

## COUNCIL CONSIDERING OPTIONS FOR PROGRAMME OF SUMMER ENTERTAINMENT

With the ongoing uncertainty during the COVID-19 pandemic, Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council is exploring options to safely deliver a programme of outdoor arts, music and performances this summer.

Basingstoke Festival is set to make a return to the borough this summer with 17 days of performances, music, dance and arts between Friday 25 June and Sunday 11 July 2021.

Due to the uncertainty of social distancing restrictions which may still be in place and to keep Basingstoke and Deane safe, the borough council is working with artists and local art organisations to explore how it can hold virtual and socially distanced events.

However, it is unlikely that crowds will be able to return for B LOVE Festival, which brings over 100 live music acts, family entertainment and art in unusual places to War Memorial Park and is the finale event of Basingstoke Festival.

While work continues to investigate how the festival can be safely delivered in line with government restrictions which may be in place in the summer, there is still plenty to look forward to.

From February, the council's Art in Unusual Times virtual programme, in partnership with local artists and organisations, will bring residents the best in arts and crafts, dance, theatre performances and public art.

Activities include arts and craft sessions using recycled materials with Basingstoke-based entertainer Junk Jodie, interactive Basing-folk storytelling sessions with local theatre company Pumpkin Pantos and the return of the successful Window Wanderland project which will return to communities across the borough, filling their windows with bright and colourful art.

Cabinet Member for Communities, Culture and Partnerships Cllr Simon Bound said: "We know the COVID-19 pandemic has been a difficult time for residents across the borough and we are keen to provide a fun-filled programme of entertainment this summer that everyone can look forward to.

"But ultimately, the safety of our residents must come first and we are continuing to monitor the latest government guidance and are working with art organisations and members of the arts and culture industry to understand how we may be able to safely deliver the annual Basingstoke Festival.

"We are very lucky to have talented artists, performers and arts organisations in our borough. I am pleased that we are able to bring residents an exciting selection of virtual arts and culture through our Art in Unusual Times programme which we hope will bring some much-needed entertainment to enjoy in the comfort of their own homes."

## ISOLATION BUSTING GROUP LAUNCHED

Peter and Margaret Humphreys are a Basingstoke couple who have suffered from tinnitus for many years and it has got worse as they have got older. Tinnitus is the name for noises in your head that are not coming from outside of yourself. It is a condition which often leads to a feeling of isolation and depression which can be helped by contact with others in a similar situation. It is a very common condition which can affect I in 3 of people at some point in their lives. Elsewhere in the country there are support groups, but not in Basingstoke.

Recently there was the National Tinnitus Week. You can find information on this and a lot more on the British Tinnitus Association web site (tinnitus.org.uk). So to mark this Peter and Margaret decided to see if there is interest in creating a Basingstoke and Area Tinnitus Support Group. The aim of the group would be 'isolation busting', by sharing experiences, passing information and advice and social and networking opportunities. It would have regular meetings starting on Zoom



and then, when safe and allowed, moving to physical meetings.

## HAVE YOUR SAY ON THE FUTURE OF BASINGSTOKE TOWN CENTRE

Residents and businesses across the borough are being asked to share their views to help shape the long-term future of Basingstoke town centre.

Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council has appointed a team of experts in looking at how places can be transformed, including HemingwayDesign with Allies and Morrison and JLL, to help develop an ambitious strategy for the town centre area.

High streets across the UK have experienced, and continue to experience, the effects of changes in shopping habits. Although Basingstoke town centre, including Festival Place and The Malls, has had success in attracting investment and new retailers in recent years, the COVID-19 pandemic has meant that town centres across the country are facing significant challenges, such as a decline in footfall and shop closures.

Recognising the importance of a sustainable town centre as a key part of the borough's recovery from the pandemic, the aim is to create a vision and masterplan to guide work and ensure the town centre offers an exciting shopping, leisure and cultural experience.

The study carried out by experts over the next six months will include comprehensive engagement with residents, businesses and other groups and a detailed analysis of the town's requirements and aspirations to create a final vision and masterplan.

Working closely with town centre partners, this long-term vision will ensure the council can provide support where it is most needed and maximise joint development and investment opportunities.

Residents, businesses, organisations and visitors are being encouraged to share their views of the town centre, their shopping habits and what they would like to see to improve the area in future years by taking part in an online survey at www.talkbasingstoketowncentre.co.uk Leader of Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council Cllr Ken Rhatigan said: "The COVID-19 pandemic has changed the way we live our lives and as we plan for the borough's economic recovery, it is important that look at how we can ensure our town centre remains a top shopping and leisure destination that attracts people to the area.

"We have lots to be positive about and it will be important for us to build upon our key strengths, including heritage, our mix of retailers and strong arts and culture offer, while addressing issues such as connectivity, how we incorporate our town centre parks and sustainable travel. "We cannot do this alone and I would

encourage everyone to share their feedback as it will be important for us to understand how we can improve our offer to help shape our final strategy and ensure the town centre responds to changing customer expectations in the future."

Wayne Hemingway MBE Co-founder of HemingwayDesign said: "All of us know how town centres have been facing a multitude of challenges resulting from a change in our shopping habits and spending preferences. COVID-19 has accelerated this and progressive towns and cities are soul searching, and making plans and taking actions to ensure that they purposefully enter these changing times and positively embrace these societal shifts to become places that have something for all residents, businesses and visitors whether it be places to shop, socialise, enjoy leisure facilities, live and work.

## HAMPSHIRE TOGETHER: BUILDING A BETTER NETWORK OF CARE

The ambition of the Hampshire Together programme goes beyond building a new hospital to serve north and mid Hampshire - the aim is to give local people a truly joined-up system of NHS and social care.

Bringing teams and services closer together is the right approach for everyone. For patients, it means better results and a better experience, while for staff, it means that skills can be developed and pressures better managed.

The process of integrating services is already well underway across north and mid Hampshire, and the Hampshire Together: Modernising our Hospitals and Health Service programme offers a rare chance to accelerate that process of change further.

Much of the focus of Hampshire Together may appear to be on the provision of new facilities, including the potential for a hospital as part of the Government's Health Infrastructure Plan. However, behind the scenes, the process already involves GPs, mental health and social care teams, community services and charities, all working together alongside hospital teams and commissioners.

The shared focus is on finding ways to building a network of outstanding care, both inside hospitals and within communities, delivered in the right place, at the right time and by the right health healthcare professional.

Dr Matt Nisbet, a local GP and a clinical lead at the Hampshire and Isle of Wight Partnership of CCGs, said: "In the past the NHS tended to ask patients to fit in with the system. Now our task is to design a system that fits around the needs of our patients.

"The Hampshire Together project is a rare and exciting opportunity for us all. It gives us the chance to look again at how our health and care services work together, and how we serve our patients.

"And we can only get that right if we hear from the people who use local services. During public consultation, which is due to take place this year, it will be invaluable for us to hear from people about their experiences, what has worked for them, and what doesn't work."

There is already a huge amount of work underway to build a network of care in

north and mid Hampshire - one which reduces the amounts of times patients are passed from one team to another, and provides better, more convenient care.

"Positive changes have already been made - but our challenge now is to go further still, and improve care for more people," said Dr Nisbet. "For example, we are currently working on a successful system where hospital-based paediatricians hold monthly meetings in GP surgeries, bringing together a wide range of staff to discuss patients. It helps build relationships, and means that those young patients get better, faster care."

Other examples include GP spending time on placements with hospital teams, and the development of integrated care teams - groups of staff members from a range of organisations and disciplines working together for the benefit of the people under their care.



## MEALS ON WHEELS: THE CAMROSE CENTRE IS STILL HELPING THE HOMELESS DURING LOCKDOWN

Staff and volunteers from The Camrose Centre have set up a temporary 'meals on wheels' service, delivering hot food to clients. Homeless and vulnerably housed people are unable to access food or support which they usually get from The Camrose day sessions, as the Centre is currently closed for lockdown. Clients are being housed during this time (via temporary Government funding) in several hotels in the region, but food is not included.

Camrose staff have begun deliveries of the hot meals, which are prepared by volunteers at the Camrose Centre kitchen and personally delivered three times a week.

Clients are being supplied with a hot meal such as sausage casserole and mashed potato, followed by home-made cheesecake, along with additional food packs, toiletries and underwear.

## PROBUS HEARS ABOUT ADVENTURES IN A MOTORHOME

In the years leading up to retirement, Probus Club member Dr Jeff Grover and his partner, Mary, had travelled the four corners of the globe and post retirement had intended to continue their adventures.

By 23 March 2020 they had planned to jet off to Las Vegas to hit the tables, ride in a helicopter over the Grand Canyon and horse ride on a nearby ranch before moving across to LA for a relaxing Mexican cruise.

Then the 'big C' put an abrupt stop to these ambitions — no, not cancer, but Covid -19. Lockdowns, isolation, on-line shopping, bubbles and Zoom all entered our vocabulary but underpinning all this was 'Where can we go on holiday?'

Jeff explains that they had often thought about buying a motorhome but now this had become a genuine option and bought a thirteen year old 2-berth motorhome, with only 16,000 miles on the clock, which fulfilled all our requirements. We had several test runs to the New Forest and south coast each time improving our experiences with this new way of holidaying.

This was all in preparation for the BIG ONE. Two weeks in Scotland negotiating the North Coast 500 during September 2020. This is 500 miles, driving, in our case, anticlockwise from Inverness up the east coast to John O'Groats, turning left towards Durness, and returning to Inverness down the spectacular setting of the west coast of Scotland.

The other important difference from our southerly sojourns was the introduction of wild camping which is legal in Scotland. Simply put, this involved finding a suitable parking place, lay-by, or car park where we stayed for the night free gratis. Once darkness descends all traffic ceases and a good night's sleep is guaranteed.

We motored northwards up the east coast until we finally arrived at John O'Groats where we parked up for the night. We had arrived! This motor-homing lark was becoming a doddle. However, there was a gale coming off the North Sea but our four wheels clung tenaciously to the tarmac. The following morning, we



headed off to Dunnet Head – actually, the most northerly part of mainland UK before staying in a campsite by the beach in the metropolis of Thurso.

Continuing eastwards along the top of Scotland we negotiated the single-track roads with their often, hair-raising passing spaces along the way. We wild camped at every stop over, most memorably one overlooking a small bay, where when opening the bedroom curtains in the morning we were met with a mesmerising sea of tranquil beauty.

The scenery was stunning. Particularly surprising were the expansive but empty sandy beaches located in every bay. If it wasn't for the weather the Scottish west coast could easily rival any Spanish Costa. The dramatic, moody, mountains (or munros), sheltered valleys coated in bracken and thistle with lochs surrounded by water sodden peat — all with virtually no sign of habitation, were magnificent.

Another highpoint (pun intended) was the route towards Applecross, which has the steepest ascent of any road climb in the UK, rising from sea level at Applecross to 2,054 ft, and is the third highest road in Scotland. This put the motorhome and its driver (me) through their paces negotiating the hairpin bends and testing the efficiency of the brakes and strength of nerve of both occupants.

Walks, whisky tasting (of course), beaches and magnificent scenery were all highpoints of our motorhome adventure. We finished our Scottish adventure at Gretna Green where we spurned the anvil but enjoyed a delicious Scottish breakfast before crossing the border to go home. In total we travelled in excess of 2000 miles in 14 days without incident or trouble.

The secrets of motor homing are patience and tolerance. It takes a while to get used

to living in such a confined space, whilst sharing the minutia of everyday life and leaving all inhibitions behind you.

Was the purchase of our motor home a good decision? The answer is yes definitely! Trips to France and Spain have already been mooted, although we could take off at any time to any part of the UK once Covid restrictions are lifted.

Having said this however, we have booked a flight to Argentina in December 2021!!!!









## **COUNCILLOR'S UPDATE**

**LIGHT AT THE END OF THE TUNNEL?** I expect we all know someone who has now received their vaccination against COVID and the local feeling seems to be much more optimistic than it was a few months ago. If you are not registered with a GP surgery, you may wish to consider doing so, as the invitations are being managed using the doctors' lists. Please be wary of scams that try to extort money from you: the NHS injections are free.

**HOSPITAL CONSULTATION:** 'Hampshire Together' is planning a major consultation exercise regarding a new hospital in Basingstoke, one potential site for which is near junction 7 of the M3. The first stage is to find out what form the consultation should take. People are being asked how they would like to receive information and provide feedback on potential changes to hospital services.

The Hampshire Together programme was set up in response to the New Hospital Programme as part of the Government's Health Infrastructure Plan, which named north and mid Hampshire as one of the areas to receive funding for new facilities. You are invited to visit https://www.surveymonkey.co.uk/r/HampshireTogetherSurvey to take part in the online survey, which will close at 5pm on Thursday 24 March 2021.

**CYCLING AND WALKING:** County and Borough Council officers are working together to develop a Local Cycling and Walking Infrastructure Plan (LCWIP) for the Borough. This is a strategic approach to identifying cycling and walking improvements and is the basis on which government funding can be accessed. A stakeholder a workshop is planned in March 2021 and details will be published shortly.

**ALSO ON THE SUBJECT OF CYCLING:** Hampshire County Council has been running a consultation on proposals for improving the cycle path that runs from the Brighton Hill roundabout to Sullivan Road. The proposal is to construct a new 3 metre wide cycle track. Here is a plan:



**TREE FELLING AT THE GOLF COURSE:** it looked as if another controversy was brewing about tree felling along the A30. Bloor Homes want to fell trees at the entrance to the Golf Course in preparation for its development with housing. As happened last year with Hounsome Fields, residents are worried about the impact on nesting birds, given that the nesting season has started. My latest information is that Bloor will delay the felling until after the nesting season.

**BEGGARWOOD ROADS:** Taylor Wimpey have conducted a survey of the un-adopted roads in Beggarwood that are still in their care, and residents are reporting that many of the street lights have been repaired. I have also received a query about the white-lining on those roads, which is faded and needs refreshing, and I am asking whether this can be undertaken.

**BEGGARWOOD SURGERY:** Staffing changes are taking place at our local surgery. Dr. Oshiga has left and the surgery has therefore advertised for a replacement, as well as another permanent doctor. This will mean that the surgery can provide three GPs for all days. The practice is also advertising for further nurses. Progress will be discussed at the next meeting of the Patient Participation Group.

**GRIT BIN:** Following my representations to County Council officers, I can confirm that a new grit bin will be installed in Gloucester Drive. As residents will know, this road is on a steep slope. It appears that a bin was originally intended near the top but was never actually installed due to worries about leakage and the impact on planted areas around it. However, the Council has agreed to identify a more suitable site and install the extra bin.

**DISTRIBUTION DEPOT:** CAGE, the pressure group, has been highlighting some of the implications of the planning application near Junction 7. One of them is that the lovely avenue of mature Oak Trees that leads up to Oakdown Farm is destined to be felled. The Tree Officers at the Borough Council have accepted this even though the arboriculture expert has acknowledged that the mature oaks are of a significant quality with a high aesthetic appearance.

**NEW GROUP COMING:** the Hatch Warren Centre has announced that a new group, Link 2, is coming to the Warren. This was previously the Link Club which ran for 11 years. It will help young adults with special needs and learning difficulties, which is even more important now, following the disruption caused by COVID.

**AND FINALLY** .... Please continue to be vigilant and protect yourselves from COVID. We have come a long way and it would be awful if anything happened now.

## **CAGE CAMPAIGN** TO STOP THE WAREHOUSES **ON J7 M3**

Decision-time is looming at the beginning of March when the Planning Dept. of Basingstoke Council may make their recommendation refusal re or approval of the warehouse development to their Development Control Committee.

Despite the appeal of some jobs at a possible Amazon warehouse, the overall impact on the whole area west of Basingstoke will catastrophic. Visit CAGEcleanairgreenenvironment.org see visuals.

These are the main reasons why the development should turned down:

- 1. Basingstoke Council declared a Climate Emergency - this plan will add to pollution levels and impact on the traffic volumes in the area. The local road system including I7M3 will need to be up-graded.
- 2. Visually the 4 giant warehouses would dominate the western area of Basingstoke and be a betrayal of the work done to improve Basingstoke's overall image. The warehouses would impact negatively on the landscape of the area.
- 3. The possible warehouse site is twice the size of that outlined in the Local Plan.
- 4. It is right next to existing homes and residential housing currently being built or planned.
- 5. Other possible developments such as a new hospital, could be jeopardised by the warehouse
- 6. Vacant suitable space in this area would meet warehousing needs.



## OLD DOWN AND BEGGARWOOD WILDLIFE GROUP

At this time of year the Group would normally be preparing for its AGM in April but of course we are still in

lockdown so it is not possible to hold this year's meeting. And with lockdown still in place there are of course no work parties. The weather in the early weeks of 2021 has not been kind to us. Firstly rain, and then more rain, creating some very muddy footpaths making walking hard work. Fuzzy Drove in particular was almost impassable at times and some of the paths on Old Down were very sticky. Then we had snow and frost and it was so cold some days.

The birds all look rather miserable in such

weather - always wonder how they get through the really cold nights. They do need a helping hand so do try to put out food for them such as seeds, mealworms. fatballs and scraps such as bread, apple and grapes (but do not put grapes where dogs are around - can be poisonous for them). Also put out fresh water for them. Birds need water for bathing, even in the winter, as well as drinking. A tip for helping the water not freeze over is to float a ball in the water. But despite all the hard weather, Spring is on its way and the early wild flowers are starting to show. The Snowdrop is probably the earliest flower – not that many on Old Down and Beggarwood but there are some lovely

clumps along the cycle path. The bright yellow celandine shows early, hiding in the undergrowth and under hedges. Both sites have primroses here are there and the bund by Old Down Hall has a lovely display, all having been planted by the work parties.

Walkers have made new paths on Old Down, no doubt to avoid mud and other walkers. The Group asks that please can you not make new paths, particularly through hedgerows and copses, as these new routes disturb wildlife habitat and thus we will see less birds, flowers and insects. Also, please respect the farmers' fields who are trying to grow their crops, this being their livelihood.

**Work Parties** – Still suspended for the time being but when resumed - for Old Down we meet outside Old Down Hall every Thursday 10-12 noon and for Beggarwood 10-12noon on every first Tuesday of the month. Check our website for up-dates.

## Do you prefer lockdown or normal life?

**H**: In the end, I do prefer normal life. It is simpler and can be less stressful at times. We just have to adjust for now, but it'll be over soon.

## SPIRITUALLY SPEAKING

#### Lent and the wilderness

During the six weeks of Lent we are reminded of the forty days and forty nights that Jesus spent in the wilderness. The wilderness was an important time and place for Jesus, it was a place where he was preparing himself for all that he would face throughout his life. It was important that he was somewhere on his own, so that he could focus on God, with no distractions. In the wilderness Jesus was tempted by: food, power and wealth, but he stayed strong and did not succumb to them. I can not begin to imagine the depth of emotions that he must have experienced during this time. There would have been times of extreme loneliness, times of doubt, times of uncertainty and sadness.

Being in the wilderness echoes with life in the pandemic with the depth of emotions experienced by us all. Many have been living on their own, many have faced uncertainty with health and jobs and many have been so sad. We have longed to meet up with family and friends, for some sense of normality. Lent is a reminder to Christians today that when things get hard, or they are tempted to forget God, they can trust in God who never leaves them. The Bible offers words of comfort. "I will not leave you comfortless, I will come to you." John 14:18. "Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens and I will give you rest." Matthew 11:28 The Psalms show us words of lament, praise, encouragement and can act as a prayer when we struggle to find the right words.

In this season of Lent we are invited to step into the wilderness. To use the time to reflect on our own journey with God and to discover afresh what is important in our lives. It is also a time to reflect on what temptations take us away from God. Through this time we may learn more about ourselves and more about God. I wonder what wilderness experience we are encountering this year, what challenges are we facing personally, with family, with work.

As we move towards spring and lighter evenings we see signs of hope all around us. From the nesting birds, warmer weather and bulbs showing their beautiful colours. We have hope in the remarkable way the vaccine has been delivered in communities. The hope that life will change for the better.

## **National Insurance Scam Phone Call**


Action Fraud is warning the public about a <u>National Insurance</u> <u>scam</u>. Victims have reported receiving an automated telephone call telling them their "National Insurance number has been compromised" and in order to fix this and get a new number, the victim needs to "press 1 on their handset to be connected to the caller".



You can report a scam call to Action Fraud via the website or by calling 0300 123 2040. Additionally, if you've received a suspicious phone call, you can help the HMRC's investigations by providing your phone number, the caller's phone number, the date and time of the call and a brief description to <a href="mailto:phishing@hmrc.gov.uk">phishing@hmrc.gov.uk</a>


## Two-factor authentication to further protect your passwords




