WHO CARES ABOUT THOSE WHO CARE FOR PEOPLE WITH SERIOUS MENTAL ILLNESSES?

If you are someone that cares for a loved one with a mental illness know that you are not alone. The carers of those struggling are often forgotten in the recovery programme for their own personal challenges.

As the carer of a child with a diagnosis of a serious mental illness I can attest to how lonely, isolating and emotionally draining our role can be.

How can we improve? How can we do more to support each other?

As we started to provide updates on what was happening in our own world we were surrounded by amazing friends and family, everyone supporting and offering to help with anything they could. It was heartwarming to know so many cared, but then it got too much.

When is too much too much?

Everyone was asking for regular updates, mostly daily, on progress and how our child was? We would often respond with, you will have to ask her as we do not know. It can be very overwhelming for us to try and keep everyone updated.

So what can we do to support those who we know are going through a challenging personal time supporting a loved one?

- Acknowledge their struggles and don't try to minimise their feelings
- Give enough space to enable them to work through their emotions/feelings
- Check in with short and encouraging messages of support – telling someone you are thinking about them helps us to keep fighting

 Never try to fix the challenges – your good ideas might work for some, but unfortunately they often will not work for everyone – remember we are often fighting hard to access the right support already.

So, let's start and continue with Normal

Whilst the experience of a carer is not normal, we crave nothing more than just trying to get on with our lives in the most normal and best way possible. It's ok to laugh, it's ok to enjoy life, in fact is is really important to focus on more of this. Staying healthy and well as a carer is one of the most important actions in supporting others. My best suggestion is to continue working hard on yourself, your own personal self-care, and do more of those things that help you to continue.

As a carer we are always looking for the magic fix, the solution that will give the person back their life. We want nothing more than our loved one to recover, but we are paralysed by the thought that we are unable to do anything. Being there as a supporter is enough.

This is my perspective, you may have a different view of being a carer. It's ok to feel or see this differently. After all we are unique and individual, and we should never try to change that.

Changes to school life as Covid restrictions relax


work too closely to each other or share resources, seating plans where all desks are forward facing and then teaching through a face mask all day.

Elizabeth Ford

Our Family Law team are often asked "can you get divorced whilst living in the same house?"

The answer is 'yes,' you can, however as you can imagine, living under the same roof during separation or divorce is not ideal and is by no means an easy thing to do. This is invariably an emotional and stressful time, even more so if the costs rise because you have not received the correct advice.

If you want to rely on a period of separation to support an application for divorce, you will need to show that you are maintaining separate lives, despite living under the same roof. To comply with this, you must no longer share day-to-day activities such as sharing a bedroom, joint food shopping and eating meals together.

You cannot use grounds of adultery as a reason to divorce if you have continued living in the

same property for six months or more after you learned of the adultery, unless that physical relationship is continuing.

You may want to consider making a separation agreement if you cannot yet or do not want to apply for a divorce but want to make it clear when your relationship ended. Although not a legally binding court order, a separation agreement can give the court a clear indication of how you wish to deal with financial assets.

If you live in the same property but separate as an unmarried couple, you may both want to consider a separation agreement of 'Deed of Separation.' This can cover on-going maintenance, especially if you have children, and what will happen if you were to sell your home, setting out how the money from this will be divided too.

COUNCILLOR'S UPDATE

BEGGARWOOD SURGERY: North Hampshire Urgent Care has given great service to Beggarwood, running the surgery over the last 18 months. Their contract is coming to an end and the Clinical Commissioning Group for our area is currently inviting tenders for a new operator to take over from September. The Chair of the Patent Participation Group has written to patients advising them of the situation and pledging the PPG to work with whichever new supplier is chosen. I attend meeting of the PPG as an observer and can confirm that at their last meeting, the members made it very clear that they did not want to see a return to the situation that prevailed before. The next PPG meeting is on 8th July, via Teams, where this issue will be discussed again. Maria Miller MP is planning to join the meeting, so this issue has high visibility. One plea though: the tender process is not being handled by the surgery so please don't phone it for information. The best contact is the CCG and an e-mail address to use is nick.brooks3@nhs.net.

HATCH WARREN AND BEGGARWOOD COMMUNITY **ASSOCIATION** held its Annual General Meeting on 9th June, using Zoom for the second time. The Chairman, Nick Elms, thanked everyone who had helped over the year and he was pleased to announce that the Café in the Park was returning a surplus since its re-opening. Sadly, there had been an increase in antisocial behaviour at Beggarwood and the committee had been working with the local police to keep troublemakers away and identify culprits. Replacement benches have been installed outside the building and they are much more difficult to vandalise, so recent problems have centred around glass being smashed and the area being littered. The Warren youth wing has re-opened and is working at capacity. Many of the community groups are restarting their activities. Nick is looking forward to being able to start Association events again and, though imminent ones might still be impacted by COVID-19 restrictions, the Fireworks display in November should be able to go ahead. Nick was re-elected as Chairman. Though he has a strong committee to support him, there are still some vacant places, so if you would like to help, they will be pleased to hear from you.

ANAEROBIC DEGESTER: An easing of planning restrictions has been granted by officers at Hampshire County Council to allow the operators to work across weekends. This will not involve any increases to HGV movements or changes to the hours during which lorries are allowed to move along Woodbury Road. It may deliver some benefits in terms of odour as food waste awaiting processing will used up more quickly.

WAREHOUSE PLANNING PERMISSION: in a 'David and Goliath' battle, Dummer Parish Council has challenged the lawfulness of the Borough Council's decision to grant planning

permission for the distribution depot near junction 7. The Parish Council is claiming that some of the information given to Members may not have been accurate and it therefore wants the decision to be revisited. Normally that would not be possible, but the parallel decision by local Members of Parliament to ask the Secretary of State to 'call in' the warehouse application has created a window in which re-running the Development Control meeting could be possible. At the time of writing, the Borough Council's response to this challenge is not known and we are still waiting for the Secretary of State's decision on the 'call-in'.

GRASS CUTTING: this last month saw discussions on the grass cutting in Hatch Warren and Beggarwood. The Borough Council had been experiencing problems and had fallen behind but started to catch up during June. Residents will see that increased areas are being left uncut to encourage insects and wildlife as part of green initiatives.

BRIGHTON HILL ROUNDABOUT: Drivers will have noticed that work was carried out this month on the approaches to the Brighton Hill roundabout. The objective was to divert underground utilities ahead of the major improvement scheme scheduled for later this year. This will see the roundabout widened and equipped with traffic light controls.

DRAINAGE IMPROVEMENT: I am pleased to observe that the flooding problem on the A30 near the electricity sub-station has been improved by recent works. Some torrential rain that previously might have forced drivers into the middle of the road to avoid standing water appears to have been managed well by the improved system.

ST MARK'S SCHOOL held a non-uniform day recently to raise funds for the school and it netted £798. In addition, a nearly new sale raised £120. This brings the school's totaliser figure to £18099.92. The money raised is being used to cover COVID costs, and to provide children with additional resources including technology, playtime equipment, stationery, books and more. Friends of St Mark's School are looking for new members. Some stalwarts will be leaving soon as their children move on. FOSM does sterling work in supporting St Mark's and everyone benefits from the funds they raise and the help they give.

REV MAY: At the end of June, Rev May left Immanuel Church in Hatch Warren for a new position, and Immanuel is now merged with St Mark's in Kempshott. I am sure Rev May goes with all our best wishes and thanks for the support she has given to Hatch Warren and Beggarwood.

OLD DOWN AND BEGGARWOOD WILDLIFE GROUP

Although spring was 2-3 weeks late this year nature seems to have caught up now and as we come into

early summer there are lovely displays of flowers with many (but not as many as there should be!) insects around. Butterflies were not around as early as usual and this was particularly true of the *small blue*. The butterfly transect on Old Down shows that on 27 May last year 296 small blue were seen – this year on the same date only 4 were seen! But by mid-June the numbers had significantly

increased, thank goodness. A new species of butterfly for Old Down was recorded in June – a dingy skipper. The common bird's foot trefoil and horseshoe vetch are most often used for egg laying – there is a fair amount of these flowers on both sites. The *Dingy Skipper* has been recorded on Beggarwood before but not every year.

Another first for Old Down is the white helleborine which is a type of orchid. They like shady spots. Again, like the dingy skipper, Beggarwood got there first - this flower having been seen there for the last couple of years. During June there

was a particularly splendid display of wild flowers around the new wild play area on Beggarwood (former site of the maze) – a blaze of $Ragged\ Robin$ and $Red\ Campion$. There was also a beautiful large bank of $Red\ Campion$ on Old Down.

PROBUS HEARS ABOUT DOING BUSINESS IN 1980s RUSSIA

Export or die was a common expression, along with permanent complaints about the balance of payments deficit. Yet there were many people involved in trying their best to right matters.

Probus Club of Basingstoke member, Richard Stettner, was one such person and he told of his experiences in trying to find export customers for products made by his employer, Basingstoke based Wiggins Teape, in the 1980s. The company was well known for producing printing and office type papers, but there was a different part to the business, at their mill in Stonehaven, Aberdeen. This was the Industrial Casting Paper section for whom Richard was the Export Sales & Marketing Manager.

This division made specialised paper which was the base material used by other companies in the manufacture of imitation leather for use in the automotive, clothing, shoes and upholstery industries.

The thought was Russia surely held potential? Russia probably operated in a similar way to the other Eastern bloc countries where Richard had experience but what central buying organisations existed in Russia and what protocols needed to be followed?

Based in London, a Russo-British Chamber of Commerce has operated since 1916. Annual trade missions took representatives of British companies to meet the Ministry of Light Industry in Moscow.



"The Russian Embassy in London wanted details of our company and what business I wanted to develop in Russia" explained Richard. "Other than receiving my visa and learning the name of the hotel I had no further information about where, when and who I was going to see in the seven days in Moscow."

At the hotel, each member of the party was given an envelope containing their scheduled visits for the week.

Bedroom keys were handed out by a lady guardian on each floor, to whom they would be returned to each morning. Bedrooms were large and basic with an empty fridge.

"We had been educated by the trade mission about the various surveillance techniques that would be used to monitor our activities", continued Richard. "And we knew the top floor of the hotel was given to monitoring the guest bedrooms."

A taxi was at his disposal each day with the driver noting which offices were visited, duration of meetings and how any spare time was used.

One evening, instead of ballet at the Bolshoi, it was opera and rather than sit through the complete evening colleagues from the London trade mission decided to stay in the bar. They were the only customers while the performance continued except for a young woman. After a while, they asked her what she did for a living. She was a chambermaid at their hotel and worked on the same floor as their bedrooms. It was obvious she was there to monitor their movements that night.

Like all Eastern bloc countries, the Russian rouble was not traded in the West and so hard currencies like US dollars, Deutschmarks and Pounds Sterling were needed for any purchases made by the trading companies. Hard currency shops existed where only Western money could be used, and while \$10 would buy a pack of 200 Marlboro cigarettes their value to the Russian public multiplied many times.

"Let me illustrate this in action," said Richard. "One evening ten of us had a meal together and it was paid for by a pack of 200 Marlboro cigarettes."

Consumer products were in short supply during Richard's eight visits with the Chamber of Commerce, so he used to take products to help maintain relationships ladies' knickers, sanitary products, toothpaste and cotton wool.

Was any business conducted? "A large order for 400 tonnes of Casting paper was achieved plus a subsequent smaller order, and at £1,200 per tonne was valuable." Richard continued, "As the forestry industry is an important component of the Russian economy there was policy to barter trade with Russian wood pulp, which Wiggins Teape constantly needed in paper manufacturing. We had one delivery of their wood pulp, but it was black and was of extremely poor quality meaning we didn't use it. So that was the end of our relationship."

Other Eastern bloc countries turned out to be more productive.



MAY MEETING

and seemed destined to a life of caring for her difficult and demanding mother as this was the expectation of life for a single woman in the 1930s. However Violet had other ideas and moves to Winchester to begin a new life. She joins the broderers group in the cathedral and learns to embroider the intricate kneelers. Defying convention she also sets out on a walking holiday from Winchester to Salisbury on her own.

This book was a slow and gentle peek into the life of women in the 1930s and how some of them tried to make changes to the expectations put upon them. It certainly has lots of local interest and descriptions of the villages around Winchester.

The Bookworms enjoyed learning about the social history of the time and what it was like to be living in the build up to another war. Some are even keen to follow in Violet's footsteps and walk The Clarendon Way 27 miles from Winchester to Salisbury cathedral!

At the May meeting of the Beggarwood Surgery Patient Participation Group (PPG) we were advised by Alma Kilgarriff from Hampshire, Southampton and Isle of Wight Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG) that they are now inviting tenders to supply medical services to the Beggarwood surgery from September when North Hampshire Urgent Care (NHUC), the current supplier's contract expires. Felicity Greene, NHUC Chief Executive, advised that NHUC would not be tendering for the new contract.

NHUC has given such great service to Beggarwood over the last 18 months and the PPG will be very sad to lose them as our medical supplier. Beggarwood had an extremely difficult time two years ago when Cedar ran services into the ground and then walked away from their contract and we, your Beggarwood Surgery PPG, do not want to go back to that situation.

Alma wanted to reassure us that the CCG are aware of the position with the problems in the past and both she and Felicity are working to get us through the process needed for a new owner. Alma advised that there are currently two private providers tendering, one local and one national. At this point it is important to make clear that most doctors' surgeries are private providers and are either normally run by a private company or the doctors themselves, both with profits in mind. However, those run by doctors seem to have a better patient/doctor relationship overall. The downside is that these doctor lead surgeries are unfortunately becoming quite rare, as a lot of doctors seem to prefer working for other companies/individuals without the worry of looking after staff, buildings, finances etc.


The PPG asked if Operose had tendered and expressed concern about them. Alma advised that under the terms of the procurement process she is unable to divulge which companies had tendered but our concern was noted. She made it clear there are certain protocols to follow when issuing invitations to tender and they cannot be seen to be leaning towards any particular applicant. They are however aware of our needs and whilst they cannot prevent companies like Operose from tendering they will always carry out due diligence. We also discussed the issue that legally any company that has failed in its contracts in the past can be precluded from the tendering process by the CCG.

This communication is to make patients aware of the ongoing situation. We have been in contact with the CCG's Communications and Engagement Manager Nick Brooks, and he has advised that this is a fluid situation, which is subject to change. We shall keep patients updated as things progress, via the online neighbourhood sites and the local magazines — The Kempshott Kourier and The Rabbiter.

We must make clear that this tendering process is nothing to do with NHUC so please do not phone the surgery for information about this issue. RESTAURANT REVIEW

Madam decided that for my birthday she would take me to dinner. After so long being under lockdown regulations it was to be somewhere special. Oakley Hall was the selected venue for this intimate fine dining experience. Since last visiting this establishment it has undergone extensive expansion and now boasts four stars. We really looked forward to our evening in their 1795 bar and Glasshouse restaurant.

The bar was a modern sophisticated design ideal for a predinner gin and tonic, and we could hear noise from the adjacent Glasshouse restaurant giving the impression it was well attended. It turned out to be not as expected. Clearly the attendees were residents of the hotel during the half term break. The immediate impression was that this was a family dining space frequented by young families, some with pre-school toddlers that continued to scream during the entire time we spent there.

The menu immediately dispelled the anticipated fine dining experience promoted on their web site as it was an all-day menu on a one-sided wipe clean card that would not have been out of place in many a gastro pub but with restaurant wine prices.

As it is in season, we both had asparagus as a starter. This was presented with a small poached egg and hollandaise sauce on attractive plates. A bottle of Merlot proved very palatable and ignoring the burgers and shepherd's pie type offering we selected the special sharing dish of Côte de Boeuf at £60.

This is a T-bone steak cooked and sliced accompanied with three pots of sauces together with triple cooked chips and some minute mushroomy type vegetables that were nothing like that illustrated on their web site. The waitress advised that this steak could not be cooked less than medium rare, and we opted for the next level up. While it was well presented on a specially designed wooden platter with a hot plate the meat was only just warm, so we sent it back. It emerged a short time later apparently having been placed in the oven but being rather rarer than we had expected perhaps is the reason for the lack of internal temperature.

For dessert I had a chocolate tart that came with raspberries and a similarly flavoured ice cream and Madam had the cheese board that had five small selections and pretty slices of bread but no butter. As it seemed to suit the waiter, we ordered coffee at the same time as making the dessert selection, but the coffee came first and was drunk prior to the arrival of the desserts. Madam had a second cup to finish off her meal.

When the bill arrived, I noticed that the bar drinks were not showing and after the waiter went to check said that he could find no record on their system so it could be ignored. Perhaps as well since despite voicing our complaints about the food there was no discount from the total of £124. We did not leave a tip.






