm bath, a cooked breakfast, chat to family and friends about their experience or just catch up on lost sleep. The big difference for people who are forced to sleep rough is that they don't have that option.

This year, the Sleep-Out maybe a little different. But while we can't be together in person, we can virtually. That's why we will be hosting an optional series of live streamed events on the night so we can be together and share our own 'sleep-out' experience with each other."

Households without access to a garden are encouraged to join by sleeping out on a secure balcony or on their living room, porch, kitchen or bathroom floor.

Rachel added: "Or think out of the box and sleep in your bathtub! Anywhere a little unexpected and a little un-comfy works."

UPPER SWALLICK PROPOSAL

I am sure by now you will be aware of the proposal by Viscount Lymington and Portsmouth Estates to build 2500 houses on over 300 hectares of highly productive farm land south of the M3. The development if approved would stretch from the A339 to Woods Lane and the M3.

That's all very well but what's it to do with me, I may hear you say.

The answer is that it will have a life changing effect on you just as it will for the villages of Cliddesden and Ellisfield.

Your access to the countryside will be curtailed dramatically. During this awful period of lockdown, people from across the South of Basingstoke have made use of this beautiful area, walking, cycling, running, walking the dog or just enjoying the countryside.

The area is the lungs of South Basingstoke, providing clean fresh air, helping the supply of fresh water to the aquifer and providing much needed food from the land. Should

the project be approved, all of this will be lost and once it is gone it is gone for ever.

In addition, 2500 new homes would produce some 6000 new cars and approximately 15000 journeys per day. How will all these cars get out of the new estate? Some will go via the A339 which prior to Covid was a notorious bottle neck. However, it is more likely that most will want to leave via Woods Lane into the roads around Brighton Hill and Hatch Warren or via Garlick lane and into Beggarwood.

So, it will have a major impact on everyone who lives in South Basingstoke.

It is not as if Basingstoke was desperate for the houses. The council has many "Brownfield "sites which could be developed and the Covid outbreak is likely to mean other buildings such as offices and retail parks will become vacant and useable for housing.

If like us you believe the development is unnecessary, what can you do to help? Well,



if you have not done so already you could sign the petition, just as over 5250 people have already done (www.stanhd.com.)

In addition, you could email your local councillors and express your opposition to the proposal. Join us in protecting this much valued landscape

OPERATION PRINCE' NOVEMBER 1985

Probus Club member, Chris Perkins MVO. a retired RAF Squadron Leader gave an insight into a humanitarian mission in South America in November 1985. As aircrew on an RAF Odiham Puma helicopter squadron, we were used to being caught on the hop during those uncertain days of the 1980s! It all started on a November Friday evening 35 years ago at a supper evening with the 'Boss'. A short telephone call turned the evening upside down for four of us with an early departure to Bogata in Columbia the following morning. The British Government had been requested to provide search and rescue plus humanitarian aid in the wake of a volcanic eruption. The information was sketchy and our task was to augment helicopters crews flying down from a squadron detachment in the Central American country of Belize. Flying kit gathered we eventually reached the Station Medical Centre. A standby doctor had been called in to administer a plethora of jabs against 'horrible afflictions'. This he did at one go and very reluctantly, as alcohol had been 'imbibed' during the evening!

At Heathrow early the next morning we met with civilian SAR specialists to grasp a fuller appreciation of the unravelling situation on the other side of the world. An 18,000ft high volcano, the Navado del Riuz, had erupted three nights previously, melting the ice cap and sending down a wave of mud and boulders to engulf the town of Armero.



There followed an 18 hour flight via Miami to Bogota arriving late at night. An attack by the M19 guerrilla movement on City's Palace of Justice had resulted in the enforcement of rigid military control and there was evidence of tanks and armed patrols on the streets. It was quite reminiscent of being back in Northern Ireland! Overnight accommodation was provided by the Defence Attache and an RAF Hercules transport deposited us at the Palenquero

Columbian Air Force base the following day.

Our helicopters travelling down from Belize had been refused diplomatic transit clearance by the Nicaraguan Sandinista regime and would not arrive for another 36 hours. That said, within two hours of arrival the helicopters were ready

for first sorties. Arriving over Armero, we were stunned with what we saw. A town the size of Hook had all but disappeared under a covering of mud. 23,000 people had been killed or missing, swept away in the mud flow. Human and animal remains were abundant and smaller helicopters were darting about with rescue parties collecting those alive, moving them to aid posts. We made our first approach into one of these for offload, using the rising smoke from a burning mound as a signal giving the wind direction. I don't think that I will ever forget the smell on opening the door on finals to land. With temperatures in the upper 30 degrees, typhoid had broken out and before effective fumigation, the Columbian Army were initially burning corpses using petrol.

The ever-present dust and layers of volcanic ash covered everything and made approaches to the confined landing sites







in mountain villages extremely hazardous. 'Ample muscle' was essential to aid the offload of supplies and prevent 'unwanted passengers' climbing on board to escape the area. On one particular heavily loaded sortie 'a man from the BBC' was enlisted to give a hand. With camera and mike capturing both picture and sound, he unwittingly recorded an 'interesting arrival' at the 7500 ft Villahermosa football pitch in 40 degree temperatures. This was shortly aired embarrassingly, with 'no bleeps', back home. During the ten days of operations shuttling supplies and personnel into the Armero area we were part of an international relief operation that included the United States Air Force together with French and Columbian Armies. Working from dawn to dusk 76,000lbs of supplies were transported by our two helicopters. During our journey back to Belize via Panama we too were held up by the Sandanista regime in Nicaragua resulting in an overnight stop in Costa Rica. We had covered some 1500 miles with a total flight time of 11 hours and 15 minutes to Belize Airport Camp.

Detachment business carried on as normal supporting the British Army and Belize Defence Force in a deterrent role against possible invasion from Guatemala. The flying logbook always proves to be invaluable against fast-fading memories, often recording places and incidents. I see that there's a note on an entry for the 23rd December. It involved a re-supply sortie to a remote army post on the Guatemala border. During the flight back to base we 'clandestinely' paused on a pine covered ridge to source Christmas trees in aid of 'seasonal festivities'. Operating over the jungles and pine covered ridges of Belize in all weathers was an incredible experience and the subject, maybe, of further record before permanently forgotten.



COUNCILLOR'S UPDATE

We are now in another period of lockdown, but at least we have the prospect of vaccinations being rolled out soon. The message must be to stay safe for one final push, and I start this article with a few items of lockdownrelated advice.

BIN COLLECTIONS: the Borough Council has reported that its waste and recycling collection services are currently running as normal and crews will continue to work to maintain them during the national lockdown. They have been forward planning in case the virus affects staffing levels, which are closely watched. The Council advises residents to monitor its website in case the situation changes.

OUTDOOR FACILITIES: as a result of the lockdown, the Borough Council has closed its outdoor gyms and the Down Grange running track. Skateparks are currently still open.

TEXTILE AND GLASS BANKS: With charity shops closed, some clothing banks are not currently being emptied. For now, therefore, residents are asked to store donations at home. There is nothing more unsightly than an overflowing recycling bin with bags strewn around The same advice relates to bottle banks - but for glass there are the fortnightly kerbside collections to use. You can order an extra glass box for your kerbside collection on the Council's website.

HOUSEHOLD WASTE RECYCLING

CENTRE: the County Council is keeping the recycling centre open and continuing with the advance booking system. If you need a slot, please visit the County's website: new slots are released each day.

The CITIZENS ADVICE BUREAU does valuable work throughout the year and they have published their report for 2019/20. It contains a useful breakdown by ward of the issues that have been brought to them. In Hatch Warren and Beggarwood they helped with 490 cases and the top categories were Benefits and Tax Credits, Debt, and Relationships and Family. It serves as a reminder that even in our comparatively affluent area, there are people experiencing difficulty in their lives. The CAB is a very helpful source of advice if you have difficulties in these tough times.

And now a few items of local significance: PROPOSED DISTRIBUTION DEPOT:

CAGE, the campaign group, has been mobilising opinion on the application to build warehouses near Junction 7. The

warehouse hub is shown as a possible feature of the Council's vision document for the South West of Basingstoke www. basingstoke.gov.uk/visionM3-j7-land.

ROAD ADOPTIONS: I have chased again for information about road adoptions in the Beggarwood area, near to the shops. It appears that the adoptions have been delayed by legal issues, but whilst the roads remain the responsibility of the developers, there can be problems regarding street light repairs and other maintenance issues.

BEGGARWOOD PARK: the Borough Council's improvements to the park have been completed and they make a positive difference. The play area has been upgraded and the paths, benches and signage improved. This is an increasingly popular location for local residents taking exercise and the Café in the Park was doing well with its lunchtime takeaway service before the lockdown started.

DENTIST: I have noticed that the building for the new dental surgery on the Island site has not started and have written to the developers to ask if there is a problem.

GRIT BINS: now is the time to let the County Council know if there is a problem with a grit bin in your area either in terms of its condition or if it hasn't been refilled. I have reported one problem from the Gloucester Drive area. And finally ...

CONGRATULATIONS to Richard Curtis on being awarded the BEM in the New Year's Honours. Richard is manager of Hatch Warren's Portsmouth Arms and has been organising quizzes and charity events throughout the lockdown periods to help keep spirits up.

LOCAL BASINGSTOKE BUSINESS OWNER AND PODCAST HOST MATT HOLMAN HELPING TO IMPROVE THE CONVERSATION OF MENTAL HEALTH IN 2021. TALKING MENTAL HEALTH FOR 24 HOURS.

Matthew Holman, a local Basingstoke resident from birth and owner of Mental Health training and consulting company Simpila Healthy Solutions (www.simpila.com), and Podcast Host - 'Matt Holman Talks Mental Health' is planning a talking event to raise the conversation of mental health across the world.

From midday on Wednesday 3rd February until midday on Thursday 4th February, Matt will be recording 24×24 minute podcasts with amazing humans from around the world. The podcasts will be recorded and released each hour for listeners to follow the journey. So far conversations are already scheduled with guests from Australia, Singapore, India, France, Netherlands, Switzerland, Canada, USA and the UK.

Matt launched his podcast/YouTube channel on 19th November 2020, and finished season I with 18 episodes released by 23rd December 2020. The podcasts were around 30 minutes, unedited and unscripted, and recorded with people that Matt has met throughout his life and career. The conversations in the first series included many very impactful moments that the guests were comfortable to share, including Compulsive Gambling, the diagnosis of mental illnesses from Anxiety, Depression, Bipolar, the loss of a baby at birth, and even suicide discussions. No topic is off-limits if the guest is willing to discuss their story. The first guests for the channel were local Basingstoke residents Daren Bavister, Ellie Mirabita and Graham Collins, all with their own unique mental health journeys.

The idea for the Pod-A-Thon event on the 3rd-4th February came whilst planning what to do to recognise Time to Talk Day on the 4th February. Time to Talk is an event dedicated to raising the conversation of mental health. The co-ordinating charity of the day Time to Change will sadly be closing at the end of March, but the event itself will be a good chance to encourage more people to have more conversations about mental health.

The event will be raising funds for MIND (Mental Health Charity), and Basingstoke Samaritans, where Matt has been a listening volunteer since 2015. If you would like to sponsor the event any donation is gratefully received and will go towards providing listening support for those who need someone to talk to when they are struggling. You can donate here: https://uk.virginmoneygiving.com/MH2Pod-A-Thon Matt said 'It has been incredible how well the podcast has been

received by the listeners who often express how they have connected with the guests stories. The podcast was launched after a quick conversation with a friend, and then before I knew it we had set up a channel, were recording and the first season had 18 episodes. In January 2021 we already have 14 guests signed up for chats in season 2, and the guest list is almost completed for the first Pod-A-Thon.

The simple part to these conversations is that anyone is invited, everyone of us is a unique story, we all have a journey with our mental health, the impacts of the highs and lows of life, and how we see the world. Our perspective gives us the narrative to our personal story. The podcast is a channel for people to often tell their story for the first time. It not about creating celebrities, but

about creating awareness. We all have mental health, why can't we talk about it.

I am very lucky to have the chance to hear

the amazing stories of so many people from the podcast, when I train companies in mental health, and when I support people through my listening work with Samaritans. I want everyone to have the same opportunity."

OLD DOWN AND BEGGARWOOD WILDLIFE GROUP

Unfortunately yet again work parties are suspended. It is all so sad. Both sites are in need of attention both from the work parties and the Council. Perhaps by the time

you read this, restrictions have been eased and we can plan ahead. Before Christmas the group was able to plant a few trees on Old Down and there are more to put in (group members are growing some on at their homes).

It is difficult to know how birdlife is faring on the sites as of course the group has been unable to visit the sites for proper record keeping. But the corvids seem in usual numbers, red kites are drifting above and many sparrows and goldfinches are around. There is still disturbance from the housing developments and this will be going on for a very long time. Inevitably this will affect birdlife on Old Down in particular.

A new surprising sighting in the Kempshott area has been some *Stonechats* — seen along the Basingstoke/Oakley permissive footpath/cycle path. Very pretty small birds, the male having with distinctive markings on the head and nape (see photos). They make a clack sound (sounding a bit like two stones hit together — hence the name) rather than a song. Last month I mentioned a scarce winter visitor — the *Siskin*. It is great to report that a male Siskin was spotted on Old Down in early January. Not a common sight on Old Down.

TREES AT OAKDOWN FARM.

This old avenue of oak trees lined the road into Dummer before the M3 was built. It was hoped that the Tree Officers at Basingstoke Council would make it clear that these trees should be protected but we are to be disappointed. In their report they stated: the applicant's tree plans are 'acceptable and appropriate' even though all these trees are to be demolished for the



access road and car park and despite the admission by the developer's arboricultural expert that this avenue of mature oaks is of a significant quality with a 'high aesthetic appearance'.

AIR POLLUTION

The estimated 4,000 traffic movements every day at the warehouse site, will impact on the air quality in the area. The potential increases in emissions from traffic, housing and consequent pollution from nitrous oxide, carbon dioxide and particulates should be accurately researched before any more building goes ahead. Make sure that your local councillors and MPs (Ward councillors: Diane Taylor, Stuart Frost and Hannah Golding, MPs: Kit Malthouse and Maria Miller) know about your environmental concerns.



DOMESTIC LOCKDOWN EXPERIENCES

With the third lockdown upon us, and, therefore, no restaurant reviews to write for the Rabbiter by my partner, I was getting fed up thinking what to put on the table to eat each day. I did not consider we ate out that much but then I remembered all the times I met friends in town or Reading for lunch or a coffee, a club which meets once a month over lunch at BCot, my partner's monthly clubs which meant on those days I could please myself and not think what to cook, and then the times when we were out together and stopped somewhere for lunch. All in all, quite a few meals away from the cooker.

We had not been well which left us devoid of energy and last week the only food I fancied was a McDonald's. With all due respects to those who regularly eat this food, for us it is about a once-a- year treat. However, the desire to eat a burger and chips was so strong I investigated ordering via Just Eat. We easily made our selection and twenty minutes later a polite young lady delivered our food. Yes, it could have been a tad hotter - a quick flash in the microwave would easily solve that problem - but that was not going to stop us tucking in. We thoroughly enjoyed it and after my initial hesitancy I would certainly do something similar again.

Many readers experienced great lockdown frustrations when ordering on-line groceries. During the first lockdown we had great problems getting deliveries even with a company I used regularly. However, it sorted itself out and we managed with occasional trips to a supermarket between

deliveries. Due to the generosity of family, over Christmas and afterwards we were well stocked up with food in the form of hampers (put together by the family members suitable for our needs) and so it was not until 4th January that I went online to place an order with my usual retailer. No slots were available until 24 January at 10 pm (even for someone they recognise as being vulnerable and elderly). Knowing that we could not survive for that length of time I was advised to try Amazon Fresh. Again, this was a new experience and the order placed on lanuary 5th was delivered at 3pm on January 6th. All the food was totally acceptable and delivered in paper bags which could immediately be recycled. I can thoroughly recommend them.

Frustrated at lack of delivery slots with my usual retailer I emailed their chief executive. I received a call the next morning! Of course I was advised (and also fully aware of) the extra work they had in lockdown but I pointed out that as we were KNOWN to them as a priority surely some IT whizz kid could make a program only available to those on the priority list to give guaranteed access, rather than fighting for a slot with everyone else. He said he would flag it up at the next team briefing. Let's hope so. I know you can forward plan by bagging a slot and ordering anything to exceed the minimum order price, but when you are not well, ordering food is not always your top priority. If things change, I will let you

We supported the Spotlight food bank both financially and with drivers in the longer term to help deliver food parcels.


We have again supported Age Concern with their social therapy groups.


